Carlo Ravizza was the owner of an architectural firm that bears his name, specializing in the design of industrial complexes and office buildings on an international scale. He is also an industrial and financial consultant to companies in Italy and Switzerland. Born in Milan, he is a graduate of Milan University, where he studied civil engineering.

Mr. Ravizza has been a member of the Board of Italian Engineers Association, a member of the Swiss Engineers and Architects Association and has been twice honoured by Germany for his outstanding work in planning public facilities and industrial plants.

Through Rotary, Mr. Ravizza has worked to improve the quality of life of people around the world. In 1996, he led a mission to northern Kenya to chronicle Rotary's efforts to immunize children in nomadic tribes against polio. The mission is an example of his ongoing leadership for Rotary's PolioPlus program to help eradicate polio by the year 2000. He was one of the first leaders of Rotary's World Community Service programme to link industrialized nations' resources to needs in developing countries. From 1986 to 1988 he chaired four Rotary International Conferences for Development—in Bangladesh, France, the Philippines, and Zimbabwe. In addition, he has represented Rotary International at world summits addressing major global issues, such as housing and hunger.

A Rotarian since 1971, he is a charter member and past president of the Rotary Club of Milano Sud-Ovest, Italy. He has been district governor, an advisory group member, presidential information counsellor and member and chairman of numerous committees. Most recently Mr. Ravizza was chairman of the 1997 International Assembly Committee and has served Rotary international as a vice-president, a director and as a trustee of The Rotary Foundation for his support of its international humanitarian and educational programmes, and a Citation for Service to the Foundation's Polio Plus Campaign.

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

One of the greatest challenges Rotary will face in the 21st century is membership growth. Throughout the 1990s Rotary International experienced a decline in membership in existing clubs. Yet we were able to maintain annual net growth because of our extension activities in Asia, Eastern Europe, and other areas. In 1997 – 98, however, we saw the first net decrease in membership, it was a small amount – only 1 percent – but it serves as a warning signal for the future.

The rapid extension of Rotary over the past decade has slowed us to avoid some difficult questions about the direction our organization is taking. Given the high turnover rate that is occurring in many new clubs, however, it is becoming apparent that extension is not a panacea for growth. Resolving our membership issues may force us to make some hard choices, but I am convinced the Rotary will emerge from this process a stronger and more vital organization. In the year 1999 – 2000, therefore we will concentrate on strengthening existing clubs, addressing the problems that impede membership retention and growth.

For Rotary to thrive in the new millennium, we do not simply need more dues paying members, we need more Rotarian – men and women who are fully committed to serving their local communities and the world community. We also need to put more Rotary into our clubs, imbuing them with the unifying spirit of service and fellowship that has fueled our work for almost a century. I believe we can achieve these goals if we Act with Consistency, Credibility and Continuity.

With your commitment to consistency, credibility, and continuity, I am certain that Rotary 2000 will be a time of great progress of our organization. It will be the year that all members become true Rotarian and the spirit of service and fellowship radiates through all Rotary Clubs.

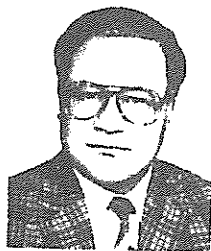


Message from President of Rotary Club of Patan

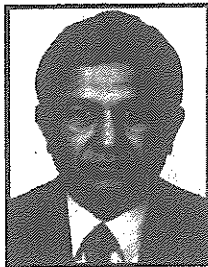

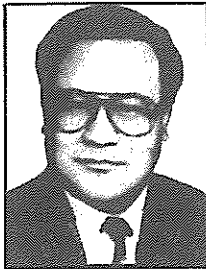
I am very much hopeful, my successor will provide leadership for the continuation and expansion for the rotary programs and activities in the year to come. I wish for success.

ACT WITH CONSISTENCY, CREDIBILITY, CONTINUITY

One the eve of a new century, our Thoughts naturally turn to the future. We ask ourselves: Where is Rotary going? Is our Organization fully prepared to enter the 21st century? What direction should we take to become stronger and more effective?

The answers to these questions lie in the past and, even more so, in the present. The future is not an autonomous state, but one that we are constantly creating through the choices we make and the actions we take today. Let us begin now to ensure Rotary's success in the 21st Century by applying the criteria of consistency, credibility, and continuity to all our actions and decisions.

CONSISTENCY requires that individuals adhere to their core beliefs and allow these basic principles to guide their actions. Rotary's mission is service, and for 94 years followed its ideas. Even as the world and our organization has changed so dramatically, our dedication to humanitarian service and international understanding has seen grown even stronger. At the same time, however we have seen how consistency with our mission in today's world demands new approaches and ideas. To remain consistent to the ideals of Rotary in the 21st century will require not only commitment to our founding principles but also the willingness and ability to change and grow.

CREDIBILITY means acting with honor in all our dealings in our families, our businesses and professions, our clubs, and our communities, people believe in what Rotary does when Rotarians demonstrate their integrity and set an example of high ethical standards. Today, Rotary intentional stands at its highest level of credibility because Rotarians have proven their commitment to humanitarian service through PolioPlus. In the same way, each club will gain and maintain credibility in its community if all members always exemplify in their daily lives the ideals that Rotary espouses.

CONTINUITY is essential to an organization in which the leadership changes annually. If each new team of leader were to revamp a club or district program every year, little would be accomplished in the long run. But continuity requires a certain amount of humility and generosity. It asks incoming leaders to meet those goals that have already been established before beginning a new project. Therefore, they need to defer their own plans and ideas until those of their predecessors have been fully developed.

The same criteria hold true at international level. For Rotary International in the year 1999 – 2000, Continuity will mean running the final leg of the race against polio; it will mean working within the existing framework of programs to prepare for service in the 21st century; and it will mean continuing our efforts to create a world in which all human beings live in peace and dignity, surrounded by tolerance and solidarity.

Rotary 2000 is a time for consolidating the best of our past and present, while keeping our eyes fixed on the future and the challenges it will present. And there will be no shortage of those. Today's global outlook for the coming century lists the growing gap in living standards between rich and poor, increasing violence, population growth, food distribution, globalization vs. regionalism and fragmentation, environmental deterioration, and loss of cultural values as just some of the problems we will face. On the positive side, futurists cite the advent of even faster and different communications system, new sources of energies, and genetically based productions among the advances that will improve life in the 21st century.

Clearly, we are moving towards a future that will be characterized at once by desperate needs and vast potential. We Rotarians are especially we positioned to serve as bridge between the problems and the possibilities. We have a strong presence in nations that are technology – rich as well as in countries that can barely meet even the most basic human needs. Let us use that presence and the unique perspective in affords us to create the vibrant spirit of Rotary 2000 and extend it to every part of the globe.

