ANNUAL REPORT ROTARY YEAR 2019-2020

The Rotary Year 2019-2020 for the Rotary Club of Patan revolved around the RI theme “Rotary Connects the World” and four priority areas: Impact, Reach, Engagement and Adapt. All the programmes and projects were reviewed and reoriented towards ensuring that the projects are impactful



and the results are sustainable. Efforts were made to expand RCP’s reach out to the communities as much as possible with maximum participation of its members, communities and partners in service. Similarly, different avenues were explored to adapt with the changing conditions in the community, working with local governments and entities and dramatically changing environment due to Covid 19 pandemic. Similarly, the activities of RCP have also been within the six areas of focus. Some of the important initiatives taken and achievements made during this period are highlighted within those priority areas.

Priority Area I: Increased Impact:

The impact of RCP achievements are focused in three areas 1. Community Service, and 2. Increased Contribution to TRF.

1. Community Services

Education: Distribution of scholarship to students from economically deprived communities has been RCP’s annual event since more than a decade. Almost 400 students of 27 community schools have been able to continue their education upto grade 12. To inspire the students to improve their grades 10 best students from 27 schools were awarded under the Kamalmani Excellence Education Award (KEEA) with total amount of Rs. 100,000 cash prize ranging from Rs. 5,000 to 25,000, Opportunity is also available to deserving students to obtain even graduate and masters levels. Educational aid was provided to the Bright Star Society in support of visually impaired students of Kailali and Gorkha. Further supports being initiated under TEACH components. All possible options were explored to ensure greater impacts of the results achieved and their sustainability.



Water and Sanitation: Out of 27 schools supported under PEEF as mentioned above, 12 schools were upgraded with clean drinking water and better sanitation facilities under Global Grant Project (GG1860104 Sustainable Wash Improvement in Public Schools of Lalitpur District with US\$80938) in partnership with several clubs of Italy.

Through this project, an active management system for its operation was formed with the participation of both school teachers and students. Continuation and sustainability of the project impact was insured by producing an Implementation Manual which will be used by school management, This was another landmark achievement of this project.



Through another global grant (GG1641893 School Refurbishing and Drinking water with US\$58,500) supported communities affected by the devastating earthquake of 2015, and improvements made in community school in the Mirage Villages of Dolakha. Similarly, (GG1640569 Drinking water to communities affected by earth in Lalitpur District and in Chandibhanjyang, Chitwan with US\$36,669). The communities of 22 households in Satakanya village of Bhattedanda, Lalitpur and 31 households of Chandibhanjyang aware provided with better drinking water facilities.



Health: Rotary Club of Patan is the largest contributor (Rs. 2,00,000) in supporting the initiatives of RI District 3292 to fight against Covid 19 pandemic. In support of Local governments, RCP with NRCL supported in providing PPE and other humanitarian aid to Lalitpur Municipality.

At the individual level, many RCP members were involved in awareness campaigns, food distribution and mask distribution in Lalitpur area.

A number of health camps were carried out in partnership with Nepal Heart Foundation in rhuematic heart disease, Inner Wheel for eye camp in Bandipur, and Rotaract Club of Patan for blood donation. Similarly, hospitals that were adversely affected were also supported by RCP, such as Nepal Orthopedic hospital with NRs. 100,000 and Burn and & Cleft Hospital in Kirtipur with NRs. 200,000 with generous contributions from its members.

Economic growth/Income Generation:

Through a grant project (GG1746726 Creating Income Opportunity for Women from earth-affected community with: US\$58,000), skills training for about 150 women members of Khokana Women's Organization were provided to help them carry out various income generating activities. Due to Covid 19 pandemic, their income generating activities adversely affected. However, their skills have been used in producing face masks which helped them in a modest way to compensate their loss. Some of RCP members (Rtn. RR Pandey, Rtn. Bharat N. Joshi and Rtn. Lalita Thapa) helped the group in promoting of their products.

Vocational Service: Vocational awards in Health, Education and Journalism have been the annual feature of Rotary Club of Patan, with the help of contributions from its members. In the year 2019-20, the Award Committee decided to award only in to areas: Health and Education. Thus. Prof. Nimananda Rijal and Dr. Bhagabati Nepal were awarded for their excellent services in the vocation of education and health respectively. Although, the award amount is only Rs. 11,000 each, the objective is to recognize the contributions made by them and inspire others to excel in their vocation. The event was led by Rtn. Dr. Prakash R. Regmi and Rtn. Nirmal K. Pradhanang. Under the leadership of RCP Past President, Rtn. Pushkar Man Shakya and in partnership with other clubs under District 3292, a Vocational Seminar was organized with the objective of promoting vocational skills for human resource development. In this seminar, the RCP's Vocational Service

Awardee Prof. Nimanand Rijal was one of the key speakers. A modest financial support was provided by RCP for this Seminar.

Youth Service: Promotion of leadership and professionalism in youth has been the main priority of RCP's youth development programme. RCP has supported Rotaractors' participation in most of the District events and other skill training. RCP members under the leadership of Youth Service Director, Rtn. Siba Bhakta Rajbhandary, were actively engaged in all aspects of youth services and in their activities., e.g in induction of Rotaractors, interactors and their activities. A new interact club is being initiated with the help of Rotaract Club of Patan in Godawari School with active initiatives of Rtrs Kritika Sharma and Peshal Bhattarai. They are also regular attendees of RCP weekly meetings.

2. Increase TRF contribution:

RCP has been very successful in making substantial contribution in TRF under the leadership of TRF Chair/Director, Rtn. Dr. Prakash R. Regmi. More than US\$ 8,500 were contributed in the TRF beyond its annual goal. Of which US\$ 1,500 was allocated to Polio Plus with the contribution of almost all members. In addition, the year has added one more Major Donor, Rtn. Ganesh Raj Shrestha with the contribution of \$10,000. Now the total number of major donors in RCP has reached to 8.

