

### FOUNDER OF ROTARY



Service above Self
Paul P. Harris 1869-1947

#### Born 19-Apr-1868 Died 27-Jan-1947

Paul P. Harris was born at Racine, Wisconsin, USA on April 19, 1868. A man with varied experiences, he received the Bachelor of Physical Culture and LLD degrees from the University of Vermont and the LLB degree from the University of Iowa. He was later awarded a honorary PhD in 1933 by the University of Vermont.

He worked as a newspaper reporter, a business college teacher, a cowboy and a salesman for a marble and granite concern, before finally settling down in Chicago as a lawyer in 1896. In July 1910 he married Jean Thompson, a Scottish girl and a co-member of the Chicago prairie club.

The first Rotary Club was formed on February 23, 1905 by Paul Harris with Sylvester Schiele - a coal merchant, Gustavus Loehr - a mining engineer and Hiram Shorey - a merchant tailor, to bring together business and professional men in friendship and fellowship. This first club meeting formed the nucleus for the thousands of Rotary clubs that were later organised throughout the world. These new clubs were called "Rotary" because members met in rotation in their various places of business.

Paul Harris was elected President in the First Rotary Convention for the year 1910-11. He was then re-elected

President for 1911-12 of the National association of Rotary Clubs. Their bulletin came to be known as "The National Rotarian."

Elected President Emeritus of Rotary International in 1912, he was active in Rotary until his death on 27-Jan-1947.

In the history of Rotary movement Rotary Club of Kathmandu was established as first Rotary club in Nepal. This club was inaugurated on 20th November 1958 by His late Majesty King Mahendra, the Patron-in Chief of Rotary club and was chartered on 28th June 1959. After 25 years of its charter it had decided to go for second club in Patan in 1984. The then District Governor had nominated Rtn Kamal Mani Dixit as GSR to establish club in Patan. Rtn Dixit made tremendous effort and became successful to form a new club named as Rotary club of Patan with the Presidentship of Mr. Surendra Raj Sharma who was the exsecretary of HMG and Mr. Matsendra Lal Kayastha as Secretary. The club was chartered on 19th April 1985 with 30 Charter member in the club.


Rtn Surendra Raj Sharma continued to be the President for one more time and was followed by Rtn. Matsendra Lal Kayastha. I5 active and prominent Presidents had drawn the wheel of the Club till date. This year we have successfully performed some program jointly with our partner in service Rotaract club of patan and Sunakothi samaj sewa, which is going to convert in RCC of the club.

# Health Camp: Rotary club of Patan had organized a General health camp at Sunakothi VDC, Lalitpur with the co-operation of Rotaract club of Patan, Sunakothi Samaj Sewa on

11th February 2003 under the co-ordination of Dr. Prakesh Raj Regmi of this club. There were ten Doctors from field of Urology, Cardiology General Medicine Gynecologist, and Dentist, and. General Surgery.

The Health camp was conducted from 10 AM-2.30 PM where 440 patients were checked up and provided free medicine to all. In that camp we found one cardiac patient who need immediate

operation and was admitted in Medicare Hospital and successfully performed bypass surgery next day. The patient was very happy with the health camp.

Rotaract this club had assist US\$ 300.00 to Rotaract club of Patan to conduct the Leadership Development Training to the young of Nepal with the co-operation of Rtn Tulsi Maharjan of Rotary Club of **Branch burg New jersey and friends of Nepal.** 

#. <u>Demonstration of Solar and Sanitation</u>: Rotary club of Patan is going to make Sunakothi Village as it RCC. The club has



decided to help in the field of Education and sanitation of that village. On 10th Falgun 2059 we had performed a demonstration program on solar and sanitation with help of Rotaract club of Patan, Sunakothi Samaj Sewa and Foundation for Sustainable Technologies (F.o.S.T). This demonstration program was organized to give awareness of environment cleanness and sanitation of village. Different kind of low cost equipment of solar and sanitation has been demonstrated in that program.

- **2.** Environment Protection: Rotary club of Patan has provided financial and technical assistance of Rs 125000.00 to preserve from land slide and deforestation of open land of Balkumari School of Sunakothi of Lalitpur. The total cost of the project was Rs. 200000.00 and rest money will be born by the local people.
- 3. <u>Prajapati Endowment Fund</u>: As usual RCP Patan is giving scholarship to needy and deprived student of different school. This year we have given Scholarship of Rs 1200.00 to 227 students of 21 different public school of Lalitpur District.

#### 4. Nepal orthopedic Hospital Project

- a. <u>Physical Therapy equipments</u>: RCP had handed over the different exercise equipments of Physical therapy unit on Matching Grant of US\$ 35000. This is third Matching Grant to this Hospital from the club. The final project report has been forwarded to RI and recently RI informed us that the project has been closed.
- b. Extension of Nepal Orthopedic Hospital: The second phase construction of the hospital adding 32 Private beds and 3 Operation Theatres, Administration block, Main outdoor unit, Library, Conference hall etc. The Project cost is about US\$ 400,000 with the contributions from personal Rotarian friends in Rotary Clubs in Belgium, USA and Nepal under initiation of RCP and Rtn. Luc Salens. RCP has donated Rs 500,000 for the construction of one 4 bed Private ward in the Hospital, which was collected from the members of the club. The construction

of hospital is going very smoothly. With all of this the hospital is going to have 60 beds with provision of 12 additional pedestrian beds at total cost of Rs 100 Millions.

- **5.** *Deaf School Project:* RCP has handed over the books, four computers, educational materials and furnishing for a library and recreation hall as well as a school bus for the Deaf school at Naxal under the Matching Grant No. 17790 amounting US\$ 55,000 which was sponsored by Rotary club of Bellevue, USA, Dist. 5030. This is the first and only one library and recreation hall for deaf students where one can have facilities of different games, TV, Music and Computers.
- **6.** <u>Digital Device Project</u>: This year we have two computers projects in the club.
- a) We have received 27 computers from Rotary Club of Chesterfield, England. Sixteen of these computers will be supplied to the oldest school Patan High School at Patan Dhoka. Besides training of Patan High School students, the facility at the school is envisaged to serve as Computer Training Center for teachers from other schools as well. The remaining 11 computers will be distributed to three other public schools.
- b) Under Matching Grant project No 22588, \$ 16,300 has been received. Forty-four computers are being purchased locally out of this fund and are being distributed to eight public schools along with a printer and Volt Guards to each of the schools. The school students will be able to e-mail students abroad and exchange cultural information also. Sponsoring Club is Rotary Club of Branchburg, USA. Rotary Club of Patan has contributed US\$ 1000.00 to this project.
- 7. <u>Birth kit Project</u>: We all are aware that to give a birth to a child is very difficult. In the remote area it is very risky for both mother and child at the time of delivery and infant mortality rate is 10% in Nepal. Taking into the consideration of this matter RCP has given assistant to Maternal Child Health project (MCHP) Thapathali, Kathmandu amounting US\$ 29351 for the producing of child Birth kits for clean and safe birth to child in remote area which is under the Matching Grant no 23235 of International Humanitarian Project

This assistance has given by RCP with kind co-operation of RC Bellevue, RC University, RC Vashon Island, and RC Buhl under RI District 5030 and 5400 of USA.

- **8.** Marynoll Day care centre: Since three year this club is supporting to Marynoll Day Care Center, Pulchok that is established to serve poor and mental retarded people. This year also we have provided US\$ 10000.00 to Marynoll Day Care Center as usual to provide food and transportation to the mental retarded persons. This project will be complete on 30th June 2003.
- **9.** Solar and Sanitation Project in Sunakothi: To improve the sanitation in Sunakothi we are going to lunch a solar and sanitation project in Sunakothi village at Lalitpur. This village is very near from Patan city even there is not any



provision for sanitation and cleanness. So we have formed a committee under the chairmanship of incoming International Director Kedar Bhakta Shredtha to initiate this project with the joint effort of consumer of that village. We have received US\$ 3000.00 as contribution from Rotary club of Los Altos .

## Projects Undertaken by Rotary Club of Patan 1925-2003

Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) was chartered on April 19, 1985 as 3<sup>rd</sup> Rotary Club in the country. This compilation aims to archive the Rotary Projects undertaken by RCP with the mobilisation of resources from various institutions and own resources during last 18 years and are briefly listed below.

#### <u>I-1985-86-President: Late Rtn Surendra Raj Sharma</u> This is Planning year for club. No project has been done.

#### II-1986-87President: LateRtn Surendra Raj Sharma

- II-1 Sipadol Multi Purpose Project: Rs 500,000, funded by South Asia Partnership, Canada was implemented in Sipadol Village in Lalitpur District. The project consisted of construction of school building, health post, and horticulture development.
- II-2 Establishment of AWON Library, Lalitpur: RCP initiated to establish AWON library at Kopundole, Lalitpur in association with American Women Organisation of Nepal.