Rotary 2000 is a forward – looking spirit, but one that is grounded in the best traditions of our rich past. It is a spirit of service and fellowship. It is a spirit of international understanding. It is a spirit of tolerance and solidarity. It is a spirit which must originate in the hearts of individual Rotarians and radiate outward filling our clubs and districts. It is a spirit, which must spread into the world beyond. It is a powerful spirit that will enable us all to work together, and it will advance the goals of Rotary around the globe. **ROTARY 2000: ACT WITH CONSISTENCY,
CREDIBILITY, CONTINUITY**

A BRIEF HISTORY OF ROTARY

The first Rotary club in the world was organized in Chicago, Illinois, U.S.A., on 23 February, 1905, by Paul P. Harris, a young lawyer, who gathered together in a spirit of friendship and understanding a group of men, each of whom was engaged in a different form of service to the public. That basis for membership – one person from each business and profession in the community – still exists in Rotary. At first, the members of the new club met in rotation at their various places of business, and this suggested the name “Rotary.”

Since 1905, the ideas of Paul Harris and his friends have become ideals which have been accepted by people of practically all nationalities, and of many political and religious beliefs. Today there are Rotary clubs in Austria and America Samoa, in Brazil and Brunei, in India and Italy, Scotland and South Africa – in 160 countries and 36 geographical regions. The universal acceptance of Rotary principles has been so great that there are now more than 29,300 Rotary clubs, which have a membership of about 1,200,000.

The general objectives of Rotary clubs in every country are the same – the development of fellowship and understanding among the business and professional leaders in the community, the promotion of community – betterment endeavors and of high standards in business and professional practices, and the advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace. Rotary clubs everywhere have one basic ideal – the “Ideal of Service,” which is thoughtfulness of and helpfulness to others.

DEFINITION OF ROTARY

Rotary is an organization of business and professional persons united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage his ethical standards in all vocations and help build good will and peace in the world." Those 31 words are worth remembering when someone asks, "What is a Rotary club?"

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

First:

The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

Second:

High ethical standards in business and professions: the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

Third:

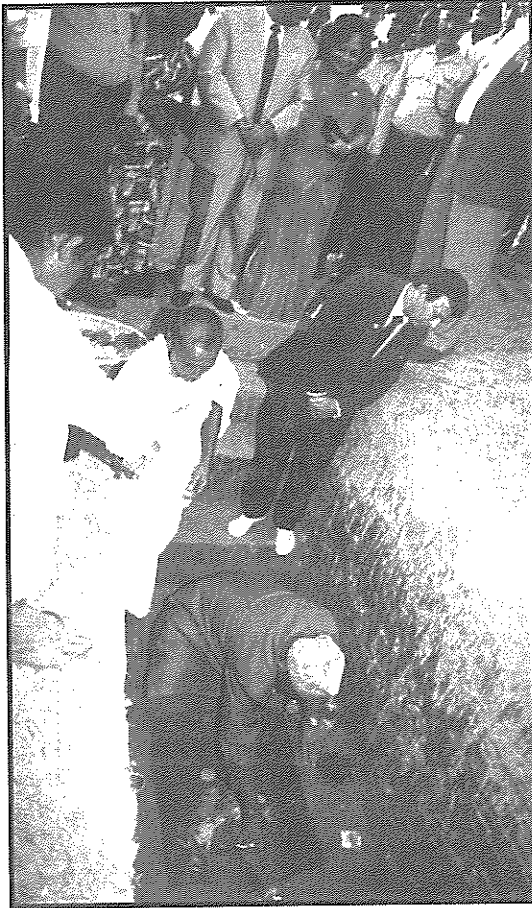
The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

Fourth:

The advancement of international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

REPORTS OF ROTARY YEAR 1998 – 1999

Rotary Club of Patan, since its inception, has been playing a memorable role for the up-lift-ment of the people of Lalitpur, Nepal. The Rotarians, despite their busy schedule, have successfully implemented the various activities in various years undertaken by the BOD of Rotary Club of Patan. To acknowledge with its activities to the common people, a brief report is produced here. It is earnestly hoped, the readers will be able to attain maximum information about the activities of Rotary Club of Patan in 1998/99.

1. Club Service:

2. A. Attendance – 80%

B. Meetings – Rotary Club of Patan held 2 Club Assembly, instituted 12 Board of Meetings and 50 regular meetings.

The Rotary Club of Patan has instituted following club

service meeting, according to the efforts of Rotary members we have been able to increase one member in this period. A District Conference was held in the beginning of the year. The Rotary Club of Patan has been regularly publishing its weekly Bulletin "Lalitdhar" for the benefit of its readers. Guest speakers and classification talk programs were regularly conducted as per schedule.

Vocational Service:

Regarding Vocational Service the Rotary Club of Patan provided training & vocational awards as well.

Training:

The training was given on sewing & stitching works, according to which 35 village women were benefited on sewing and stitching and 35 in knitting. In this way altogether 70 villagers were benefited with the training program. The training was conducted for 6 months.

Vocational:

On Vocational award side, two women trainers were trained in the field on sewing, stitching & knitting. On the male side three boys were trained in the field of cooking. The program was launched at Hotel Narayani Safari in Chitwan.

- a) Contribution was also made to the trainers in fabric and woolen yarn, in Dukuchhap village. The training and awards have been instituted keeping in view of the requirement of the places. The training only is not perfect. The trainees are so poor, that they can not afford the machines to buy with their own capital. Thus Rotary Club of Patan in order to uplift their livelihood provided 5 sewing machines to trainees in Dukuchhap and also provided the needles to the trainees of Dukuchhap.
- b) Rs. 25000.00 was provided to purchase woolen yarn to Pancha Kumari Woman Club in Baneshwor for the income generating benefit to the poor woman.
- c) Vocational Award: Miss Surya Bajracharya has been awarded Vocational Award for the uplift of stone carving. Award Carriage Rs. 5000/-

3. Community Service:

In regard to the Community Service, the Rotary Club

of Patan instituted following programs.
The programs are as follows:

1. Health Care, 2. Sight preservation, 3. Literacy program, 4. Mother and Child care, 5. Community Service, 6. Senior Citizen Home, 7. Low Cost Housing etc.

A. Health Care Camp: A camp for the general health check up of different people of different sector was instituted in Dukuchhap where about 560 people got checked up. During the field study, the Rotary Club of Patan felt to initiate eye cataract operation program as well. After having detail survey the Rotary Club of Patan has decided to launch as extra program for the treatment of eye patients possibly in the month of May end.