RCP's Endowment Funds: RCP has three major endowment funds and contributions to these funds are in increasing trend: (i) **Club Service Fund**, established in 2010-11 under the leadership of Past President Prakash R. Regmi has reached to the amount of NRs. 3,771,797, of which NRs. 409,370 was available for club's activities (ii) **Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF)** has two component: Trust Fund with Rs. 12,953,467.42, and program fund with Rs. 46,08,596. The large portion of the program fund is being spent for scholarship distributions. (iii) With an initial contribution of Rs. 10,00,000 from Rtn. Rabendra Raj Pandey to establish in the name of his parents **Khagendra Raj and Piyush Priya Ability Endowment Fund (KPAD)** in 2018, RCP was able to raise

from its members additional amount and established a Trust Fund of NRs. 28,63,000. The interest earned from this fund amounting to NRs. 3,32,045 is now available for activities to support people with disability. The annual contribution of NRs. 2,00,000 is also available from Dr Mukti Narayan and Praveena Foundation for One Health Project for Animal Welfare. With this funding, 2011 stray dogs of Lalitpur were given anti-rabies vaccines.

Priority Area 2: Expand Our Outreach:

Towards achieving objectives of this RI priority area, RCP took three prong approach: (i) Membership Growth & Retention, (ii) Effective club meetings, communications and Public Image, and (iii) Reaching out to local partners and communities

(i) Membership Growth: RCP was successful in its membership growth under the leadership of Membership Chair/Director, Rtn. Jeevan K. Shrestha. It achieved 200% against its annual target with two additional female members and one couple members. The total number has now reached to 44 active members with 6 couple members. In addition, RCP has two honorary members. It also maintained 100% retention of new members and their active participation in all activities of RCP.



(ii) Club meetings, communications and Public Image: Community outreach was greatly facilitated by regular club meetings. With active support of Public Image Chair/Director, Rtn. Ganesh Raj Shrestha and other members, we were able to invite **guest speakers** on subjects of diabetics, dementia, investments in foreign country, healthy living, "solo heroine's journey to Terai" and road traffic management. In addition, club members also made



presentations on relevant topics on the basis of their expertise and professional experience e.g. Rtn. Dr. Khadak S. Bisht on Corona Virus, Rtn. Dr. Bishwa B. Sharma on the impact of Covid 19 on social and psychological effect on general communities, Rtn. Lila Baniya on the impact of Covid 19 on Economy of Nepal in general and on Tourism Sector in particular, Rtn. Maheshwari Bisht Rawal on Gender Based Violence. In these events, participants from other members of Rotary Clubs of Patan and non-Rotarians were also invited. With discrete support from Club Administration Chair/Director, Rtn. Kiran Thapa, maximum participation was ensured through various ways of communications.

RCP's Public Image have been greatly enhanced through weekly newsletter (**Lalitdhara bulletin**), Facebook page updates, and RCP Website with regular stories and information on RCP's activities. The dedication and commitments of Rtn. Bijaya Mallapaty, Rtn. Gabriele Mallapaty and Rtn. Shiv Prakash Khemka are highly appreciated.

achievements are well documented and distributed for public information.

During the lockdown due to Covid 19 pandemic, RCP was one of the first clubs to continue its regular meetings with about 70% attendance via "google meet" and "Zoom" so that its services to the communities are continued.

Reachout to local partners and communities: In the past, many functions were carried out at RCP's meeting venue. Recently, these functions are carried at community levels and closer to the other communities tool. For example, the Kamalmani Education Excellence Award (KEEA) was conducted at Lubhu Madhyamaic School, one of the 27 PEEF supported schools at local environment and active participation and ownership of school management. Kunda Dixit, son of late Kamalmani Dixit awarded 10 students selected from 27 schools.

In order to expand its outreach, RCP collaborated with other partners, Nepal Heart Foundation for health camps in rheumatic heart disease and celebrating World Heart Day guest speakers from Gangalal Hospital. RCP partnered

with Inner Wheel for eye camp in Bandipur, Rotaract Club of Patan, for blood donation and Sneha Care for animal health.

Priority Area 3: Enhance participant engagement:

RCP members' participation and engagement were quite remarkable, particularly in (i) service projects, (ii) Conference and Seminar, (iii) Partners' activities and (iv) Fellowships.

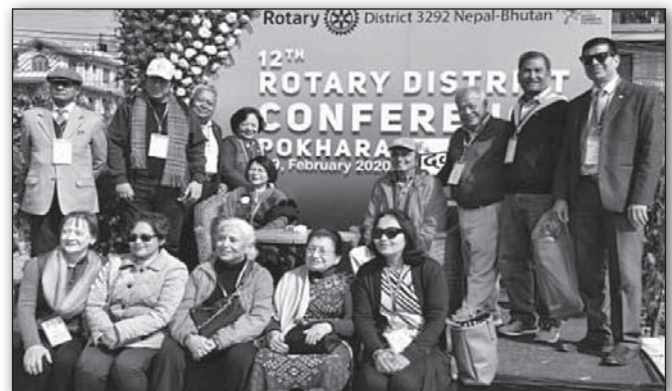
(i) Participation in Service Projects: Since the year 2014-15, RCP were having 9 Global Grant Projects. Six of them have been successfully completed. The remaining three



project are in support of school going children, and drinking water support to earthquake affected communities. Each and every member was also the member of RCP's Committees and Sub-committees. More than 100% participation of its members and spouses were actively engaged during the distribution of PEEF scholarships in 27 community schools in remote villages of Lalitpur. Implementation and monitoring of WASH projects in 12 schools of Lalitpur and drinking water projects in Chandibhangjyang, Bhattedanda and Khokana had maximum participation of RCP members and their spouses.



(ii) Engagement in District's events: Out of 44 members, 25 of them (almost 60%) attended the District Conference in Pokhara, considered one of the largest participating clubs. In every events, conference, seminar or training organized by the District, on an average of 4-5 participants had ensured their active participation.