#### III 1987-88 President: Rtn Matsyendra L Kayastha

- III-3 Indrayani School Building construction was undertaken at Khokana village in Lalitpur District with fund (Rs 500,000) made available by Rtn Ranjit Ratnaike from Australia. It benefited about 200 students. Further strengthening of the school is anticipated.
- **III-4 Polio Eradication Project** was launched as a world wide Project by Rotary International with contributions from the Rotarians around the world including RCP. It is an ongoing National Project till date.
- III-5 Support to Health Post at Geutal: Lalitpur. RCP supported to run the health post with its own resources till 1991.
- III-6 Support to Health Post at Natole, Lalitpur:. RCP supported to run the health post with its own resources till 1991. RCP had arranged some furniture to the health clinic (VI-20).
- III-7 Support to Achheswor Vihar Rehabilitation Pulchok: RCP members donated Rs 10,000 to support the rehabilitation work.
- III-8 Support to Ama Milan Kendra: Kathmandu Municipality. RCP members contributed Rs 40,000 to support the Kendra. Rtn. Surendra R Sharma co-ordinated the RCP support.

#### IV 1988-89 President: Rtn Matsyendra L Kayastha

- IV-9 4 beds for TB patients at Kalimati Chest Hospital, Kathmandu was made available with the contribution of Rotary Club of Sesojiya, Japan.
- IV-10 Equipment for Disabled Persons was made available by Rotary Club of Sesojiya, Japan and handed over to Nepal Disabled Association, Jorpati Kathmandu.
- IV-11 6500-litre water tank was constructed at Thecho village, Lalitpur District with fund (Rs 28,000) made available by Rotarian J Sinclair, South Amherst Club, Canada and local con-

tribution. Part of the fund is used to construct a bus stand (V-16). It is considered as one of most successful project undertaken by RCP and is operating successfully.

IV-12 Clothes for Earthquake Victims, costing about Rs 250,000, were distributed in East Nepal donated by Japanese citizens.

IV-13 Financial Support to Earthquake Victims in East Nepal. Club members contributed Rs 51,000 for the support to Prime Minister's Fund.

**IV-14 Jawalakhel Environment Improvement Project, Lalitpur:** RCP members contributed a sum of Rs 20,000 to Lalitpur Municipality for the Project implementation.

IV-15 Guardianship to 2 Orphans from Earthquake Affected Areas: RCP handed over Rs 100,000 contributed by RI District 2540, Japan, to Bal Mandir, Naxal, Kathmandu to provide guardianship to 2 orphan girls of Tehrathum District, Eastern Nepal.

#### V-1989-90 President: Rtn Bhism Raj Prasai

- V-16 Bus Stand was constructed at Thecho village, Lalitpur District near the water tank (IV-11) with the fund (Rs 7,000) remaining from Project IV-11 and local contribution.
- V-17 Mulpi Water Supply Project was implemented in Mulpi Village in Kavre District with a contribution of Rs 25,000 made available by RI District 3290.

#### VI-1990-91 President: Late Rtn Prajapati Prasai

- VI-18 Two Class Rooms were constructed at Balodaya Primary School at Dhapakhel Village, Lalitpur District at a total cost of Rs 91,000 made available by RCP and local people's contribution.
- VI-19 Support to 4 Martyr's Family of Lalitpur District was undertaken with fund (Rs 150,000) made available by Rotary Club of Akita Amori, Japan.
- VI-20 Furnituree to School and Health Post: Lalitpur. RCP distributed furniture worth Rs 20,000 donated by Hotel Narayani, Lalitpur to school at Thecho village, Lalitpur District and Health Post at Natole, Lalitpur Municipality.
- VI-21 Training of Lady Doctor in Japan: RCP sponsored a lady doctor from Teaching Hospital, Kathmandu to undergo training in Japan. Rotary Club in Japan funded it.

#### VII-1991-92 President: Late Rtn. Hom Raj Bajracharya:

VII-22 Traditional Stone Spouts were rehabilitated at Nahity and Lagankhel, Lalitpur Municipality. With a seed money of A\$ 2,500 from Rotary Club of Alice Spring, Australia, RCP mobilised resources of Rs 75,000 from local people and Rs 125,000 worth of reinforced cement concrete pipes from Nepal Water Supply Corporation to rehabilitate 2 stone spouts. The spout is discharging about 2 litres per second of clear water which benefit about 500 local people. This project is considered to be a suc-



cessful and honoured with **Significant Achievement Award** from Rotary International.

VII-23 Medical Equipment for Patan Hospital, costing A\$ 34,000, Lalitpur Municipality. Contributors were Rotary Clubs in Australia (Doncaster - A\$9,000, Croydon -A\$ 4,000, Forest Hill - A\$ 3,000); Rotary Club of Patan - A\$ 1,000 and RI Foundation - A\$ 17,000 under Matching Grant No 2671. Grant is used to provide modernise internal telephone system, dental and medical equipment to Patan Hospital.

VII-24 Ultrasonic Machine and Accessories to Amp Pipal Hospital, Gorkha: RCP sponsored for the donation of above equipment Rs 174,000 with contribution of RI District 2050 of Canada (US\$ 1,475) and RI Foundation (US\$ 1,475) under Matching Grant No 2568.

VII-25 Water Supply to Simal Banjyang Village, Pokhara, Kaski District: RCP sponsored the Project with contribution from Rotary Clubs of England (Worthington - £2000, Little Hampton - £200, Shoreham and Southwick -£200, Bognorhortham -£50 and Rotary Foundation -£2450 under Matching Grant No. 2636. Total project cost is Rs 450,000 and benefit 7000 villagers. VII-26 Scholarship to Poor Students Program was initiated in this year as a regular RCP Program. Late Rtn Prajapati Prasai initiated the Program, later named after him as Prajapati Scholarship Program. About Rs 1.9 million (as of June 2001) has been collected as trust fund and accrued interest is distributed as scholarship to poor students. It is discussed separately.

VIII-27 Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital (16 bed) at Jorpati, Kathmandu: With generous assistance from clubs in RI District 7090, RCP and Nepal Disabled Association, Jorpati undertook the construction of the Project at a cost of \$225,000. Amherst South, NY and Rotary Club of Hamilton AM, Ontario, Canada was co-ordinators for fund raising in USA and Canada. The Rotary Club of Hamilton AM alone provided \$45,000 and others by over 50 clubs in District 7090. The Hospital is currently in satisfactorily operation. It is discussed separately.

VIII-28 Clothes to Bhutanese Refugees were distributed through UNHCR, Kathmandu. Rotary Club of Yotuba, Japan donated the clothes.

VIII-29 Goat Breeding Project was launched in Bhardeo village in Lalitpur District. A grant sum of Rs 62,000 received from SAP Canada was used as revolving seed money to provide loan to villagers to raise goat. The beginning of the Project was satisfactory but loan recovery was poor.

Ongoing Scholarship program (VII-26) continued with fund swelled to Rs 100,000 and scholarship offered to 10 students.

Only ongoing program as Adult Orthopaedic Hospital, Scholarship, Thulo Parsel Project pre-construction activities were continued during the year.

Only ongoing program as Adult Orthopaedic Hospital, Scholarship, Thulo Parsel Project pre-construction activities were continued during the year.

XI 1995-96 President: Rtn Tirth Man Shrestha XI-30 Statue and Thanka Painting Training was conducted under the trainer Mr. DB Lama, a total of 43 persons were trained. XI-31 Wood Carving Training was offered to 6 persons at Wood Carving Industries (P) Ltd., Patan Industrial Estate.

XI-32 Stone Carving Training was offered to 5 persons under trainer Mr. Lok Raj Bajracharya, a resident of Bhinchhebahal, Lalitpur,

XI-33 Sponsor of Rotary Clubs and Rotract Club. RCP sponsored Rotary Club of Patan West, Rotary Club of Yala Patan, Rotary club of Patan south and Rotaract Club of Patan, Hakha. RCP is contributing seed money about Rs 12,000 annually for Rotaract Club of Patan, Hakha.

XI-34 Laboratory Equipment and Visual Aids worth US\$ 3200 were made available for Balodaya School at Kanibahal, Lalitpur Municipality with contribution from Rotary Club of Branch burg, District 7510, USA - US\$ 1600 and Rotary Foundation - US\$ 1600 under RI Matching Grant No. 5008.

Barth, Ambassador of Federal Republic of Germany to Nepal. Rotary Clubs of Germany donated the vehicles.

XI-41 Thulo Parsel Water Supply Project was successfully implemented at Thulo Parsel Village Kavre District. A total of 97 private connections to each household and 76 toilets were constructed under the Project to benefit about 1000 persons. Contributors were - US\$ 13,000 (District 6250, 4 clubs in District 6250 which included Rotary Clubs of Denver Mile High and Eau Clair Noon and 1 club in District 5450), about Rs 50,000 from RCP,

XVII-70 Demonstration of Solar and Sanitation: On 10th Falgun 2059 we had performed a demonstration program on solar and sanitation with help of Rotaract club of Patan, Sunakothi Samaj Sewa and (F.o.S.T). This demonstration program was organized to give awareness of environment cleanness and sanitation of village. Different kind of low cost equipment of solar and sanitation has been demonstrated in that program.