B. Sight Preservation: Rotary Club of Patan as being pioneer in preservation on culture of historic temple Krishna Mandir, has contributed Rs. 15000.00. Now the temple, after preservation works, looks like as before. Certainly the Rotary Club of Patan has won the hearts of the people of Patan and Archaeologists.

C. Literacy Program: Regarding the functioning of literacy program, the Rotary Club of Patan has provided scholarships to the needy people. This has been a regular program. The targets have been met totaling 142 students for this year. Further program has been installed to reach the target of 200, boys and girls, by 1999.

D. Mother and Childcare: The increased quantity of healthy mother and child is an asset for the country. All organizations involved in the mother and childcare program has been doing their best. In the same way the Rotary Club of Patan has also doing much to provide health measures to mother and child within its approach. Under this program the Rotary Club of Patan has been instituting health check up centers to mothers and child. Not only the facility of check up but also the medicines have been providing by the Rotary Club of Patan freely in Dukuchhap village.

E. Under this program, some less privileged groups have been selected in order to activate the income generation program. Under this program the Rotary Club of Patan has been able to provide vegetable seeds and ginger seeds to the villagers of Dukuchhap to plant to their small land. The Dukuchhap village has been adopted as Rotary village.

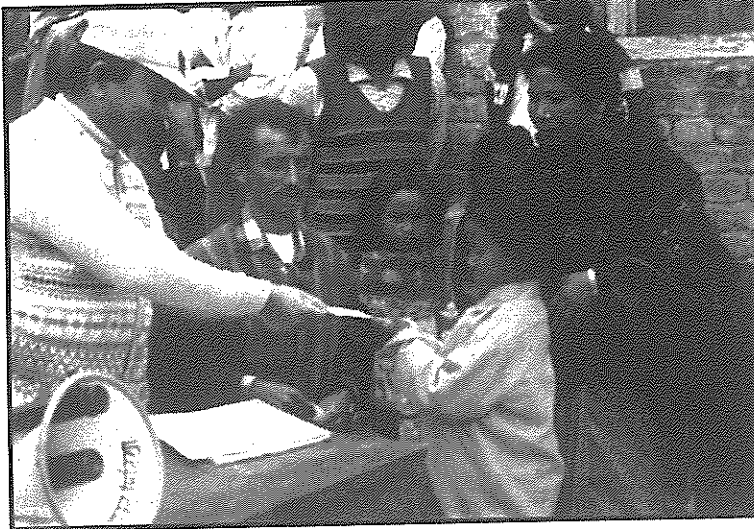
F. Cloth was also distributed to 200 poor children of Dukuchhap.

G. To educate the poor children of Dukuchhap and the different districts of Nepal, the Rotary Club of Patan has provided 142 scholarships for 142 students, which includes 22 scholarships of Dukuchhap also.

H. In order to acquaint with the industrial development to the people of Dukuchhap the Rotary Club of Patan also initiated to establish a Rice Mill in Dukuchhap. Likewise Bamboo and

fruits plantation also initiated in Dukuchhap. To facilitate Dukuchhap in the field of communication, a VHF telephone connection is initiated.

- I. Besides these activities, the Rotary Club of Patan with the help of 2 French doctors provided health services at Khotang District Health Post. A financial support to buy food in Humla for female area of Humals was provided.
- J. To give support to the old age, people, the Rotary Club of Patan has started to construct a Senior Citizen Home, in Godawari, the best work ever started by any such social organization in Nepal. After completion of detail design, 50% construction of the Home has already been completed.
- K. Besides all these activities this Club is continuously supporting to the Cancer Hospital in Bhaktapur and Orthopedic Hospital in Jorpati.

4. International Service:

Regarding International Services, the Rotary Club of Patan has instituted following programs,

- A. The Rotary Club of Patan has supported for Polio plus programs in two times almost all Rotarian were involved.
- B. It also hosted GSE of which two team members from U.K. District.
- C. It also conducted a seminar on

human rights in which the President representative of World Bank, UNDP were also invited to deliver speeches on that occasion. Similarly other personalities were also invited on that occasion. A lecture program on Y2K was also conducted in order to acknowledge the problems of Y2K to the concerned sector.

5. Service to the New Generation, interact/rotaract:

Under the quotation Children are the future stars of the Nation, the Rotary Club of Patan has instituted programs like interact, rotaract and RVC in order to create national feelings among new generation. We recommended Rotract Club of Patan for the best award for their work that they have conducted a cooperative saving and credit scheme to the poorest women in Mangal Bazar area in Patan. The RVC Dukuchhap is established in this year which is able to work for the village people in different subjects.

6. Program for Children:

For young people, the attention has been given to the children. They should be brought up to an amicable environment. The Rotary Club of Patan has been giving attention to create amicable environment within the society by providing health and education opportunities for such young people.

7. District Assembly

PDG Rtn. Jagadish S. Rana has participated in the district conference in Calcutta from Rotary Club of Patan.

REPORT ON ACTIVITIES OF CLUB SERVICE 1998-1999

As a club director of Patan Rotary Club, I hereby present a report on the activities undertaken during the year 1998-1999.

The purpose of club service is to foster the successful administration of Rotary Club. Members do this by regularly attending meetings, sponsoring new members, participation in club fellowship, taking part in programs, serving on committees and on the Club's Board of Directors and representing the club in outside activities.

With this aim the 13th Installation Ceremony of Patan Rotary Club had been arranged in a very grand manner on 25th July 1998 and the Chief Guest of the function happened to be the Finance Minister of His Majesty's Government of Nepal Dr. Ram Sharan Mahat.

On that auspicious occasion, the Rotary Club of Patan had decorated Mrs. Rinjay Rai as the most dedicated and the senior nurse of Patan for the year 1997-1998 and in appreciation of her work she had been awarded with vocational award along with Rs. 5000/- in cash.

During this period we hosted eight guest speakers and eight classification talks. The Board Meetings were conducted regularly and until now we have hosted 12 (twelve) Board Meetings mostly followed by either by breakfast or dinner at the residence of different Board Members. This is done in order to create more awareness about Rotary with other family members of the Rotarians. This innovation helped a lot in motivation such members to participate in Rotarian activities and gaining their support.

In the Board meeting the discussion and decision were focused on the club calendar and programs and projects undertaken by the club mainly education fund, Santi Griha and the undertaking of Dukuchhap Village Project in the field of agriculture, education, health and low cost shelter development. It also had given special importance for strengthening fiscal management including timely collection of dues, remaintenance to RI, monitoring budgetary provision, income and expenditure. It also had given emphasis to activate the Director, Communities and members for strengthening club activities.