(ii) Engagement with Partners-in-Service: RCP's engaged Rotaractors in carrying out its annual programme of blood donation, managing vocational seminar, monitoring of projects and activities of interactors and many other events.







Introduction

The Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) has been implementing the Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF) programme since 1991, providing educational scholarship to needy children in public schools. It has demonstrated that the value of a small monetary contribution is exponentially larger in terms of improvements of a child's overall well-being and develop communities through continued education of children.

As of 30 June 2020, the PEEF Trust Fund has reached Nepalese Rupees (NRs.) 12.95 million with a Programme Fund balance of NRs. 4.14 million. In addition to the Trust Fund, the RCP has also been successful in increasing the Programme Fund balance to have a sustainable reserve to cover a few years of scholarships.

The PEEF 'Management and Operational Policies' (PEEF MOPs) govern the PEEF. The PEEF MOPs separate the Trust Fund from the Programme Fund and outline the policies and procedures of the funds' management, criteria for support, investments and financial management mechanisms, and administrative responsibilities.

A key to the continued success of this flagship programme of the RCP is that the entire RCP family takes ownership of it. In addition to a dedicated committee managing this programme, the RCP family volunteers its valuable time and resources during the annual student selection and funds distribution in the assisted public schools throughout the Lalitpur District.

This annual report captures key actions taken during the reporting period 1 July 2019 to 30 June 2020, and provides a summary, together with an attachment, showing all PEEF contributors and contributions.

Recent Developments

The global Covid-19 pandemic with the closure of all schools by the government of Nepal since March 2020 has not permitted 2020 selection and distribution of scholarships. Therefore, this report includes only last year's scholarships to grades 11 and 12 distributed prior to March 2020. It does not include this year's scholarships due to school closures. All preparatory work has been done, but distribution visits may only start once schools can open.

Following the historic signing of the MOU with the President of Sarswati Govinda Foundation, late Honorary Rotarian Govinda Das Shrestha, an annual contribution of one million Nepalese Rupees to the PEEF was received for the

third consecutive year in July 2019. In the history of Rotary in Nepal, this is the largest long-term commitment of an annual contribution made by a Nepali through a Rotary Club in Nepal, and the RCP is proud of this trust bestowed upon it. Late Honorary Rtn. Govinda Das Shrestha's legacy continues with our collaboration with Sarswati Govinda Foundation. On behalf of his spouse Mrs. Sarswati Shrestha, their daughter Honorary Rotarian Anuradha Shrestha is leading the collaboration between Sarswati Govinda Foundation and the Rotary Club of Patan.

The Rotary Club of Patan appreciates the contributions and continued support from all its donors - RCP Members, their families, relatives, friends, and other well-wishers.

Key Actions

- (i) The RCP manages this programme entirely voluntarily with zero administrative cost. In addition to specific contributions, RCP family members contribute their time and resources for the annual selection and distribution of scholarships to 27 public schools in various locations of Lalitpur District.
- (ii) **Status of implementation of PEEF Management Review done in March 2016:**

In March 2016, the year of PEEF's 25th anniversary, the RCP had conducted a situation analysis of this programme. The analysis investigated the programme's successes and strengths, as well as challenges. It pointed out that a long-term mechanism was needed

to deal with the PEEF's dependence on fluctuating interest rates and that reporting to its expanding donor base needed to be simplified. The Programme Fund had been decreasing due to reduced interest rates while the scholarship amounts needed to be increased to counter the continuing inflation.

Over the last four years, the RCP is pleased to report that all the recommended key changes have been implemented with PEEF finances reaching a sustainable level with the increase in the programme funds. The decision to reduce the number of schools from 27 to 24 is taking a couple of years longer in view of the addition of scholarship to grades 11 and 12. This will be attained by 2021.

- (iii) With the inclusion of grades 11 and 12 into the secondary education system in Nepal, and the expansion of the RCP's donor base, the RCP has been able to provide scholarships to continuing students in grade 11 and to grade 12 students from 2019.
- (iv) **Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award (KEEA) to meritorious students receiving PEEF scholarships:** The RCP established the 'KEEA' in 2013 with the initial sponsorship of late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit. The award fund has since been expanded with annual support from several other members of the RCP and

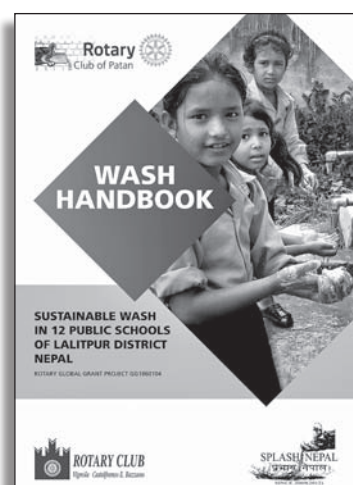

additional substantial contribution from the Dixit family in the name of their late father. The KEEA currently recognizes meritorious students in grade 9 from among the PEEF scholarship recipients with certificates and cash awards to 10 students totalling NRs. 100,000.

- (v) **Graduate Studies Scholarship Award:** The RCP established this award initiated by Rtn. Matsyendra L. Kayastha and supported by Rtn. Prakash R. Regmi to award two scholarships for up to 6 years, beyond secondary level, for a master's level education. This award is expected to start from 2020 and best performing students from among the PEEF scholarship recipients would be chosen.

- (vi) **Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH):** In early 2020, the RCP completed a WASH in School global grant project of over US \$80,000 in partnership with Rotary Clubs in Italy, the Rotary Foundation, and the implementing partner Splash (Prabhav) Nepal. The 12 PEEF supported schools benefited from improvements in regular water supply, proper hand washing facilities and practices, clean toilet facilities – separate for boys and girls, sufficient quantity of drinking water and clean school environment. This comprehensive project followed the Government of Nepal guidelines with technical support of the World Health Organisation. It ensured the ownership of the school management committees and full participation of students to promote sustainable WASH in schools with a reward and recognition system at all levels.