- 3. Prajapati Endowment Fund VII-26: As usual RCP Patan is giving scholarship to needy and deprived student of different school. This year we have given Scholarship of Rs 1200.00 to 227 students of 21 different public school of Lalitpur District.
- 4. Nepal Orthopaedic Hospital Project VIII-27
- a. An appraisal visit to all the Rotary clubs of Nepal has been organised in the Nepal

Orthopaedic Hospital, Jorpati.

b. Extension of Nepal Orthopedic Hospital: The second phase construction of the hospital adding 32 Private beds and 3 Operation Theatres, Administration block, Main outdoor unit, Library, Conference hall etc with cost of US\$ 400,000 with the contributions from personal Rotarian friends in Rotary Clubs in Belgium, USA and Nepal under initiation of RCP and Rtn. Luc Salens. RCP has donated Rs 500,000 for the construction of one 4 bed Private ward in the Hospital, which was collected from the members of the club. The construction of hospital is going very smoothly. With all of this the hospital is going to have 60 beds with provision of 12 additional pedestrian beds at total cost of Rs 100 Million.

5. Deaf School Project XV-62: RCP has handed over the books,

four computers, educational materials and furnishing for a library and recreation hall as well as a school bus for the Deaf school at Naxal under the Matching Grant No. 17790 amounting US\$ 55,000 which was sponsored by Rotary club of Bellevue, USA, Dist. 5030. This is the first and only one library and recreation hall for deaf students where one can have facilities of different games, TV, Music and Computers. This project has been closed this year.

#### 6. XVII-71A Digital Device Project:

a) 27 computers from Rotary Club of Chesterfield, England. Sixteen of these computers will be supplied to the oldest school Patan High School to give computer education to the students and to establish a Computer Training Centre for teachers from other schools. The remaining 11 computers will be distributed to three other public schools.

b) XVII-71B: Forty-four computers are being purchased to distribute computers to eight public schools along with a printer and Volt Guards to each of the schools under Matching Grant project No 22588, \$16,300. Sponsoring Club for this project is Rotary Club of Branchburg, USA and Rotary Club of Patan has contributed US\$ 1000.00 to this project.

7 XVII-72 .Birth kit Project: RCP has given assistant to Maternal Child Health project (MCHP) Thapathali, Kathmandu amounting US\$ 29351 for the producing of child Birth kits for clean and safe birth to child in remote area, which is under the Matching Grant no 23235 of International Humanitarian Project. This assistance has given by RCP with kind co-operation of RC Bellevue, RC University, RC Vashon Island, and RC Buhl under RI District 5030 and 5400 of USA.

**8.** Marynoll Day care centre XV-59: Since three year this club is supporting to Marynoll Day Care Center, Pulchok that is established to serve poor and mental retarded people. This year also we have provided US\$ 10000.00 to Marynoll Day Care Center as usual to provide food and transportation to the mental retarded persons. This project will be complete on 30th June 2003.

**9.** XVII-73 Solar and Sanitation Project in Sunakothi: To improve the sanitation in Sunakothi RCP are going to lunch a solar and sanitation project in Sunakothi village at Lalitpur. A committee has formed under the chairmanship of incoming International Director Kedar Bhakta Shredtha to initiate this project with the joint effort of consumer of that village. We have received US\$ 3000.00 as contribution from Rotary club of Los Altos .

## National Human Rights Action Plan in NEPAL

#### **BACKGROUND**

The Constitution of the Kingdom of Nepal (1990) guarantees protection of fundamental rights and basic freedom to all citizens. It aims at the promotion of social and economic equality, participatory governance and development, equality of opportunity and ensures the harmony among different sections of the population.

Yet, while there has been considerable improvement in conditions for human development during the last 12 years, poverty, illiteracy, marginalisation, unemployment and corruption remain major hurdles to the enjoyment of the universal human rights guaranteed under the Constitution.

Nepal remains one of the poorest countries in the world where poverty health and literacy indicate all the challenges that face His Majesty's Government of Nepal (HMG/N) in improving access to economic and social rights. Problems still remain with civil and political rights. By raising the awareness and expectations, the perceived denial of opportunities can often lead to social tensions and violence. Local people are often the victims of violations of civil and political rights.

The National Human Rights Action Plan (NHRAP) is a follow up to the UN World Conference on Human Rights in Vienna in 1993, which called on the Governments of all States to develop national plans of action to enhance the observance of human rights, In mid 1999 following a UN-sponsored workshop on National Human Rights Action Plans, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs proposed to formulate a NHRAP in order to identify steps whereby Napal will improve its respect, promotion, protection and fulfillment of human rights in a strategic and systematic way. The United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) offered to assist Nepal with its formulation of the Action Plan under the HURIST project, a Human Rights Strengthening Project which is a joint initiative of UNDP and the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR). The Ministry of Foreign Affairs announced Nepal's decision to proceed with such a project at the UN Commission on Human Rights in Geneva in April 2000.

#### **FORMULATION OF NHRAP**

The formulation of a NHRAP for Nepal has the objective of developing a broad mechanism whereby individuals and sectors of the country are accorded equal treatment under the law, equal opportunities and protection to enjoy their rights. It aims to enhance all the individuals' talents and skills, which will enable them to participate in the country's political, economic,

social and cultural development. The NHRAP seeks to launch a resolute action plan with specific action strategies for specific sectors. As per the participatory approach of NHRAP and in order to facilitate and organize contributions of the various sectors, 12 thematic groups have been identified.

- 1. EDUCATION & CULTURE
- 2. HEALTH
- 3. ENVIRONMENT & DEVELOPMENT
- 4. INDEGENOUS PEOPLE & DALITS
- 5. WOMEN
- 6. CHILDREN
- 7. LAW/LEGISLATION
- 8. JUDICIARY
- 9. PRISON
- 10. LABOUR
- 11. CONFLICT MANAGEMENT
- 12. INSTITUTIONAL STRENGTHENING

In general, the practice is that each individual government determines its own modalities, specific content and focus of its NHRAP. Approaches vary from developing the Plan with input from other governments, inter-governmental organizations, NGOs, academic institutions and the private sector. In all cases, the idea of NHRAP is a collective effort, involving government (at various levels) and civil society in the consultative planning process and in the implementation of NHRAP.

As for Nepal's formulation of a NHRAP, it has throughout the last year been formulated through a broad consultative/participatory process. The draft NHRAP is therefore based on the opinions, suggestions and feedbacks given by representatives nation wide from a wide variety of sectors in the society including government agencies, local bodies, the private sector, the non-governmental sector, experts, lawyers, judges, academics, media-persons and the general public.

The final draft of NHRAP which is soon to be launched is a broad and comprehensive document that identifies the major future challenges related to Human Rights in Nepal and recommends actions / programs for twelve thematic sector as mentioned above.

#### DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVE OF NHRAP

The NHRAP aims to address all rights in the human rights framework – civil, cultural, economic, political and social – in an integrated and methodical manner. A significant aspect of NHRAP is its integration with the Tenth five Year Plan and it's thereby support to the poverty alleviation through focus on economic and social rights.

The development objectives of NHRAP are as follows:

- · Making further explicit HMG/N's commitments to the achievement of human rights.
- Developing programs specifically directed towards the alleviation of the human rights situation of vulnerable groups in Nepali society.
- Integrating human rights in Nepal's development plans.



- Increasing the awareness and understanding of rights throughout society through ownership of the plan by all sectors.
- Mobilizing domestic and international resources in favour of the promotion of human rights.

#### **BENEFICIARIES OF NHRAP**

The ultimate beneficiaries of the NHRAP will be the people of Nepal, in particular, women, children, the poor and other disadvantaged groups of the community. By improving awareness on human rights, developing strategies and programs towards the improvement of the human rights situation in Nepal, the NHRAP will make a positive contribution to the evolution of a human rights culture in the country.

## E. <u>IMPLEMENTATION AND MONITORING OF</u> <u>NHRAP</u>

Many concerns were raised both at the local, regional and national level, in course of formulation of NHRAP, concerning its implementation. In order to assure to the public that NHRAP will not be left at the bookshelves and to give confidence to every Nepalese that action will be taken in the field of human rights by HMG/Nepal, it is essential to ensure implementation of the recommendations made through NHRAP

The actions outlined in NHRAP and covered by the tenth five year plan will be implemented by HMG/N as provided for in the plan, with due consideration to the related human rights conventions and its provisions to be followed by the state parties. However, for the implementation of other actions outlined in NHRAP the local bodies must be strengthened and made effective. For this the local bodies must be empowered with all the authority including legal authority in accordance with the Local Self Governance Act, 1999. The community and user's groups must be brought in the mainstream of the local development work. Similarly National Women Commission and National Dalit Commission must be established under legislation and Central and District Child Welfare Boards under the Children Act, 1992 must be made very effective. In addition to that, some new institutions may require to be established and the existing ones strengthened.