The Prime Minister of Nepal had been invited for the laying foundation of the construction of Senior Citizen Home

and Girls Hostel Project undertaken by this club at Godawari on 13th Oct. 1998. But because of unavoidable circumstances, the Minister of Forest on his behalf laid the foundation stone in a grand ceremony attended by most of the members of the Kathmandu and Patan Rotary Club and hundreds of local villagers and school children. The civil work construction of the project is going on full swing and hope it will be finished within specific time.

A total of 50 meetings were held until now. The average club attendance was 80% out of which 19 Rotarians had 80% attendance and 13 Rotaries had achieved 100% attendance during this period.

This club has 4 club meetings in a month generally consisted of 1 business meeting, 1 speech by a guest speaker, 1 talk program on classification and another on club activities including club assembly

During this period we have the opportunity to welcome altogether 30 foreign Rotarian distinguished guests and 5 non Rotarian guests to address the regular club meetings, 8 (eight) Rotarians had shed light on their classifications.

In order to achieve the plan of membership growth, we had already two new members, who had recently been retired from International Job and two highly respected businessman and our consultant in this club.

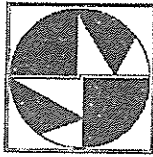

ACTIVITIES UNDER "INTERNATIONAL SERVICES" DURING THE PERIOD 1998 - 1999

1) Senior Citizen Home and Girl's Hostel

30 October 1998 was an eventful day for Rotary Club of Patan. On that day in the afternoon, Hon'ble Minister of Forestry and Soil Conservation, Mr. Anand Dhungana, laid the foundation stones of the Senior Citizen Home Complex. This complex of the senior citizen home or girl's hostel is planned to be completed in 3 phases. In the first phase 16 beds for senior citizen together with kitchen and security guards station are planned for which Rotary club of Hilfe, Federal Republic of Germany has contributed DM 200,000. The total expenditure for the whole complex is estimated to cost Nepal Rupees five crores fifty lacs and ninety thousand

2) Medical volunteer service for Khotang District Hospital - from France.

2 volunteers (one general surgeon with Maxillo-facial specialty and his assistant Dr. Jacques Dechamboux and Ms. Claire Lamotte from France have agreed to work in the hospital from September 1998 to March 1999. For these services, they will be provided with free accommodation and food only. This has been initiated by Rtn. Mr. Madan Rai.

3) Adult Orthopedic Hospital at Jorpati

This 16 bedded hospital building was completed in 1994 with assistance from Rotarian Clubs in RI District 7090, RCP and Nepal Disabled Association. Due to resource constraints, there was delay in procurement of required equipment. Now the hospital has started functioning under the leadership of Dr. Anil Shrestha and his team.

4) Polio Plus

As in the previous years, His Majesty's Government has declared December 7th and 19, to be polio plus days in the country. The Rotary Polio plus committee met on 24th October to discuss the plans for its implementation under the chairmanship of Rtn Dr. Gajendra Jha.

5) Nepal Cancer Care 3H Project

This project includes a well women clinic project for screening for cancer with Pap smear. The Aberdeen Royal infirmary, UK is also involved in the training of doctors and nurses for their project. A new Cobalt Radiotherapy machine has been procured with the fund provided by Rotary International with the grant of \$353,025. This machine has already been received by the Bhaktapur Hospital Cancer unit built but under this project and is expected to be installed by the technician who have arrived here. The project was initiated by Rtn. Dr. Bibek Pradhan of Mansfield Rotary Club, U.K.

6) One day health camp in Dukuchhap village

A health camp was organized for one day in the above village on Feb. 1999. Nearly five hundred men, women & children were examined and given medicine and treatment. 4 Gynecologists, 2 Pediatrician, 1 Surgeon, 1 E.N.T Specialist, 1 Eye Specialist and 2 Physicians participated in the camp. Nearly 60 cases of cataract were identified for whom future plans for operation is being arranged.

7) The Singapore R.I. Convention

The Singapore R.I. Convention was attended by 8 Rotarian from Rotary Club of Patan and their families from June 13 to 16.

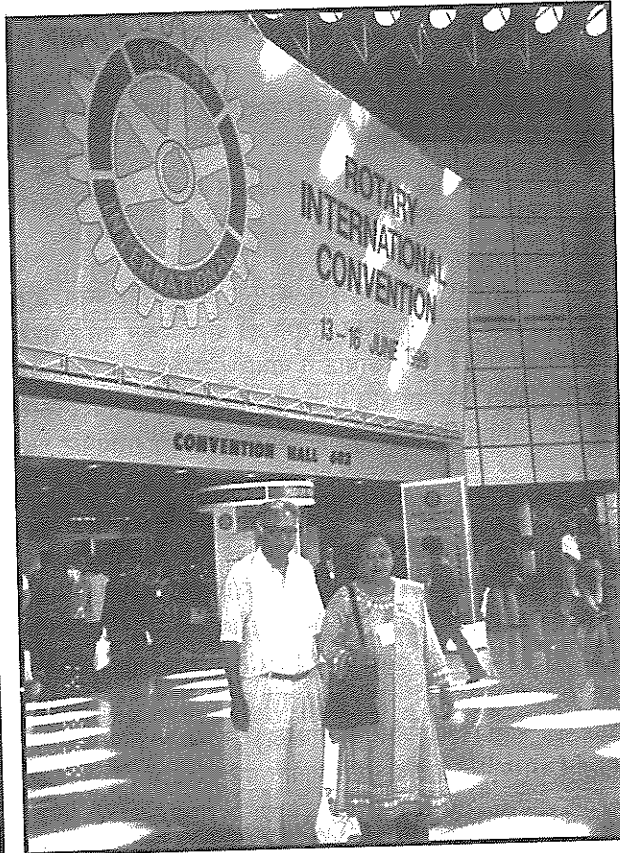

NEPAL ROTARY DISTRICT IS AN ACHIEVABLE GOAL

We are lucky that Rotary clubs in Nepal are in R.I. District 3290. The eldest club in this SAARC subcontinent in this district, Calcutta is the closest commercial city outside Nepal, with which Nepal has a long lasting relation. During the period of hibernation, our clubs got sympathetic treatment from Calcutta office & Bengali District Governor and today among the R. I. Officers & many other Rotarians from the southern of our district are not only fond of Nepal clubs but also are doing their best to see Rotary flourish in Nepal.