- (vii) **Rotary Year 2019-2020 student selection and distribution:** In the Rotary Year 2019–2020, 407 public school students from lower-income families in 27 public schools of Lalitpur District received scholarships totalling NRs. 1,445,000 to support their education from grade 7 to 12. The scholarship amount was NRs. 3,000 in grades 7 to 10 plus NRs. 1,000 for those meritorious students getting a GPA of 2.81 or more (70% or B+). It is heartening to note that 94 out of 342 students in grades 7 to 10 received this meritorious supplement. In grades 11 and 12, scholarship of NRs. 5,000 each was given to 65 eligible students.

Income and Expenditures:

- (i) During this Rotary Year, total contributions of NRs. 486,110 was received in the Trust Fund.
- (ii) In the Programme Fund, contributions received and interest income totalled NRs. 2,017,874 with an expenditure of NRs. 304,250 with a net income of NRs. 1,713,624. The expenditure is low because disbursements for 2020 scholarships have not been made because of school closures due to Covid-19 pandemic.

At the KEEA awards ceremony, the first prize winner, Ms. Sushmita Thapa spoke on behalf of all awardees from the PEEF-supported schools and thanked Mr. Kunda Dixit, special guest from the Dixit family, and members of the Rotary Club of Patan for the recognition and cash awards. She emphasized how the PEEF scholarship has helped her pursue her education.

An all-round excellent student with a GPA of 3.5 in grade 9 final examination, stood out with leadership qualities and a 'to do' attitude. She is already active in social work, is a talented singer and aims to become a Doctor and a Lawyer to give back to the society.

The Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) has a long history of support to people with disability, including the successful completion of the 3H grant project (2008-2012) to raise awareness in this regard. In September 2018, with an initial pledge of NRs. 10 Lakhs by Rtn. Rabendra Raj Pandey, the RCP established, in his parents' name, 'Khagendra Raj and Piyush Priya Ability Development Endowment Fund' (KPAD).

Highlights of the KPAD Programme:

- RCP KPAD Fund was established with a long-term vision to enable people with disabilities.
- The RCP family committed to take ownership of this flagship programme through advocacy for fund-raising and voluntary contributions by a maximum number of the RCP family.
- Within three months of its establishment, the RCP raised over NRs. 25 Lakh (2.5 million) and set its aim to raise NRs. 1 crore (10 million) within 3 years.
- All interest from the KPAD Trust Fund will be deposited into a Programme Fund, 100% of which will be used to support programmes for people with disabilities. All the professional time and resources provided by the RCP family to manage this programme will be voluntary.
- First support from the KPAD funds was made in December 2019 to the Karnali secondary school's 20 visually impaired students with supplies worth NRs. 32,500.

Rotary Club of Patan Vocational Service Awards

Background:

One of the five Avenues of Service, 'Vocational Service' is rooted in the second object of Rotary, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster high ethical standards in business and professions and recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations.

Nirmal Pradhanang joined since 2014/15. Following the latest Rotary Club of Patan Board decision of 6 Oct. 2017, the award amount has been raised to NRs. 11,000 each to two awardees with Rotary Club of Patan providing NRs. 7,000 and Rtns. Prakash Raj Regmi and Nirmal K. Pradhanang providing NRs. 8,000 and NRs. 7000 respectively.

Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award (KEEA) History

Background:

The Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award (KEEA) started in 2012 with a donation of NRs. 100,000 by late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit to establish a "Fund" to honour the best-performing student among those receiving scholarships from the RCP's Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF). In December 2013, the best all-round student among three students received its first award.

In February 2014, the RCP increased the award amount from NRs. 5,000 to NRs. 10,000 after late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit contributed additional NRs. 25,000 to the RCP's Club Service Fund. To expand this award, Rtn. Ganesh R. Shrestha and PDG Rtn. Tirtha M. Sakya provided additional annual contributions of NRs. 5,000 and NRs. 3,000 respectively for the 2nd and 3rd best students. The second award ceremony took place in December 2014, which awarded three students.

In October 2015, the RCP further expanded the awards to reward 10 students based on merit among the students sponsored by the PEEF. The additional 9 prizes would be given through annual contributions from RCP members - three second prizes of NRs. 5,000 each were contributed by Rtns. Ganesh R. Shrestha, Bijaya Mallapaty, and Matsyendra L. and Chandralekha Kayastha; and six third prizes of NRs. 3,000 each were contributed by Rtns. PDG Tirtha M. Sakya, Lalita Thapa, Sharada Prasai, Gautam Shakya (replaced by Jamuna K. Tamrakar from 2017), Siba B. Rajbhandary and Nirmal K. Pradhanang. The third award ceremony in April 2016 awarded 10 students for the first time.

In June 2016, late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit contributed additional NRs. 30,000 making a total contribution of NRs. 155,000 to the RCP's Club Service Fund, which covered the first prize of NRs. 12,000 annually.

In March 2017, Ms. Munu Rajkarnikar, spouse of late Rtn. Narayan G. Halwai, contributed NRs. 100,000 in the name of her husband for the KEEA to the RCP's Club Service Fund, and the RCP allocated NRs. 8,000 every year for the KEEA in the name of late Rtn. Narayan G. Halwai.

In November 2017, Messrs. Kunda Dixit and Kanak Dixit contributed NRs. 10,71,117.12 in the name of late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit to the RCP's Club Service Fund for the KEEA this allowed the club to increase the awards to students to its current level.

Award Modalities:

Annually, ten top-scoring students in the final

examination of grade IX from 10 different schools supported by the PEEF are pre-selected. The RCP calls all 10 students for interview and categorise - one best all-round student, three second-best students and six third-best students for cash awards and certificates.

The RCP Interview and Selection Committee comprises of the Coordinator of the PEEF (RCP President Elect), the RCP Secretary and the RCP Chairperson of the Service Projects.