Nepal has already ratified 16 of the principal instruments related with the human rights and is in the process of considering adherence to some more. However, the implementation of the provisions of these instruments and fulfillment of the obligations under these instruments is not satisfactory, therefore to recommend and coordinate the action to be taken by the different ministries and departments for fulfillment of obligations including reporting and effective implementation of the provisions of those instruments, a human rights division shall be established in the Ministry of Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs as it is the depository of all international instruments to which Nepal is a party.

It is also important to revise and make necessary laws as required by ratification of different conventions and Section 9 of

the Nepal Treaty Act 1990 which places the provisions of the conventions to which Nepal is a party superior to the provisions of laws of Nepal to the extent of incompatibility and mandates the government to make the laws in line with its commitments to obligations accrued by virtue of being a signatory to the conventions. For this, the Ministry of Law, Justice and Parliamentary Affairs and Nepal Law Reform Commission must be strengthened.

Similarly, for raising awareness of human rights throughout the country, NHRAP may require the government to introduce human rights education in the schools and conduct regular training and orientation programme on human rights for the persons related with the law enforcement. For this purpose all training centers / academy of His Majesty's Government including Nepal Administrative Staff College, Judicial Service Training Center, National Police Training Academy and newly established human rights cell in Royal Nepalese Army, Ministry of Home, Armed Police and Nepal Police Force must be strengthened and National Judicial Academy may be established. And for the efficient management and development of necessary facilities in the prison the department of Prison Management under Home Ministry must be strengthened

To coordinate between the government agencies to carry out all the activities as per NHRAP, a human rights unit or cell may be established in the Cabinet Secretariat and the National Planning Commission, National Human Rights Commission, Human Rights Organizations and Civil Society shall play a very important role for implementation and monitoring of the NHRAP.

#### Conclusion

For a country like Nepal, implementation of NHRAP is not free from challenges. While people's socio-economic conditions and low literacy percentage are challenges on the one hand, on the other are problems relating to adequacy of resources and effectiveness of implementation mechanism. However, since NHRAP is a national and people's programme of action, its success largely depends on a collective commitment, will and effort of all of us. In this process, the support and cooperation of all concerned sectors of the society and our foreign development partners is equally important.

In order to coordinate and ensure adequate implementation and monitoring of NHRAP in the various Ministries, Department and other sectors of the Government, in addition to ensure funding for the activities the creation of a Human Rights Implementation and Monitoring Committee under the chairmanship of the Chief Secretary of HMG/N and consisting of the Secretaries of National Planning Commission, Ministry of Finance. Ministry concerned with the activities, National Human Rights Commission and representative of UNDP within the Cabinet Secretariat or Prime Minister's Office is recommended.

## Constitution of the Rotary Club of Patan

#### Article I Definitions

As used in this constitution, unless the context otherwise clearly requires, the words in

this article shall have the following meanings:

- Board: The Board of Directors of this club
- 2. Bylaws: The bylaws of this club.
- Director: A member of this club's Board of Directors.
- 4. Member: A member, other than an honorary member, of this club.
- 5. RI: Rotary International.
- Year: The twelve-month period, which begins on 1 July.

#### Article II Name

The name of this organization shall be the Rotary Club of Patan.

(Member of Rotary International)

#### Article III Locality of the Club

The locality of this club is as follows: The Club is in District 3290 and located in Hotel Narayani, Lalitpur Sub-Metropolitan City, Lalitpur District of Nepal.

#### Article IV Object

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

First. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

Second. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

Third. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life;

Fourth. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

#### Article V Meetings

Section 1 — Regular Meetings.

(a) Day and Time. This club shall hold a

- regular meeting once each week on the day and at the time provided in the bylaws.
- (b) Change of Meeting. For good cause, the board may change a regular meeting to any day during the period commencing with the day following the preceding
- \* The bylaws of Rotary International provide that each club admitted to membership in RI shall adopt this prescribed standard club constitution. regular meeting and ending with the day preceding the next regular meeting, or to a different hour of the regular day, or to a different place.
- (c) Cancellation. The board may cancel a regular meeting if it falls on a legal holiday or in case of the death of a club member, or of an epidemic or of a disaster affecting the whole community, or of an armed conflict in the community, which endangers the lives of the club members. The board may cancel not more than four regular meetings in a year for causes not otherwise specified herein provided that this club does not fail to meet for more than three consecutive meetings.

Section 2 — Annual Meeting. An annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held not later than 31 December as provided in the bylaws.

#### Article VI Membership

Section 1 — General Qualifications. This club shall be composed of adult persons of good character and good business and professional reputation.

Section 2 — *Kinds*. This club shall have two kinds of membership, namely: active and honorary.

# Interim Provision Relating to Section 2 — Notwithstanding the provisions of article VI,

section 2, no one who was a member of a Rotary club as of 1 July 2001 shall lose membership by reason of enactment 01-148 adopted by the 2001 Council on Legislation.

Section 3 — Active Membership. A person possessing the qualifications set forth in article V, section 2 of the RI constitution may be elected to active membership in this club.

Section 4 — Transferring or Former Rotarian. A member may propose to active membership a transferring member or former member of a club, if the proposed member is terminating or has terminated such membership in the former club due to no longer being engaged in the formerly assigned classification of business or profession within the locality of the former club or the surrounding area. The transferring or former member of a club being proposed to active membership under this section may also be proposed by the former club.

Section 5 — Dual Membership. No person shall simultaneously hold active membership in this and another club. No person shall simultaneously be a member and an honorary member in this club. No person shall simultaneously hold active membership in this club and membership in a Rotaract club.

#### Section 6 — Honorary Membership.

- (a) Eligibility for Honorary Membership.
  Persons who have distinguished themselves by meritorious service in the furtherance of Rotary ideals may be elected to honorary membership in this club. The term of such membership shall be as determined by the board. Persons may hold honorary membership in more than one club.
- # The 2001 Council on Legislation adopted an enactment which eliminated types of membership (senior active, past service and additional active) and revised the classification principle. However, no one who is a member of a Rotary club as of 1 July 2001 will lose membership by reason of the new provisions. All such persons will be considered active members.



(b) Rights and Privileges. Honorary members shall be exempt from the payment of admission fees and dues, shall have no vote and shall not be eligible to hold any office in this club. Such members shall not hold classifications, but shall beentitled to attend all meetings and enjoy all the other privileges of this club. No honorary member of this club is entitled to any rights and privileges in any other club, except for the right to visit other clubs without being the guest of a Rotarian.

Section 7 — Holders of Public Office. Persons elected or appointed to public office for a specified time shall not be eligible to active membership in this club under the classification of such office. This restriction shall not apply to persons holding positions or offices in schools, colleges or other institutions of learning or to persons

who are elected or appointed to the judiciary. Members who are elected or appointed to public office for a specified period may continue as such members in their existing classifications during the period in which they hold such office.

Section 8 —Rotary International Employment. This club may retain in its membership any member employed by RI.

#### **Article VII Classifications**

Section 1 — General Provisions.

- (a) Principal Activity. Each member shall be classified in accordance with the member's business or profession. The classification shall be that which describes the principal and recognized activity of the firm, company or institution with which the member is connected or that which describes the member's principal and recognized business or professional activity.
- (b) Correction or Adjustment. If the circumstances warrant, the board may correct or adjust the classification of any member. Notice of a proposed correction or adjustment shall be provided to the member and the member shall be allowed a hearing thereon.

Section 2 — Limitations. This club shall not elect a person to active membership from a classification if the club already has five or more members from that classification, unless the club has more than 50 members, in which case, the club may

elect a person to active membership in a classification so long as it will not result in the classification making up more than 10% of the club's active membership. Members who are retired shall not be included in the total number of members from a classification. If a member changes classification, the club may continue the member's membership under the new classification notwithstanding these limitations.

\*\*Interim Provision Relating to Section 2 — Notwithstanding the provisions of article VII, section 2, no one who was a member of a Rotary club as of 1 July 2001 shall lose membership by reason of enactment 01-148 adopted by the 2001 Council on Legislation.

(See footnote for Interim Provision to Article VI, section 2 of this constitution.)