But the Bengal part & Nepal part of our District are divided by both time & space however intense may be their desire, Nepal Rotarians can not fully share the fellowship and service activities with the largest part of our District, nor can the Calcutta Rotarians fully share our ecstasies and

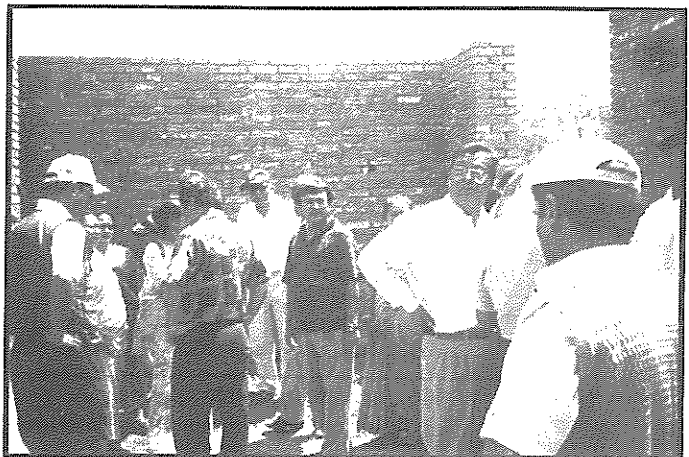
agonies. We have had very capable well meaning and Nepal loving District governors all along, but due to the distance, they can not do their best in running this part of the District. Now that Nepal has already more than a score of clubs within the country and it has hosted many District conference, R.I. Officers' institute & R. I. Regional conference, Rotary has not only come to stay in Nepal but also started playing small but significant role in this remote country. For the proper development & growth of Rotary movement and for the qualitative & growth of Rotary movement and for the qualitative organization and effective administrative of clubs, it is high time that clubs of this small country should have the benefits of being a district on its own right & not only remain an appendix to a larger part, more than 500 miles away from the Nepal Clubs.

It is surprising to note how fast we have been moving the goal 'Nepal Rotary District with few years recant but to catch the goal we have yet to achieve some targets. Any one who turns the pages of the Manual of Rotary can know the new R. I. Resolution of trying to have lesser number of Districts by increasing the per-requisite number of clubs to 50 and the number of Rotarians to 800 members to form a new District. This goal is achievable, but even to bring forward the argument of 'Special considerations', we must not deviate from the level set lay 'us'-that is of 1200 members and 30 clubs. Are we doing enough in this respect? Would we reach the goal of 30 clubs in 2000. Have extension been taken up seriously by all the older clubs? Have they approached the extension chairman & discussed their programs with him? Are each club seriously thinking on internal extension or membership growth. To reach a goal all must exist & that too seriously & continuously.



In my opinion, only number of clubs & members, cannot make a district, it is number of Rotarians that is needed. Member, with knowledge of Rotary, with experience of working in the Rotary way & with enthusiasm to serve. In Rotary also, as in other field the withdrawal syndrome' appears at times. Leaders of their vacation, who join Rotary may at times feel that they have landed in a completely different situation. From their respective business where they have been used to 'joy of getting' they land in an organization where the 'joy is of going'. A 'Leader' in their respective vocations find themselves in a world of 'equals'. Those who have in their professions as leaders, been finding faults & correcting, come to an association where 'one has to magnify the virtues of others & work together. As a Rotarian one has to give time, efforts and also money and that too may be 'till it hurts'. All these factors may at times drive members of Rotary Clubs to the brink of withdrawal. But then by design or by chance, if they get involved in a programs or project of Rotary & get the taste of 'Service above Self,' their withdrawal symptoms vanish & slowly but surely their whole attitude to like and love for mankind take a new form. A drop of water they may be in the ocean of selfishness, but the identity of a clean & pure drop of water in not easy to achieve.

This on the philosophic side. But on the other side, after assimilating members into the main stream of Rotary, if we want to have a Nepal Rotary District, which in my opinion is already taking practical shape & is ready to be born (though christening may be decided by high priests of Rotary) we must have leaders to run the clubs & to run the District. We need more knowledgable Rotarians. And there are



only two source to in like the knowledge of Rotary

- i) By reading Rotary Literature.
- ii) By seriously involving yourself in the working of Rotary.

As for as imbibing Knowledge from 'Rotary Literate is concerned, I am sending a small list of Rotary literature to be presented to new members of newly inducted members. I am also sending a selected list of Rotary Literature for the club readers & Rotarians who want to know more. Apart from that ' The Rotary News' which our Rotarians pay for, MUST be read,

at least browsed over. A club that does not posses, even a set of Rotary Basic Library, can not, in my opinion be a complete club.

Now for involving yourself in Rotary, each year Rotary comes up with new thrust area programs, each year every Rotarian gets a new assignment, may be in your club's committee, in the board of your club, in District office or district committees. These are opportunities, (one in no way lesser than the other) where you can work and imbibe experience. One may face problems of non-response, lack of resources, no-cooperation etc., but these are problems, which each members face in his own vocation also. To surmount the obstacles achieve excellence should be the goal, and believe it, once you achieve your goal, all withdrawal syndrome vanish

In this way the saying 'let thousand flowers bloom' would be true to our organization and the birth of a Nepal Rotary District would not remain merely a vision without action, which is hallucination. We shall achieve our goal.

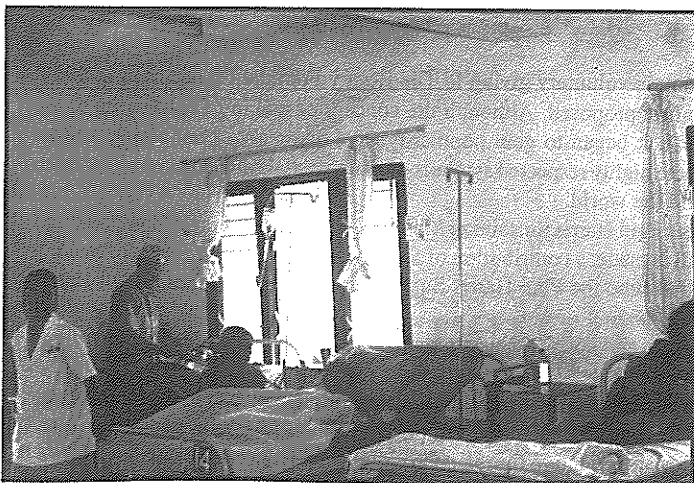

NEPAL ORTHOPEDIC HOSPITAL AN EVOLVING INSTITUTE

It is a dream come true—the dream of starting a charitable hospital cherished by Nepal Disabled Association. It took the association years of relentless and painstaking efforts to enlist the support of noteworthy people and clubs to convince them to act towards fulfilling this dream. The initiative was taken by Patan Rotary Club for establishing a complex suitable for the hospital within the premises of Khagendra New Life Center. The role-played by the then member of the Rotary club, Rotarian Late Mr. Nanda Ram Bhakta Mathema towards this end is laudable and to be cherished.

With an edifice suitable for running a hospital of the kind there still was an acute problem. Hospital beds, testing equipment, furniture were still there to be procured in so that the hospital should start functioning. Fulfillment of these requirements involved a huge amount of money posing a major problem.