The award ceremony, which is also an advocacy event to enhance the public image of Rotary/Rotary Club of Patan, is held every year, preferably in September. The RCP also invites all the Headmasters from the PEEF supported schools to the ceremony.

One Health – Animal Health for Public Health

Background

In June 2019, the Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) signed a Memorandum of Understanding with the Dr. Mukti Narayan Praveena Foundation whereby the Foundation agreed to make an annual donation of NRs. 200,000 to the Rotary Club of Patan for its 'Animal Welfare for Public Health' programme in the Lalitpur District. During the Rotary Year 2019-2020, the Rotary Club of Patan collaborated with the NGO Sneha's Care, conducting an anti-rabies vaccination programme in Nakhu, Bhainsepati, Khokana and Bungamati areas of Lalitpur. Between mid-March 2020 to mid-April 2020 the Sneha's Care team was able to vaccinate 2111 dogs despite the difficulties faced during the COVID-19 pandemic lockdown.

One Health

The concept of 'One Health' approach was officially launched in September 2004 at the 'One World, One Health - building interdisciplinary bridges to health in a globalized world' conference in New York. This is a multi-sectoral and integrated approach for preventing and mitigating health threats at the Animal-Human-Plant-Environment interfaces with the objective of achieving public health, food and nutrition security, sustainable ecosystems, and fair-trade facilitation. The 'One Health' approach has been adopted worldwide for cross-sectoral and multi-disciplinary collaborations to effectively deal with the endemic, emerging, infectious, and zoonotic diseases.

Zoonotic Diseases

Zoonotic diseases, also known as zoonoses, are those diseases and infections that are caused by germs/microorganisms that spread from vertebrate animals to humans and vice versa. There are three classes: a) endemic zoonoses - which are present in many places and affect many people and animals; b) epidemic zoonoses -

which are sporadic in temporal (time) and spatial (place) distribution; and c) emerging and re-emerging zoonoses - which are newly appearing in a population or have existed previously but are rapidly increasing in incidence or geographical range.

Global, Regional and National Context

The health threats of emerging and re-emerging diseases including zoonoses at the animal-human-plant-environment interfaces are becoming more prominent and frequent. SARS-CoV-1, avian influenza, rabies, Nipah and Ebola outbreaks, as well as food-borne diseases and antimicrobial resistance (AMR), continue to have major impacts on our health, livelihoods, and economies. The current global pandemic of SARS-CoV-2 virus (COVID-19) makes it clear what devastating effects zoonotic disease can have.

In recognition of the global threat that the Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI H5N1) outbreak in 2003/2004 in Asia and other emerging zoonotic diseases posed, the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), World Health Organization (WHO), and World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) developed a strategic framework and a tripartite agreement, to work more closely locally, nationally, and globally, to attain optimal health for people, animals and our environment.

'One Health' challenges and benefits

With rapid population growth, globalization and environmental degradation, health threats have become more complex. Solutions cannot be found by one sector alone. The 'One Health' approach leverages the idea that problems impacting human, animals, plants, and environmental health can be effectively resolved through improved coordination, communication, and collaborative actions across disciplines.

Specific intervention, such as rabies vaccination programmes; knowledge management; awareness raising; advocacy to garner political commitment; collaboration among all stakeholders within the 'One Health' approach contribute to consistent and synergetic decision-making, avoidance of gaps and duplication of effort. The multi-sectoral coordinated approach has been proven as a successful tool for managing public health risk with zoonotic potential.

Rotary Club of Patan's plans

The RCP 'One Health' team is exploring on broadening its work in the 'One Health – Animal health for Public Health' area this Rotary Year. The team is reviewing how the RCP could get involved in the multi-sector collaborative rabies eradication project to achieve an even larger impact. The Rotary Club of Patan 'One Health' team members are: Rtns. Mukti N. Shrestha, Khadak S. Bisht, Gabriele Mallapaty, Bijaya Mallapaty (Service Project Chair), and Nirmal Pradhanang (President).

The ROTARY NEPAL LITERACY MISSION (RNLM)

Literacy is so fundamental to learning that its **importance** cannot be overstated — it is the essential foundation of **education**. ... “**Literacy** is the first step towards freedom, towards liberation from social and economic constraints. It is the prerequisite for development, both individual and collective.

Poor quality education is leaving a legacy of illiteracy more widespread than previously believed. Children and adolescents are excluded from education for many reasons. Children from rural areas are more than twice as likely to be out of primary school as their urban peers. Without skills for lifelong learning, children face greater barriers to earning potential and employment later in life. They are more likely to suffer adverse health outcomes and less likely to participate in the decisions that affect them – threatening their ability to build a better future for themselves and their communities.

Nepal’s worrying education scenario shows nearly 97% enrollment in the primary level, however it drops to nearly 50% by the children reaching the middle school, thus depriving half of population of children from growing into their full potential.

Basic education and literacy is one of Rotary’s areas of focus: essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace.

With the commitment made at the 2012 South Asia Conference in Kathmandu, the RID 3292 initiated the mission for a Literate Nepal. With the declaration by the Ministry of Education, MOE, to achieve universal enrolment, literacy and quality education; **RID 3292 constituted the Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission (RNLM)**, to supplement and compliment the efforts of MOE in ensuring quality education in Community Schools and in promoting a Literate Community through active engagement of its network of Rotary Clubs and its Partners-in-Service.

The Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission (RNLM) in pursuing its goal of universal enrolment, literacy and quality education, and the Vision of Total Literacy by the year 2030, will have three interlinked programmatic approaches:

- (i) **T-E-A-C-H Program:** to support quality education for the improved school management, quality in teaching & learning, and improving physical environment in community schools.
- (ii) **Back to School Program:** to support universal enrolment of children – leaving no child behind to ensure children who have dropped out of school return back to school and
- (iii) **WASH in Schools (WINS):** to support improvement of water, sanitation and hygiene condition in schools including improved hygiene behavioral practices among students for better school learning environment and collaborative interlinking with the ERRRP (Earthquake Relief, Rehabilitation and Reconstruction Program) pursuits.