#### Article VIII Attendance

Section 1 — General Provisions. Each member should attend this club's regular meetings. A member shall be counted as attending a regular meeting if the member is present for at least 60% of the meeting, or is present and is called away unexpectedly and subsequently produces evidence to the satisfaction of the board that such action was reasonable, or makes up for an absence in any of the following ways:

(a) 14 Days Before or After the Meeting. If, within fourteen (14) days before or after the regular time for that meeting, the member

- (1) attends at least 60% of the regular meeting of another club or of a provisional club; or
- (2) attends a regular meeting of a Rotaract or Interact club or Rotary Community Corps or of a provisional Rotaract or Interact club or Rotary Community Corps; or
- (3) attends a convention of RI, a council on legislation, an international assembly, a Rotary institute for past and present officers of RI, a Rotary institute for past, present, and incoming officers of RI, or any other meeting convened with the approval of the board of directors of RI or the president of RI acting on behalf of the board of directors of RI, a Rotary multi zone conference, a meeting of a committee of RI, a Rotary district conference, a Rotary district assembly, any district meeting held by direction of the board of directors of RI, any district committee meeting held by direction of the district gov-

ernor, or a regularly announced intercity meeting of Rotary clubs; or

- (4) is present at the usual time and place of a regular meeting of another club for the purpose of attending such meeting, but that club is not meeting at that time or place; or
- (5) attends and participates in a club service project or a club-sponsored community event or meeting authorized by the board; or
- (6) attends a board meeting or, if authorized by the board, a meeting of a service committee to which the member is assigned. When a member is outside the member's country of residence for more than fourteen
- (14) days, the time restriction shall not be imposed so that the member may attend meetings in another country at any time during the travel period, and each such attendance shall count as a valid make-up for any regular meeting missed during the member's time abroad.
- (b) At the Time of the Meeting. If, at the time of the meeting, the member is (1) traveling with reasonable directness to or from one of the meetings specified in sub-subsection (a) (3) of this section; or
- (2) serving as an officer or member of a committee of RI, or a trustee of The Rotary Foundation; or (3) serving as the special representative of the district governor in the formation of a new club; or
- (4) on Rotary business in the employ of RI; or
- (5) directly and actively engaged in a district-sponsored or a RI or Rotary Foundation-sponsored service project in a remote area where making up attendance is impossible; or
- (6) engaged in Rotary business duly authorized by the board which precludes attendance at the meeting.
- (c) Extended Absence on Outposted Assignment. If the member, while working within the member's own country of residence for an extended period on an outposted assignment and with the mutual agreement of the member's club and a designated club, attends meetings of the designated club.

Section 2 — Excused Absences. A member's absence shall be excused if (a) the absence complies with the conditions and under circumstances approved by the board. The board may excuse a member's absence for reasons which it considers to be good and sufficient.



(b) the aggregate of the member's years of age and years of membership in one or more clubs is 85 years or more and the member has notified the club secretary in writing of the member's desire to be excused from attendance and the board has approved.

Section 3 — RI Officers' Absences. A member's absence shall be excused if the member is a current officer of RI.

Section 4 — Attendance Records. Any member whose absences are excused under the provisions of subsection (b) of section 2 of this article shall not be included in the membership figure used to compute this club's attendance nor shall such absences or attendances be used for that purpose.

#### Article IX Directors and Officers

Section 1 — Governing Body. The governing body of this club shall be the board constituted as the bylaws may provide.

Section 2 — Authority. The board shall have general control over all officers and committees and, for good cause, may declare any office vacant.

Section 3 — Board Action Final. The decision of the board in all club matters is final, subject only to an appeal to the club. However, as to a decision to terminate membership, a member, pursuant to article XI, section 6, may either appeal to the club or request arbitration. If appealed, a decision of the board shall be reversed only by a two-thirds vote of the members present, at a regular meeting specified by the board, provided a quorum is present and notice of the appeal has been given by the secretary to each member at least five (5) days prior to the meeting. If an appeal is taken, the action taken by the club shall be final.

Section 4 — Officers. The club officers shall be a president, a president-elect and one or more vice-presidents, all of whom shall be members of the board, and a secretary, a treasurer, and a sergeant-at-arms, who may or may not be members of the board as the bylaws shall provide.

Section 5 — Election of Officers.

(a) Terms of Officers other than President. Each officer shall be elected as provided in the bylaws. Except for the president, each officer shall take office on 1 July immediately following election and shall serve for the term of office or until asuccessor has been duly elected and qualified.

(b) Term of President. The president shall be elected as provided in the bylaws, not more than two (2) years but not less than eighteen (18) months prior to the day of taking office. The president shall serve as president-elect for the year immediately preceding the year as president. The president shall take office on 1 July and shall serve for a period of one (1) year or until a successor has been duly elected and qualified.

(c) Qualifications. Each officer and director shall be a member in good standing of this club. The president-elect shall attend the district presidents-elect training seminar and the district assembly unless excused by the governor-elect. If so excused, the president-elect shall send a designated club representative who shall report back to the president-elect.

#### Article X Admission Fees and Dues

Every member shall pay an admission fee and annual dues as prescribed in the bylaws, except that any transferring or former member of another club who is accepted into membership of this club pursuant to article VI, section 4 shall not be required to pay a

second admission fee.

#### Article XI Duration of Membership

Section 1 — *Period*. Membership shall continue during the existence of this club unless terminated as hereinafter provided. Section 2 — *Automatic Termination*.

(a) Membership Qualifications. Membership shall automatically terminate when a member no longer meets the membership qualifications, except that: (1) the board may grant a member moving from the locality of this club or the surrounding area a special leave of absence not to exceed one (1) year to enable the member to visit and become known to a Rotary club in the new community if the member is still active in the same classification and continues to meet all

other conditions of club membership; (2) the board may allow a member moving from the locality of this club or the surrounding area to retain membership if the member remains active in the same classification and continues to meet all other conditions of club membership; and

(3) a member whose classification is lost

without default of the member may retain such classification and be granted a special leave of absence not to exceed one (1) year to enable the member to obtain new employment in the current or a new classification. Such member must continue to meet all other conditions of club membership. Termination of membership would take effect only at the end of the period of leave granted to the member. (b) How to Rejoin. When the membership of a member has terminated as provided in subsection (a) of this section, such person may make new application for membership, under the same or another classification. A second admission fee shall not be required.

(c) Termination of Honorary Membership. Honorary membership shall automatically terminate at the end of the term for such membership as determined by the board. However, the board may extend an honorary membership for an additional period. The board may revoke an honorary membership at any time.

## Section 3 — Termination — Non-payments of Dues.

(a) *Process*. The secretary at the member's last known address shall notify any member failing to pay dues within thirty (30) days after the prescribed time in writing. If the dues are not paid on or before ten (10) days of the date of notification, membership may terminate, subject to the discretion of the board.

(b) Reinstatement. The board may reinstate the former member to membership upon the former member's petition and payment of all indebtedness to this club. However, no former member may be reinstated to active membership if the former member's classification has been filled.

Section 4 — Termination — Non-Attendance.

(a) Attendance Percentages. A member must (1) Attend or make up at least 60% of club regular meetings in each half of the year; (2) attend at least 30% of this club's regular meetings in each half of the year. If a member fails to attend as required, the member's membership shall be subject to termination unless the board consents to such non-attendance for good cause.

(b) Consecutive Absences. Unless otherwise excused by the board for good and sufficient reason or pursuant to ar-



ticle VIII, sections 2 or 3, each member who fails to attend or make up four consecutive regular meetings, shall be informed by the board that the member's non-attendance may be considered a request to terminate membership in this club. Thereafter, the board, by a majority vote, may terminate the member's membership.

Section 5 — Termination — Other Causes.

- (a) Good Cause. The board may terminate the membership of any member who ceases to have the qualifications for membership in this club or for any good cause by a vote of not less than two-thirds of the board members, at a meeting called for that purpose.
- (b) Notice. Prior to taking any action under subsection (a) of this section, the member shall be given at least ten (10) days' written notice of such pending action and an opportunity to submit a written answer to the board. The member shall have the right to appear before the board to state the member's case. Notice shall be by personal delivery or by registered letter to the member's last known address. (c) Filling Classification. When the board has terminated the membership of a member as provided for in this section, this club shall not elect a new member under the former member's classification until the time for hearing any appeal has expired and the decision of this club or of the arbitrators has been announced.

**Section 6** — Right to Appeal or Arbitrate Termination.

- (a) Notice. Within seven (7) days after the date of the board's decision to terminate membership, the secretary shall give written notice of the decision to the member. Within fourteen (14) days after the date of the notice, the member may give written notice to the secretary of the intention either to appeal to the club or to arbitrate as provided in article XV.
- (b) Date for Hearing of Appeal. In the event of an appeal, the board shall set a date for the hearing of the appeal at a regular club meeting to be held within twentyone (21) days after receipt of the notice of appeal. At least five (5) days' written notice of the meeting and its special business shall be given to every member. Only members shall be present when the appeal is heard.
- (c) Arbitration. In the event of a request

for arbitration, each party shall appoint an arbitrator and the arbitrators shall appoint an umpire. Only a member of a Rotary club may be appointed as umpire or as arbitrator.

- (d) Appeal. If an appeal is taken, the action of the club shall be final and binding on all parties and shall not be subject to arbitration.
- (e) Decision of Arbitrators or Umpire. If arbitration is requested, the decision reached by the arbitrators, or, if they disagree, by the umpire shall be final and binding on all parties and shall not be subject to appeal.