Worthy of special mention is the pivotal role played by Dr. Anil Shrestha in his campaign to raise funds, he made trips to foreign countries such as Belgium and Germany especially for this purpose. His contact with Mr. Luc Salens a Rotarian of Belgium, a godsend, so to say, did everything playing a catalytic role. Mr. Salens had been kind enough to procure donation worth US\$32,000 that helped to meet the problem of fulfilling the basic equipment to run the hospital. Then followed a donation worth US\$12,800 arranged by Rotarian Mr. Jim Sinclair of USA making available twenty new beds and office furniture to start the hospital function.

With the invaluable collections made by Dr. Anil Shrestha the hospital started functioning from 7th August 1998 thus turning into reality the dream cherished by Nepal Disabled Association and those actively involved in the project.

The hospital came into operation by running a Free Orthopedic Camp. A significant number of patients

received services during this period. Free distribution of medicines and appliances were made. The camp lasted for five days. Then followed the



Other activities included a blood donation program on International Disabled Day in which the former Social Welfare State

outpatient & inpatient services including surgical services. It has not yet been possible to offer emergency services so far.

Minister was the chief guest. An orthopedic camp was organized on the 5th of December 1998 at Nuwakot in which the Lions club was involved.

Till the end of June 1999, the number of outpatients treated is 2010, that of inpatients is 161 and the number of surgical operations made has been 148. Types of surgeries included simple fractured bone fixation with nails, plates and screws to replacement of the hip with steel prosthesis, correction of deformities of arms and feet, amputations of limbs for incurable cancers, complex spinal instrumentation and bone-lengthening by the liizrov method whenever required. In short whatever was possible in this constrained setup was done in order to alleviate the patients difficulties. Orthoses and prostheses are also catered to here.

There are some major constraints in the hospital mainly due to lack of funds. The money raised from the patients is minimal because the majority of the patients cared for belong to the lower socio-economic level and the service charges are kept to a basic minimum. Internal revenue generated is not enough to meet even the basic day to day needs.

The future plan in vision is to turn this hospital into a well-equipped fifty-bed hospital which is totally self-reliant and which will cater to the common orthopedic needs of the people. Towards this end cooperation from national & international donors will be highly appreciated.

Rotary Information

PAUL HARRIS FELLOWS

Undoubtedly the most important step to promote voluntary giving to The Rotary Foundation occurred in 1957, when the idea of Paul Harris Fellow recognition was first proposed. Although the concept of making \$1,000 gifts to the Foundation was slow in developing by the early 1970s it began to gain popularity. The companion to the Paul Harris Fellow is the Paul Harris Sustaining Member, which is the recognition presented to an individual who has given, or in whose honor a gift is made, a contribution of \$100, with the stated intention of making additional contributions until \$1,000 is reached. At that time the Paul Harris Sustaining member becomes a Paul Harris Fellow.

By 1995, more than 470,000 Paul Harris Fellows and 160,000 Sustaining members have been added to the rolls of The Rotary Foundation.

A special recognition pin is given to Paul Harris Fellows who make additional gifts of US\$1,000 to the Foundation. The distinctive gold pin includes a blue stone to represent each \$1,000 contribution to a total of \$5,000 in additional gifts.

Paul Harris recognition provides a very important incentive for the continuing support needed to underwrite the many programs of The Rotary Foundation which build goodwill and understanding in the world.

The Nepal Disabled Association's efforts to build an orthopedic hospital resulted in the completion of the physical infrastructure with the financial help provided through Amherst South New York district 7090 and Rotary Club of Patan. Although the physical infrastructure of the hospital had been completed the hospital had not been able to get started due to the lack of resources needed for equipping the hospital with all the essentials. In these circumstances Mr. Luc Salens, an honorary hospital board advisor from Belgium provided through efforts Rs. 2400000.00 for equipping the hospital with all the essentials. In addition, Mr. Jim Sinclair provided twenty new beds and office furniture for the running of the hospital, name Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital, managed to get started officially from 17th August 1998 onwards.

From the official day of getting started the hospital conducted a five-day free health camp in the hospital premises. The camp catered to quite a satisfactory number of patients and in the same process distributed free medicines to all needy patients. All together 300 patients were treated at the free health camp. The camp concluded on 21st August 1998. From 23rd Aug. 1998 onwards the hospital started its outpatients service. From 25th Oct. 1998 onwards the hospital started its in-patients services except for emergency services.

The data for outpatients services, in-patients services and surgery done in the hospital as of 31st April. 1999 are as follows;

Services:	Out-patients	In-patients	Surgery
No. of Patients:	2,010	161	148

The hospital has two orthopaedic surgeons, two medical officers, one sister, six staff nurses, one CMA, six administrative staff, one technical staff, six helpers, two security guards & two drivers catering to the needs of the patients and the running of the day to day hospital activities. In total there are twenty nine hospital staff.

The hospital has come to the conclusion that most of the patients coming to this hospital are in the lower socio-

economic bracket and thus every attempt has to be made to make this hospital more providers. Taking this situation in view the hospital administration has requested for sponsorship of at least ten patients per year from the Ministry of Women and Social Welfare. The Ministry has assented by asking for the detailed Project Proposal.

Only recently Mr. Luc Salens again provided to the hospital a forty-foot container full of hospital accessories which he had shipped from Europe. The equipment in the container could not all be put to good use because of lack of space and thus a second phase expansion of the hospital (about thirty beds) has been felt much needed by the hospital administration.