Action Plan:

In order to the achieve RNLM objectives, the following Actin Plan is envisaged:

1. RNLM will build partnerships and collaborations with local government, inter-government, and non-government organizations through specific actionable Memorandum of Understanding, joint project agreements, as well as mobilize individual financial and technical support for the program.
2. Each Rotary Club will adopt more than one government school each year to convert into the Child friendly happy school following RNLM program operational guidelines.
3. Existing School Improvement Plan (SIP) will be taken as the basis for supporting the school or the schools will be supported to develop SIP if it does not exist.

4. All Clubs would involve their Rotaracts, Interacts, RCCs, Inner Wheel/Spouse Groups and other partners including local government to implement the program.
5. RNLM encourages Clubs to participate in projects through Global/District Grants, and has also decided to support one third amount of the Clubs contribution in projects. To assist Clubs in undertaking projects a number of MOUs have been signed and completed with vendors of computers and e-learning (online/visual) support, paint companies etc. Similarly, CSR values of companies is a major resource for projects. However, to be able to allow many Clubs to undertake a number of projects, and fund through its own resources; a yearly rolling fund of NRs. 10 million is envisaged. In order to also make our own contribution, the Clubs have recently ratified annual support to Literacy @ NRs. 500.00 per member to create the targeted fund.

Recognition of Achievements:

Each year since 2018, RNLM has been encouraging the efforts of Clubs in undertaking Literacy projects. Literacy Awards are presented for each category to the most deserving top three Clubs in overall performances.

Excellence Awards for Teachers/Associates and/or Schools: With the sponsorship of prominent citizens, thought-leaders, and/or Rotarians, Rotary Awards will also be offered for demonstrating Excellence in quality teaching and learning environment made to a government basic school in honor of (a) Krishna Pyari Mathema Rotary Award for Excellence in Basic Education (KPMRA). This will be Annual Awards of NRs. 10 lakhs each year, and (b) Mathura Family Rotary Awards for outstanding teachers covering both basic and secondary schools on every alternate year basis to 14 teachers (male and female) from each province of NRs. 50,000 each totaling NRs. 7 lakhs.

The awards will be made on 8th September each year henceforth, coinciding with the International Literacy Day.

New Structure

The proposed new structure is based on the concept of making the presence and impact of Rotary through RNLM Programs in all the Provinces of Nepal. Hence, the Regional pattern otherwise adopted by D3292, is restructured and wherever Provinces do not have any or only have (very) few Clubs; Clubs from other Provinces have also been

requested and encouraged to also participate with RNLM Program activities in these areas, through Provincial Committees.

A Steering Committee consists of Rotarians (and its extended family: Rotaracts, Interacts, Inner Wheelers) and Representatives from other institutions, viz. the GoN/MoES&T, UNICEF, UNESCO. The Steering Committee has the members of the Working Committee, Provincial Committee Chairs, Present & Future District Leaders, District Committee Chair on Basic Education & Literacy and Coordinators of the RNLM programs. The Committee will suggest policies and actions in pursuance of the objectives and vision of RNLM.

The Working Committee is an executive Committee which meets regularly on a weekly basis, to monitor/facilitate the activities and programs of RNLM. Within this Committee a *core drafting team* is created which is responsible for all documentation/MoUs/promotional material that RNLM prepares. The **Provincial Committees** led by PDGs is an independent Committee which is expected to work closely with the Provincial/local Government on the RNLM Programs. This Committee will have a member to represent each program project component under RNLM. On a similar basis, Clubs are to also form their own **Club Literacy Committees**, which headed by a Co-ordinator, will drive the Clubs in undertaking the RNLM Program/projects.

In order to materialize the Vision of Total Literacy by 2030, a **RNLM Strategic Plan** has been prepared to help the Clubs to make an initial headway for the 5-year period between RY 2020-21 and 2024-25, which will actually be in line with the District Goals. Similarly, RNLM will be launching it's Manual with operational guidelines for the Clubs: describing the implementing procedures for the RNLM Programs, assisted under an upgraded structure.

Rotary Supports to Strengthen Clubs



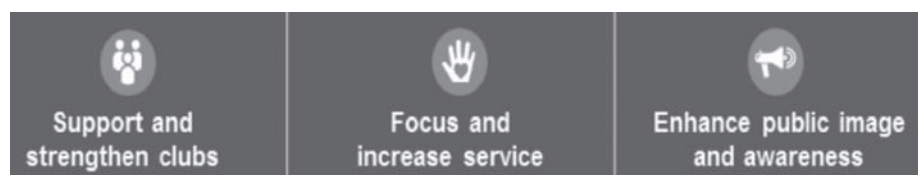

Rotary is an organization of professional and vocational leaders spread around the world in over 208 countries and territories, gathered together to serve the communities in need, because “Service Above Self” is the main motto of Rotary International. Service at local community level will help achieve peace and harmony, which is needed to ensure peace at the local, national and global level. Promoting peace is the first of the seven areas of focus of Rotary service.

1. Rotary’s Strategic Priorities

Rotary world is divided into 525 Districts to support the 36,158 clubs (on May 1, 2020) with over 1.217 million members of diverse profession, ethnicity, age and gender. “Support and strengthen clubs” is the first strategic priority of Rotary International’s Strategic Plan.

2. Structure of RI District 3292 Nepal-Bhutan

Rotary movement in Nepal was started over 60 years ago when the first Rotary club of Kathmandu was chartered on April 13, 1959. Nepal got a separate Rotary District only on July 1, 2008. Since then, Rotary movement in Nepal has gained momentum, with a substantial increase in the number of clubs (from 67 to 125), membership (from 1,902 to 5,047 in May 1, 2020), service projects to benefit the community and also has contributed significantly to the Rotary Foundation (\$2.1 million, second highest in South Asia). Rotary District 3292 has earned title of one of the top Districts in the Rotary world.