Section 7 — Board Action Final. Board action shall be final if no appeal to this club is taken and no arbitration is requested.

Section 8 — Resignation. The resignation of any member from this club shall be in writing, addressed to the president or secretary. The resignation shall be accepted by the board if the member has no indebtedness to this club.

Section 9 — Forfeiture of Property Interest. Any person whose club membership has been terminated in any manner shall forfeit all interest in any funds or other property belonging to this club.

## Article XII Community, National and International Affairs

Section 1 — Proper Subjects. The merits of any public question involving the general welfare of the community, the nation and the world are of concern to the members of this club and shall be proper subjects of fair and informed study and discussion at a club meeting for the enlightenment of its members in forming their individual opinions. However, this club shall not express an opinion on any pending controversial public measure.

Section 2 — No Endorsements. This club shall not endorse or recommend any candidate for public office and shall not discuss at any club meeting the merits or demerits of any such candidate.

#### Section 3 — Non-Political.

(a) Resolutions and Opinions. This club shall neither adopt nor circulate resolutions or opinions, and shall not take action dealing with world affairs or international policies of a political nature.

(b) Appeals. This club shall not direct appeals to clubs, peoples or governments, or circulate letters, speeches, or proposed plans for the solution of specific international problems of a political nature.

**Section 4** — Recognizing Rotary's Beginning.

The week of the anniversary of Rotary's founding (23 February) shall be known as World Understanding and Peace Week. During this week, this club will celebrate Rotary service, reflect upon past achievements and focus on programs of peace, understanding and goodwill in the community and throughout the world.

#### Article XIII Rotary Magazines

Section 1 — Mandatory Subscription. Unless, in accordance with the bylaws of RI, this club is excused by the board of directors of RI from complying with the provisions of this article, each member shall, for the duration of membership, subscribe to the official magazine or to the magazine approved and prescribed for this club by the board of directors of RI. The subscription shall be paid in six (6) month periods for the duration of membership in this club and to the end of any six (6) month period during which membership may terminate.

Section 2 — Subscription Collection. The subscription shall be collected by this club from each member semiannually in advance and remitted to the Secretariat of RI or to the office of such regional publications as may be determined by the board of directors of RI.

#### Article XIV Acceptance of Object and Compliance with Constitution and Byławs

By payment of an admission fee and dues, a member accepts the principles of Rotary as expressed in its object and submits to and agrees to comply with and be bound by the constitution and bylaws of this club, and on these conditions alone is entitled to the privileges of this club. Each member shall be subject to the terms of the constitution and bylaws regardless of whether such member has received copies of him or her.

#### Article XV Arbitration

Should any dispute, other than as to a decision of the board, arise between any current or former member(s), and this club,



any club officer or the board, on any account whatsoever which cannot be settled under the procedure already provided for such purpose, the dispute shall be settled, upon a request to the secretary by any of the disputants, by arbitration. The procedure utilized for such arbitration shall be as provided in article XI, section 6, subsections (c) and (e).

#### Article XVI Bylaws

This club shall adopt bylaws not inconsistent with the constitution and bylaws of RI, with the rules of procedure for an administrative territorial unit where established by RI, and with this constitution, embodying additional provisions for the government of this club. Such bylaws may be amended from time to time as therein provided.

#### **Article XVII Interpretation**

Throughout this constitution, the terminology "mail," "mailing" and "ballot-bymail" will include utilization of electronic mail (e-mail) and Internet technology to reduce costs and increase responsiveness.

#### Article XVIII Amendments

Section 1 — Manner of Amending. Except as provided in section 2 of this article, only the council on legislation may amend this constitution in the same manner as is established in the bylaws of RI for the amendment of its bylaws.

Section 2 — Amending Article II and Article III. Article II (Name) and Article III. (Locality of the Club) of the constitution shall be amended at any regular meeting of this club, a quorum being present by the affirmative vote of a majority of members present and voting, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been mailed to each member at least ten (10) days before such meeting, and provided further, that such amendment shall be submitted to the board of directors of RI for its approval and shall become effective only when so approved.

## Bylaws of the Rotary Club of Patan

## Article I Election of Directors and Officers

Section 1 — At a regular meeting one month prior to the meeting for election of officers,

the presiding officer shall ask for nominations by members of the club for president,

president-elect, vice-president, secretary, joint secretary and treasurer and 4 members of the board of directors. The nominations may be presented by a nominating committee or by members from the floor, by either or by both as a club may determine. If it is determined to have a nominating committee, such committee shall be appointed as the club may determine. The nominations duly made shall be placed on a ballot in alphabetical order under each office and shall be voted for at the annual meeting. The candidates for president, president-elect, vicepresident, secretary, joint secretary and treasurer receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected to their respective offices. The 4 candidates for director receiving a majority of the votes shall be declared elected as directors. The president elected in such balloting shall serve as a member of the board as president-elect for the year commencing on the first day of July next following the election, and shall assume office as president on the first day of July immediately following the year of service on the board as president-elect.

Section 2 — The officers and directors, so elected, together with the immediate past president shall constitute the board of directors. Within one week after their election, the board of directors-elect shall meet and elect some member of the člub to act as sergeant-at-arms.

Section 3 — A vacancy in the board of directors or any office shall be filled by action of

the remaining members of the board.

**Section 4**— A vacancy in the position of any officer-elect or director-elect shall be filled by action of the remaining members

of the board of directors-elect.

#### Article II Board of Directors

The governing body of this club shall be the board of directors consisting of 11 members of this club, namely, 4 directors elected in accordance with article I, section 1, of these bylaws, the president, vicepresident, president-elect, secretary, joint secretary, treasurer, and the immediate past president.

#### **Article III Duties of Officers**

Section 1 — President. It shall be the duty of the president to preside at meetings of the club and board and to perform such other duties as ordinarily pertain to the office of president.

Section 2 — President-elect. It shall be the duty of the president-elect to serve as a member of the board of directors of the club and to perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the president or the board.

Section 3 — *Vice-President*. It shall be the duty of the vice-president to preside at meetings of the club and board in the absence of the president and to perform such other duties as ordinarily pertains to the office of vice-president.

Section 4 — Secretary. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep the records of membership, record the attendance at meetings, send out notices of meetings of the club, board and committees, record and preserve the minutes of such meetings, make the required reports to RI, including the semiannual reports of membership, which shall be made to the general secretary of RI on January 1st and July 1st of each year, and including prorated reports to the general secretary on 1 October and 1 April of each active member who has been elected to membership in the club since the start of the July or January semiannual reporting period, the report of changes in membership, which shall be made to the general secretary of RI, the monthly report of attendance at the club meetings, which



shall be made to the district governor within 15 days of the last meeting of the month, collect and remit to RI subscriptions to *THE ROTARIAN*, and perform such other duties as usually pertain to the office of secretary.

Section 5 — Treasurer. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to have custody of all funds, accounting for same to the club annually and at any other time upon demand by the board and to perform such other duties as pertain to the office of treasurer. Upon retirement from office, the treasurer shall turn over to the incoming treasurer or to the president all funds, books of accounts or any other club property.

Section 6 — Sergeant-at-Arms. The duties of the sergeant-at-arms shall be such as are usually prescribed for such office and such other duties as may be prescribed by the president or the board.

#### **Article IV Meetings**

Section 1 — Annual Meeting. An annual meeting of this club shall be held not later than 31 December in each year, at which time the election of officers and directors to serve for the ensuing year shall take place.

(Note: article V, section 2 of the standard Rotary club constitution provides that "An annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held not later than 31 December...")

Section 2 — The regular weekly meetings of this club shall be held on Monday at 17.30 hrs. Due notice of any changes in or canceling of the regular meeting shall be given to all members of the club. All members excepting an honorary member (or member excused by the board of directors of this club, pursuant to article VIII, section 2 (b) of the standard Rotary club constitution) in good standing in this club, on the day of the regular meeting, must be counted as present or absent, and attendance must be evidenced by the member's being present for at least sixty (60) percent of the time devoted to the regular meeting, either at this club or at any other Rotary club, or as otherwise provided in the standard Rotary club constitution, article VIII, section 1.

Section 3 — One-third of the membership shall constitute a quorum at the annual and regular meetings of this club.

Section 4 — Regular meetings of the

board shall be held on Friday of last week of each month. Special meetings of the board shall be called by the president, whenever deemed necessary, or upon the request of two (2) members of the board, due notice having been given.

Section 5 — A majority of the board members shall constitute a quorum of the board.

#### Article V Fees and Dues

Section 1 — The admission fee shall be Rs 1000 to be paid before the applicant can qualify as a member.

Section 2 — The annual membership dues shall be fixed by the Board of Directors, payable

Semi annually on the first day of July and of January.

#### Article VI Method of Voting

The business of this club shall be transacted by *viva voce* vote except the election of officers and directors, which shall be by ballot.