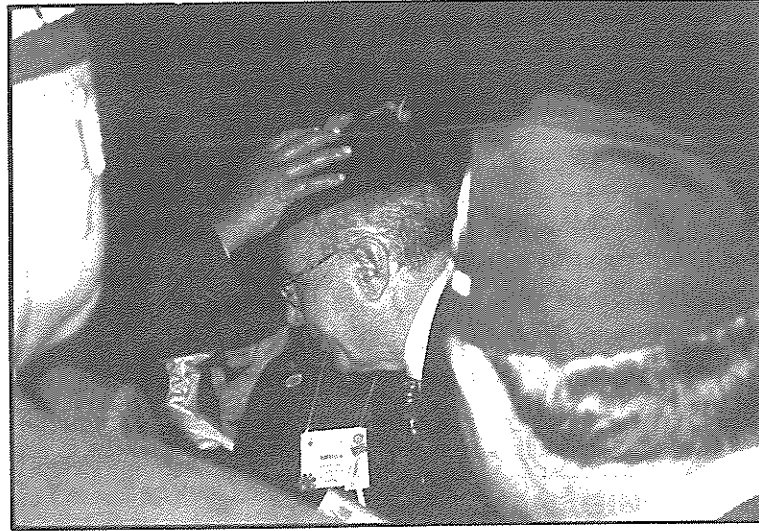

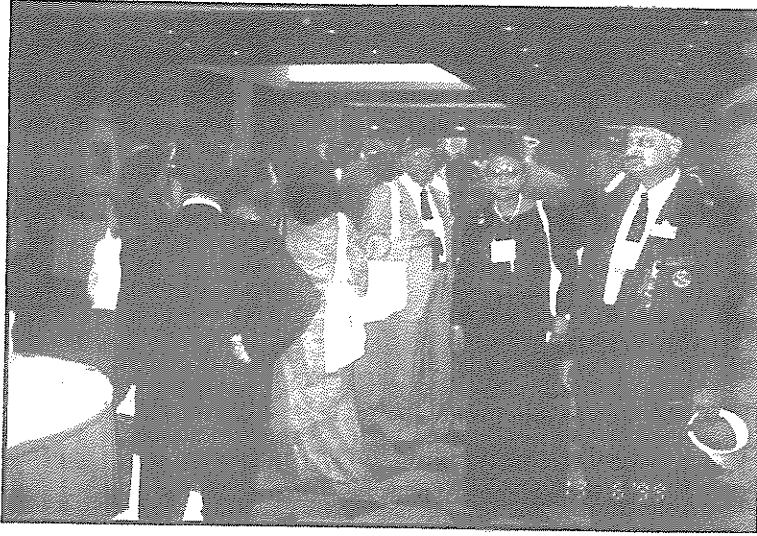


गोपाल राजभण्डारीज्य वाट आर. आई. प्रेसिडेण्टज्य लाई
नेपाली टोपी लगाउदै ।

Rotary Information

USE OF THE ROTARY EMBLEM

The Rotary International emblem is officially registered with the U.S. Patent Office as a trademark and "service mark," which prevents it being used in improper ways or by unauthorized individuals. The Rotary emblem should not be altered or modified in any way.

Rotarians are encouraged to wear the emblem as a lapel button. It is frequently used on jackets, pens, caps and other personal items manufactured by firms or individuals licensed by the RI Board of Directors. Rotary badges, banner, road signs and official Rotary club stationery naturally use the emblem as a mark of identification.

The Rotary emblem cannot be used for any commercial purpose. It is not permissible to use it in a political campaign or in connection with any other name or emblem not recognized by Rotary International. Individual Rotarians should not use the Rotary on business cards or stationery or for any other used intend to promote business. Nor is it considered proper for Rotarians to use the emblem on doors or windows of their business premises.

It is the responsibility of all Rotarians to use the emblem with pride. The restrictions are provided to assure that the Rotary emblem will not be misused and that it will always bring distinction to the organization.

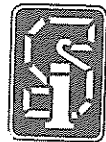

Dear Rtn. Gyanuji,

You had asked for an article for the 14th Installation Ceremony Souvenir of your Club. I was surprised, but thanks. You told me to write on "Nepal District based on Singapore Visit" and since Sr. Rotarian Kamal Manijyu was writing on the subject, I decided to write on "I joined Rotary?"

Yes, I agree to write on this topic but what? The topic is a not simple as one would think and moreover it's just been three years that I joined the Club. Nevertheless I decided to share my short but memorable experience with Rotary.

In mid 1995 I was called to a meeting at Greenwich Village Hotel, owned by neighbor Shreedhar Acharya to form of a new Rotary Club. Subsequently more meetings were held but nothing happened. In the meetings I met friends Tulasi Neupane and Matsyendra Lal Kayastha. One day Shreedharji informed me that another group, was also working in parallel to establishing the club. I was confused. Dr. Vijay Lal Gurubacharya, a neighbor, invited me to the new Club – the RC Patan West, where I was inducted in February 1996. None of the members objected my joining. Surprisingly later Dr. Gurubacharya himself left the Club. Rotary International granted membership to RC Patan West on December 11, 1995.

In the year of induction I was asked to Chair the Public Relation Committee of which I knew very little. Subsequent years I was assigned to Director – Club Service and thereafter the Secretary in RY 1998/99. In fact I was reluctant for such assignments but accepted the challenge, which really was, and I vowed to study and work hard. Dear friend, Rotary and it's Ideal of Service have fascinated me.

We all know Rotary is the world's first and largest humanitarian organization. The first Rotary Club of Chicago was formed in USA in 1905 February 23 and in quick succession crossed the international boundary to Canada (Winnipeg) in 1910. Then across Atlantic to Europe (Ireland/England) in 1911, Latin America (Puerto Rico 1918), across Pacific to Asia (Philippines 1919, India 1920, Australia 1921, Japan 1921) and Africa (Nicaragua 1929). And by 1920s, Rotary became a global movement – transcending national boundaries and bringing together people of all caste, creed, color, nationality and political beliefs in a friendly, impartial and democratic atmosphere. You and I are member of a family of 1.2 million individuals in over 29000 Rotary clubs to be identified by their service territories. Today, under the expanded International Fellowship and guided by "Service above Self", Rotarians, whether they are America and Africans, Japanese and Philippine, Canadians or Nepali, Indian and English, every year together provide varieties of services aimed at improving the quality of life of fellow, less fortunate and economically weaker members in the community (within their territories). Today, Rotary, thus, presents a true meaning of Hindu philosophy of internationally – Vasudhaiv Kutumbakam. Rotary now has its presence in 159 countries and clubs are grouped in 529 administrative units called district and 35 geographical units known as zones under Rotary International.

We all know fellowship is what the Rotary movement is. Paul P Harris and his four other friends soon discovered that the fellowship and mutual self interest didn't satisfy or justify the club meetings and added the spice – "occupation as an opportunity to serve society" as the purpose of their fellowship. And the first opportunity was to work to improve the lives of less fortunate in return of community's recognition of worthiness of their occupation by community and earnings from the community. To serve there was even stronger real motivation "Service above Self" which soon became not only the motto but also the identity of each Rotarian, individually or united. Rotary's first community service project, in 1907, was "erection of a public comfort station near

City Hall". Today, Rotarians not within their immediate local (territories), but also far away from their communities in other parts of the world. They join hand-in-hand with fellow Rotarians, and render services which Concern the Aging Citizen, Prevention of Drug and Alcohol Abuse, Literacy, Preserve Planet Earth (environment mitigation), Helping Sick and Disabled and Working for Youth. Rotary is, as we all know, the first and the largest humanitarian organization.