In order to achieve the strategic priorities and the goals of RI District 3292, the District has formed a Team of 45 Committees, 38 Sub Committees, nominated 29 Assistant Governors plus Regional Coordinators, Advisory Council, Administrative Council, Council of Governors with Rotary Leaders and a secretariat in order to “support and strengthen clubs”.

The District team is increasing in number of leaders, up to 827 members, who are actively engaged to strengthen the Rotary clubs in the District.

3. How to make a Rotary Clubs Effective?

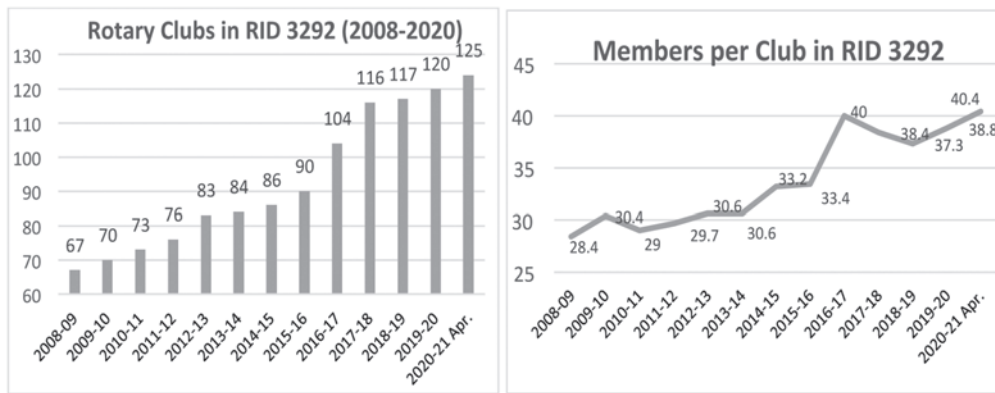
There are four indicators of an effective Rotary clubs:

1. Sustain and increase club members,
2. Implement successful service projects in their own communities and in other countries,
3. Support the Rotary Foundation, both financially and through program participation,
4. Develop leaders capable of serving in Rotary beyond club level.

In this pursuit, each Rotary club should try to increase the membership base, undertake service projects, participate in the Rotary Foundation activities and develop leadership. If the clubs are more effective in achieving their annual goals and objectives, the Rotary District and the Rotary International as a whole will be more effective in achieving the "Object of Rotary," which is "to encourage and foster the ideals of service as a basis of worthy enterprise".

4. How Strong Are the Clubs in RI District 3292?

Rotary clubs in the District has almost doubled from 67 clubs in July 2008 to 125 clubs, and the number of members has more than doubled, from 1,902 to 5,047. The clubs are getting healthier as the average members has increased from 28.4 to 40.4 per club:



The RI District 3292 is getting stronger in terms of clubs and the members in the Rotary world. However, not all clubs are as strong. In terms of membership, clubs with only 25 members or less had been gradually declining, from 31 clubs in July 2014 to 14 clubs in July 2019. But by April 30, 2020 the number of such clubs have gone up to 23. These clubs are termed to require District support for strengthening.

Rotary is a membership based organization. So, motivating and activating the members is always a challenge to make the clubs more effective for greater success of Rotary movement. More member means more hands and more brains to serve the community. Membership is thus the main concern in Rotary, both in terms of number and quality of members in the club.

5. District Support & Strengthening Committee

7. Conclusion

Year Review RY 2019-20

In Rota Year 2019-20, Rotaract Club of Patan carried the theme 'Synergy'. The main objective of the theme was to bring together the team and create a similar tuning among all to make our works and plan effective.

Club Vision

To increase membership for strong and professional administrative practice in the club through projects that help enhance Rotary public image.

Club Goals

1. 10% increase in membership.
2. Proper project management practice.
3. Encourage fellowships.

Major activities

A. Club Service: This year, Club Service Avenue had member increment plan of 10%. We inducted a total of 5 members this year. The events done in this avenue are as follows:

1. **Club COTS (13-07-2019):** Rotaract Club of Patan conducted internal club COTS facilitated by Vice-President Rtr. Rujen Shakya and Club Trainer Rtr. Susmita Baskota.
2. **23rd Installation Ceremony (03-08-2019):** the 23rd Installation ceremony was conducted at Grand Academy, Lagankhel in presence of Chief Guest PDG Rtn. Tirtha Man Shakya, Rotary Club of Patan President Rtn. Lalita Thapa and Youth Service Chair Rtn. Siba Bhakta Rajbhandary.
3. **Jigrees at 8 degrees (31-08-2019):** Jigrees at 8 Degrees was a celebration of friendship where we had a presence of more than 100 Rotaractors and Guests. This celebration is done annually jointly with Rotaract Club of Himalaya Patan, Jawalakhel Manjushree, Patan and Patan South. This year it was celebrated at 8 Degrees, Jhamsikhel.
4. **Good Morning Tea Party (05-10-2019):** To exchange Dashain greetings and to extend good wishes to

the fellow Rotaractors and friends, Rotaract Club organizes Good Morning Tea Party annually bringing together Rotaractors, Rotarians and friends to extend fellowship and to enjoy music marking the start of Dashain. It was started in Rotary Year 2004-05 and has been celebrated ever since with all our club members and Rotary Club of Patan.

5. **Coffee Gig (26-10-2019):** Coffee Gig is an initiation of Rotaract Club of Mahabouddha and as the partnership continuation of last year, this year too it was conducted jointly with Rotaract Club of Kasthamandap and Patan.

B. Community Service: This year, Community Service Avenue of the club was mainly focused on partnerships and collaboration. The events organized under this avenue were:

1. **Teej Health Camp (02-09-2019):** This camp has been an annual event for the past 4 years where we setup a health camp at Bangalamukhi Temple on the day of Teej to provide medical support to the devotees fasting on the day of Teej. The event is done jointly with Nidan Hospital every year.