#### Article VII Committees Section 1 —

(a) The president shall, subject to the approval of the board, appoint the following standing committees:

Club Service committee Vocational Service committee

Community Service committee

International Service committee

- (b) The president shall, subject to the approval of the board, also appoint such committees on particular phases of club service, vocational service, community service and international service as deemed necessary.
- (c) The club service committee, vocational service committee, community service committee, and international service committee shall each consist of a chairman, who shall be named by the president from the membership of the board, and not less than two (2) other members.
- (d) The president shall be ex officio member of all committees and, as such, shall have all the privileges of membership thereon.
- (e) Each committee shall transact such business as is delegated to it in the bylaws and such additional business as may be referred to it by the president or the board. Except where special authority is given by the board, such committees shall not take action until a report has been

made to the board and approved by the board.

(f) The president may appoint one or more committees dealing with various aspects of youth activities, which, depending on their respective responsibilities, may be under any, or all, of the vocational service, community service, or international service committees. Where feasible and practicable in the appointment of such committees, there should be provision for continuity of membership, either by appointing one or more members for a second term or by appointing one or more members to a two-year term.

#### Section 2 — Club Service Committee.

- (a) The chairman of the club service committee shall be responsible for all club service activities and shall supervise and coordinate the work of all committees.
- (b) The club service committee shall consist of the chairman of the club service committee and the chairmen of all committees appointed on particular phases of club service.
- (c) The president shall, subject to the approval of the board, appoint the following

committees on particular phases of club service:

Attendance committee

Club bulletin committee

Fellowship committee

Magazine committee

Membership committee

Membership development committee

Program committee

Public relations committee

Appoint one member each year to the following committees:

Classifications committee

Rotary information committee

- (d) The president shall appoint the president-elect or vice-president to oversee and coordinate the work of the classifications, membership, membership development and Rotary information committees.
- (e) Where feasible and practicable in the appointment of club committees, there should be provision for continuity of membership, either by appointing one or more members for a second term or by appointing one or more members to a two-year term
- (f) The classifications and Rotary information committees shall each consist of three (3) members, one member of each committee to be appointed each year for a term of three (3) years. The first appointments made under this provision



shall be as follows: one member for a term of one year; one member for a term of two (2) years; one member for a term of three (3) years.

(g) The magazine committee shall, wherever feasible, include the editor of the club publication and a local newspaper or advertising member of the club.

## Section 3 — Community Service Committee.

- (a) The chairman of the community service committee shall be responsible for all community service activities and shall supervise and coordinate the work of all committees appointed on particular phases of community service.(b) The community service committee shall consist of the chairman of the community service committee and the chairmen of all committees appointed on particular phases of community service.
- (c) The president shall, subject to the approval of the board, appoint the following committees on particular phases of community service:
  Human development committee
  Community development committee
  Environmental protection committee
  Partners in service committee

#### **Article VIII Duties of Committees**

Section 1 — Club Service Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in discharging their responsibilities in matters relating to club service. The chairman of the club service committee shall be responsible for regular meetings of the committee and shall report to the board on all club service activities.

- (a) Attendance Committee. This committee shall devise means for encouraging attendance at all Rotary meetings - including attendance at district conferences, inter-city meetings. regional conferences, and international conventions by all club members. This committee shall especially encourage attendance at regular meetings of this club and attendance at regular meetings of other clubs when unable to attend meetings of this club; keep all members informed on attendance requirements: promote better incentives for good attendance; and seek to ascertain and remove the conditions that contribute to unsatisfactory attendance,
- (b) Classifications Committee. This committee shall as early as possible, but

no later than 31 August of each year, make a classification survey of the community; shall compile from the survey a roster of filled and unfilled classifications, applying the classification principle; shall review, where necessary, existing classifications represented in the club; and shall counsel with the board on all classification problems.

- (c) Club Bulletin Committee. This committee shall endeavor, through the publishing of a weekly club bulletin, to stimulate interest and improve attendance, announce the program of the forthcoming meeting, relate highlights of the previous meeting, promote fellowship, contribute to the Rotary education of all members, and report news of the club, of its members and of the worldwide Rotary program.
- (d) Fellowship Activities Committee. This committee shall promote acquaintance and friendship among the members, promote participation by members in organized, Rotary recreational and social activities, and do such work in pursuance of the, general object of the club as may be assigned by the president or the board. (e) Magazine Committee. This committee shall stimulate reader interest in THE ROTARIAN; sponsor a magazine month; arrange for brief monthly reviews of the magazine on regular club programs: encourage the use of the magazine in the induction of new members: provide a copy of the magazine for non-Rotarian speakers; secure international service and other special subscriptions for libraries, hospitals, schools and other reading rooms: send news items and photographs to the editor of the magazine and in other ways make the magazine of service to the club members and non-Rotarians.
- (f) Membership Committee. This committee shall consider all proposals for membership from the personal side and shall thoroughly investigate the character, business, social and community standing, and general eligibility of all persons proposed for membership and shall report their decisions on all applications to the board.
- (g) Membership Development Committee. This committee shall review continually the club roster of filled and unfilled classifications and shall take positive action to initiate and present to the board the names of suitable persons to fill unfilled classifications.
- (h) Program Committee. This committee shall prepare and arrange the programs for the regular and special meetings of

the club.

- (i) Public Relations Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect, plans (1) to give the public general information about Rotary, its history, object, and scope; and (2) to secure proper publicity for the club.
- (j) Rotary Information Committee. This committee shall inform prospective members about the privileges and responsibilities of Rotary club membership; keep members informed about the history, object and activities of Rotary at all levels; and oversee the orientation of new members during their first year in the club.

Section 2 — Vocational Service Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in discharging their responsibilities in their vocational relationships and in improving the general standards of practice in their respective vocations. The chairman of this committee shall be responsible for the vocational service activities of the club and shall supervise and coordinate the work of any committees that may be appointed on particular phases of vocational service.

Section 3 — Community Service Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans, which will guide and assist the members of this club in discharging their responsibilities in their community relationships. The chairman of this committee shall be responsible for the community service activities of the club and shall supervise and coordinate the work of any committees that may be appointed on particular phases of community service.

(a) Human Development Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in dealing within the community with the welfare of human beings of all kinds throughout the whole span of life by providing assistance and support to those in need.

(b) Community Development Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in working to make the community a better place to live by improving the physical condition of the community and its facilities.

(c) Environmental Protection Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist



the members of this club in monitoring and improving the quality of the community's environment.

(d) Partners in Service Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in building relationships with other Rotary-sponsored organizations within the community and in cooperating with them in service.

Section 4 — International Service Committee. This committee shall devise and carry into effect plans which will guide and assist the members of this club in discharging their responsibilities in matters relating to international service. The chairman of this committee shall be responsible for the international service activities of the club and shall supervise and coordinate the work of any committees that may be appointed on particular phases of international service.

#### Article IX Leave of Absence

Upon written application to the board, setting forth good and sufficient cause, leave of absence may be granted excusing a member from attending the meetings of the club for a specified length of time. (Note: Such leave of absence does operate to prevent a forfeiture of membership; it does not operate to give the club credit for the member's attendance. Unless the member attends a regular meeting of some other club, the excused member must be recorded as absent except that absence authorized under the provisions of article VIII, section 2(b) of the standard Rotary club constitution is not computed in the attendance record of the club.)

#### Article X Finances

Section 1 - The treasurer shall deposit all funds of the club in some bank to be named by the board.

Section 2 — All bills shall be paid only by checks signed by the treasurer upon vouchers signed by any two officers. A thorough audit by a certified public accountant or other qualified person shall be made once each year of all the club's financial transactions.

Section 3 — Officers having charge or control of funds shall give bond as may be required by the board for the safe custody of the funds of the club, cost of bond to be borne by the club.

Section 4 — The fiscal year of this club shall extend from July 1st to June 30th, and for the collection of members' dues shall be divided into two (2) semiannual periods extending from July 1st to December 31st, and from January 1st to June 30th. The payment of per capita dues and magazine subscriptions to RI shall be made on July 1st and January 1st of each year on the basis of the membership of the club on those dates.

(Note: Magazine subscriptions for members joining during a semiannual period are payable upon invoice from the Secretariat.)

Section 5 — At the beginning of each fiscal year the board shall prepare or cause to be prepared a budget of estimated income and estimated expenditures for the year, which, having been agreed to by the board, shall stand as the limit of expenditures for the respective purposes unless otherwise ordered by action of the board.

Article XI Method of Electing Members Section 1 — The name of a prospective member, proposed by an active member of the club, shall be submitted to the board in writing, through the club secretary. A transferring or former member of another club may be proposed to active membership by the former club. The proposal for the time being shall be kept confidential except as otherwise provided in this procedure.

Section 2 — The board shall ensure that the proposal meets all the classification and membership requirements of the club constitution.

Section 3 — The board shall approve or disapprove the proposal within 30 days of its submission, and shall notify the proposer, through the club secretary, of its decision.