Rtn. Gyanuji, what I wrote above is what you would also find in Rotary literatures. However there are other aspects that I will like to share. Rotary is unlike other functionally similar organization, is indigenous and is not planted as most of the NGOs working in our country. Rotary Clubs are generally located in cities and metropolis but majority, if not all, of its services are concentrated in the rural areas and targeted to economically weaker and deprived sections of the community. Rural Community Corps are the carriers of the service of Rotarians. Rotary is equally concerned for the Youth. Rotary prepares tomorrows Rotarians by interacting and training them through Interact Club for Youths of up to 18 years age and Rotaract Club for Youths of above 18 years and up to 30 years. The objective is to prepare a better citizen ready to serve the needy people and the country.

Gyanuji, it is my understanding that traditional role of Rotary as one of the many humanitarian organizations rendering service in the third world countries like ours have been changing and evolving into a development organization. Remember our 1998 – 99 RI President James Lacy's Theme "Follow Your Rotary Dream" and our Rotary dream is nothing else but to serve with "Service above Self and he Profits Most who Serves Best" to improve the living conditions of our majority of people who are below the poverty line. President Jim Lacy's had given the agenda in the form of Thrust Areas of Service – the HESS – Health, Education, Shelter and Stable Family. Within these areas the close focus to name some was to be on Water and Sanitation, Immunization, Concentrated language Encountered (CLE), Character Development of Children, Low Cost Housing, Women Upliftment and Empowerment, Micro Credit (Grameen Bank) and Alleviation of Hunger and Poverty. These agendas are same what our national government have been advocating. Look into our Ninth Plan and also in HMG's we will find Rotary's these Thrust Areas – all over but in the form of poverty alleviation. At the 90th RI Convention at Singapore attended by around 18,000 Rotarians and their accompanies from 150 countries (Nepal – 68), we heard all three RI Presidents – outgoing James Lacy, incoming Carlo Ravizza and in waiting Frank Devlyn, talking the same agenda.

Implementation of all RI programs is though individual clubs. It would be singularly or jointly by the clubs. Funding is also jointly with the Rotary Foundation. It is Rotary's endowment fund created by contributions from Rotarians and also individuals throughout the World. Contributing more than US\$ 1000 or more are either recognized as Paul Harris Fellow or Benefactors. Sixth RI President Arch C. Klumph established foundation in 1917 and its first contribution was US\$26.50 from Kansas City Club (Missouri). There are Rotarians who contributed to the extent of US\$3 million or even there life time earnings/savings and is guided by the philosophy what Arch said "Rotary is a movement for centuries". The "Polio Plus" program, once termed as an impossible task, is Rotary's major endeavor of the century and aims at eradicating polio, a crippling disease, from the world by 2005, when the Rotary will be celebrating its 100 years of existence. It started in 1985 and is estimated that Rotarians would have contributed around over US\$500 million (committed 296 million by 5/1997). As of 1996, 154 out of 214 countries have reported no polio cases. Besides this project, Rotary had budgeted in 1997/98 a sum of over US\$40 million for humanitarian programs. Gyanuji, funding for humanitarian projects is not problem, the problem is good community based projects and dedicated Rotarians to implement.

Gyanuji, I think I must stop here, because there are many aspects of Rotary we can talk about. One thing I like to tell is 'regret'. And regret is "why I joined Rotary so late" Nevertheless it is never too late and I am happy to join Rotary to become a Rotarian.

Before I close, let me share that Fellowship and Service from two legs of the Rotary and we add movement (life) to the Rotary.

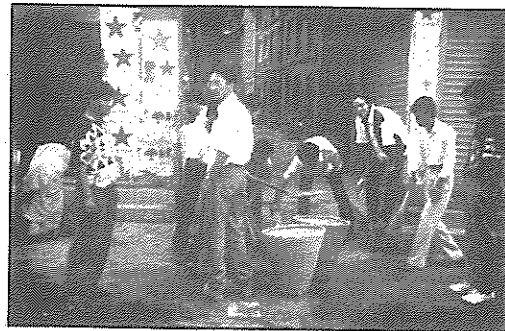
7. Camps on Various Subjects :

b) Blood Donation Camp :

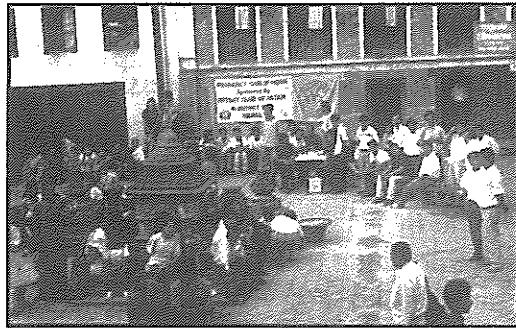

Rotaract Green Belt Project in Patan City

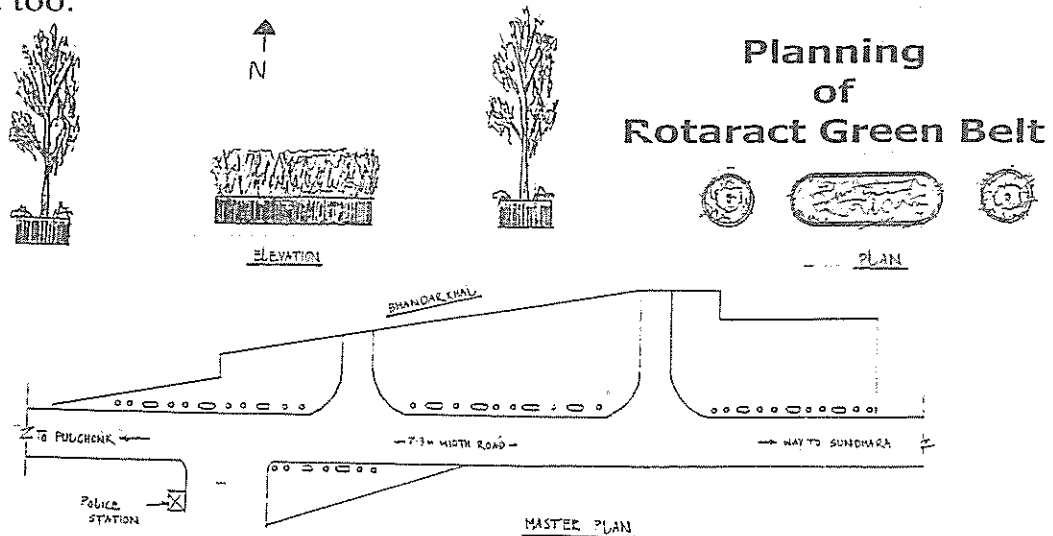

4. Contribution from Individial Donors

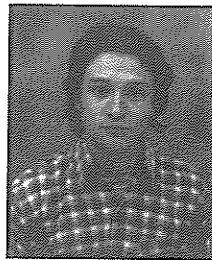