C. International Service: International Service Avenue this year was focused on more international collaborations. The activities conducted under this avenue are:

1. **Senior Citizen's Day (16-08-2019):** This project was initiated by Rotaract Club of Ambarnath East, RID 3142 to celebrate the day to honor our senior citizens of the society. We celebrated it at Ni: Sahaya Kendra, Shantinagar.
2. **World Peace Day (21-09-2019):** This event is conducted every year since 2012 by Rotaract Club of Patan to spread the message of Peace. This year we had the theme climate action for peace where we displayed charts showing how climate conditions are deteriorating every day.
3. **IDYEP hosting (16 to 22-10-2019):** Rotaract Club of Patan jointly with Rotaract Club of Himalaya Patan hosted 4 rotaractors from RID 3080 Chandigarh for 7 days and showed them around the valley as a part of Youth Exchange Program.
4. **International Twin Formation (13-03-2020):** We celebrated the Rotaract Day by signing a MOU with Rotaract Club of Vidhyaranyapura, RID 3190 Bangalore.
5. **Recipe Exchange (26-04 to 10-05-2020):** Rotaract Club of Patan conducted virtual recipe exchange program with twin club Rotaract Club of Vidhyaranyapura through social media platform Facebook. A total of 10 recipes were exchanged in this program.

Professional Development: This year Professional Development Avenue focused on personal growth of members but due to pandemic and lockdown, many scheduled programs were cancelled. The program conducted under this avenue were:

Rtn. Tunji Funsho one of TIME's 100 most influential people in the World

Dr. Tunji Funsho, chair of Rotary's Nigeria National Polio-Plus Committee, joins 100 pioneers, artists, leaders, icons, and titans as one of TIME's 100 Most Influential People. TIME announced its 2020 honorees during a 22 September television broadcast on ABC, recognizing Funsho for his instrumental leadership and work with Rotary members and partners to achieve the eradication of wild polio in the African region.

He is the first Rotary member to receive this honor for work toward eradicating polio.

A Rotarian for 35 years, Funsho is a member of the Rotary Club of Lekki, Nigeria, past governor of District 9110, and serves on Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. Funsho is a cardiologist and a fellow of the Royal College of Physicians of London. He lives in Lagos, Nigeria with his wife Aisha. They have four children; Habeeb, Kike, Abdullahi and Fatima; and five grandchildren.

TIME 100 comprises individuals whose leadership, talent, discoveries, and philanthropy have made a difference in the world. Past honorees include Bono, the Dalai Lama, Bill Gates, Nelson Mandela, Angela Merkel, Oprah Winfrey, and Malala Yousafzai. "I'm honored to be recognized by TIME for my part in ensuring that no child in Africa will ever again be paralyzed by wild polio, a disease that once disabled 75,000 African children every single year," said Funsho. "Eradicating the wild poliovirus in Africa was a team effort that required cooperation and dedication of governments, partners, Rotary members, hundreds of thousands of health workers, and countless parents who chose to have their children vaccinated against polio."

As the chair of Rotary's Nigeria National PolioPlus Committee, since 2013 Funsho has led PolioPlus efforts in the country, building upon the work of his predecessors. He has worked alongside Rotarians in Nigeria to raise awareness about the importance of polio immunization, encouraged governments and public figures to support polio eradication, and served as a vocal leader and

advocate for Rotary and its fight to end polio. He works closely with the Global Polio Eradication Initiative partner organizations: the World Health Organization (WHO), UNICEF, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance.

As a member of Nigeria's Presidential Task Force on Polio, he has coordinated immunizations and advocacy campaigns with the Minister of State for Health and the Inter-Agency Coordination Committee for Polio Eradication. He has also worked closely with the Sir Emeka Ofor Foundation, the Dangote Foundation, the Traditional Leaders Council and the Federation of Muslim Women's Association of Nigeria.

In August 2019, Nigeria reached three years without a case of wild poliovirus. Nigeria's progress, led by Rotary, its partners and local and national governments, was the result of decades of sustained efforts, including domestic and international financing, the commitment of hundreds of thousands of health workers, and innovative strategies to immunize children who previously couldn't be reached due to insecurity in the country's northern states. On 25 August, the African region was certified wild polio-free. This historic announcement means that five of the WHO's six regions, representing more than 90 percent of the world's population, are now free of the wild poliovirus. The virus is still endemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

With Africa's milestone, Rotary and its partners took a major step forward toward their goal of global eradication. Funsho told TIME magazine of the achievement: "The polio eradication program in Nigeria has gone through some difficult times, but I never once doubted that this day would come. Any time that we've experienced a setback, Rotary and our partners have been able to find solutions and develop strategies for reaching vulnerable children." He added: "One thing I know for certain, is if Nigeria could eliminate the wild poliovirus, any country can eliminate it."

First woman confirmed as Rotary president-nominee

EVANSTON, Ill. (October 1, 2020) - Jennifer Jones, member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, will become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the service organization's 115-year existence.

As Jones looks ahead to her presidential term, she confirms that she's prepared to take on existing and new challenges as society continues to evolve at a rapid pace, and like Rotary presidents before her, is eager to set Rotary on course for a robust and vibrant future. Jennifer is the Founder and President of Media Street Productions Inc., a twenty-five-year old, award-winning media company in

Windsor, Ontario. Jennifer has strengthened Rotary's reach and impact through her service in many roles including as Trustee of the Rotary Foundation, RI Vice President, and co-chair of the End Polio Now: Make History Today campaign. As a professional communicator, Jennifer also used her vocational strength to chair the advisory group that crafted Rotary's rebranding effort. She has received many honors and recognitions including Rotary's Service Above Self Award and the Citation for Meritorious Service, the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award – a first for a Canadian. Jennifer is married to Rotarian Nick Krayacich, a family physician.