Section 4 — If the decision of the board is favorable, the prospective member shall be informed of the purposes of Rotary and of the privileges and responsibilities of membership, following which the prospective member shall be requested to sign the membership proposal form and to permit his or her name and proposed classification to be published to the club.

Section 5 — If no written objection to the proposal, stating reasons, is received by the board from any member (other than

honorary) of the club within seven (7) days following publication of information about the prospective member, that person, upon payment of the admission fee (if not honorary membership), as prescribed in these bylaws, shall be considered to be elected to membership. If any such objection has been filed with the board, it shall vote on this matter at its

next meeting. If approved despite the objection, the proposed member, upon payment of the admission fee (if not honorary membership), shall be considered to be elected to membership.

Section 6 — Following the election, the president shall arrange for the induction of the new member; the club secretary shall issue a membership card and shall report the new member to RI; and the Rotary information committee shall provide appropriate literature for presentation at the induction and assign a member to assist in the assimilation of the new member.

#### Article XII Resolutions

The club shall consider no resolution or motion to commit this club on any matter until it has been considered by the board. Such resolutions or motions, if offered at a club meeting, shall be referred to the board without discussion.

#### Article XIII Order of Business

Meeting called to order.
Introduction of visiting Rotarians.
Correspondence and announcements.
Committee reports if any.
Any unfinished business.
Any new business.
Address or other program features.
Adjournment.

#### Article XIV Amendments

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting, a quorum being present, by a two-thirds

vote of all members present, provided that notice of such proposed amendment shall have been mailed to each member at least ten (10) days before such meeting. No amendment or addition to these bylaws can be made which is not in harmony with the club constitution and with the constitution and bylaws of RI.



## **ROTARY INFORMATION**

### **Key Rotary Messages**

Following are some Rotary key messages you may use in your PR materials or during a media interview:

- Rotary is a global network of community volunteers.
- Rotary works to improve the quality of life for all people.
- Rotary exists to do good in the world.
- Rotary is an international service organization of 1.2 million business and professional men and women who, as volunteers, address needs of their home and international communities.
- Rotary initiates local and global service projects to promote world understanding and peace and improve the life conditions for people of all ages and cultures. An example is PolioPlus through which Rotary is working to eradicate polio by 2005.
- Rotary's strength lies in the volunteer service of its membership, an international network of business and professional leaders implementing a wide range of programs to meet human needs.
- Rotarians are men and women of integrity who represent a cross-section of business and professional backgrounds. As volunteers of all ages, they work to meet community and international concerns.
- Rotary's strength is that it is both international and local. For example, today's critical problems, such as health and sanitation, hunger, and environmental deterioration, must be addressed at local levels. With more than 30,000 clubs in 163 countries, Rotary is ideally suited to address such problems.

## Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

- Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
- Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;

- Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

#### A Model Rotarian

Have you ever wondered what a Rotarian is like? Would I like to be one?

There are 1.3 million Rotarians of record in the world. And they are all different in many ways. But we can construct a model from the documents we all agree to support when we join the organization.

#### From the Object of Rotary:

A model Rotarian is:

- a person who seeks friendships as an opportunity for service a person with high ethical standards
- a person who recognizes the worth of every occupation and its potential for serving society
- a person who practices the ideal of Service Above Self in personal,

Community and business life

a person who seeks to advance international understanding, goodwill and peace through Rotary and through business and professional connections

#### From the Four-way Test

A model Rotarian is:

- a person who tells it like it is
- a person who is fair
- a person whose words and actions benefit others
- a person whose words and actions create good will

## RI Board Decisions Feb 3-7,2003

The Board introduced more flexibility into its criteria for districting. The RI Districting Committee will now look with favor upon proposals for the creation of additional districts with at least 60 clubs and/or 2,100 Rotarians that demonstrate a potential for growth to a least 75 clubs and 2,700 Rotarians in the next ten years. In reviewing districting proposals, the committee will also consider the following: the development of leadership, district governance, training, cultural and ethnic factors, the geographical distances involved, as well as financial and economic conditions.

Noting that few districts have agreed to consolidate in recent years, the Board approved additional incentives for district consolidation. The savings that accrue to RI from the merging of particular districts will now be allocated to the service projects of the newly merged district for a period of two years. Consolidated districts will receive prominent coverage in major Rotary publications and district leaders will be suitably recognized.



## A BRIEF HISTORY OF ROTARY

The world's first service club, the Rotary Club of Chicago, Illinois, USA, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to recapture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The name "Rotary" derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.

Rotary's popularity spread throughout the United States in the decade that followed; clubs were chartered from San Francisco to New York. By 1921, Rotary clubs had been formed on six continents, and the organization adopted the name Rotary International a year later.

As Rotary grew, its mission expanded beyond serving the professional and social interests of club members. Rotarians began pooling their resources and contributing their talents to help serve communities in need. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its principal motto: Service Above Self. Rotary also later embraced a code of ethics, called The 4-Way Test, that has been translated into hundreds of languages.

During and after World War II, Rotarians became increasingly involved in promoting international understanding. A Rotary conference held in London in 1942 planted the seeds for the development of the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO), and numerous Rotarians have served as consultants to the United Nations

An endowment fund, set up by Rotarians in 1917 "for doing good in the world," became a not-for-profit corporation known as <u>The Rotary Foundation</u> in 1928. Upon the death of Paul Harris in 1947, an outpouring of Rotarian donations made in his honor, totaling US\$2 million, launched the Foundation's first program — graduate fellowships, now called <u>Ambassadorial Scholarships</u>. Today, contributions to <u>The Rotary Foundation total more than US\$80 million annually and support a wide range of <u>humanitarian grants</u> and <u>educational programs</u> that enable Rotarians to bring hope and promote international understanding throughout the world.</u>

In 1985, Rotary made a historic commitment to immunize all of the world's children against polio. Working in partnership with nongovernmental organizations and national governments thorough its <u>PolioPlus</u> program, Rotary is the largest private-sector contributor to the global polio eradication campaign. Rotarians have mobilized hundreds of thousands of PolioPlus volunteers and have immunized more than one billion children worldwide. By the 2005 target date for certification of a polio-free world, Rotary will have contributed half a billion dollars to the cause.



First board meeting of Rotary International

As it approached the dawn of the 21st century, Rotary worked to meet the changing needs of society, expanding its service effort to address such pressing issues as environmental degradation, illiteracy, world hunger, and children at risk. The organization admitted women for the first time in 1989 and claims more than 90,000 women in its ranks today. Following the collapse of the Berlin Wall and the dissolution of the Soviet Union, Rotary clubs were formed or re-established throughout Central and Eastern Europe. Today, 1.2 million Rotarians belong to some 30,000 Rotary clubs in more than 160 countries.

## Conventions hold key place in Rotary history

When 60 Rotarians from 14 Rotary clubs came together in Chicago, Illinois, USA, in August 1910, they started the tradition of a yearly meeting - one that now draws 15,000 to 30,000 participants from more than 100 countries. In addition to establishing the National Association of Rotary Clubs, the delegates to the first Rotary convention also began the time-honored custom of closing the convention by singing "Auld Lang Syne."

The first 11 conventions were held in the United States, but since the 1921 meeting in Edinburgh, Scotland, the convention has moved around the world, finding a warm welcome in 55 cities in 21 countries. The United States has hosted 58 conventions, 6 of them in Chicago, Rotary's birthplace. Six conventions have been held in Canadian cities, and Mexico and France have hosted four each.

Over the years, the number of convention goers has grown dramatically. In 1978, the RI Convention in Tokyo set a standing attendance record of 39,834 that many Rotarians are hoping will be broken at the centennial convention in 2005. But size is only one factor that makes a Rotary convention great. For example, the 16,000 Rotarians who gathered in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, USA, in 1988 will never forget the exuberant celebration following the announcement that Rotarians had almost doubled their fundraising goal for PolioPlus.

In the early days, all important Rotary business was conducted at the convention. As Rotary grew, the triennial Council on Legislation became the organization's chief legislative meeting, and speeches and entertainment took center stage at the annual meeting. For most Rotarians, however, international fellowship is the convention's primary drawing card, and next month, thousands of members will enjoy that unique experience in Brisbane, Queensland, at the 94th RI Convention, the third to be held in Australia.

The 'average' Rotary club According to a recent Rotary International demographic survey, Rotary clubs worldwide have an average of 47 members, of whom 13 percent are women, 51 percent are between the ages of 40 and 59, and two-thirds have been Rotarians for six or more years.

The survey, sent to 10,500 Rotary clubs worldwide, had a 30 percent response rate.



## Digital Divide Project

The world today is divided between the 'haves' and 'havenots' not only by wealth but by a growing number of separations, including the access to knowledge and information which is provided through information technology -known as the digital divide. (While basics such as knowledge of the English language and the technical know-how of using computers are partly the cause of this separation, the heart of the "divide" lies in the financial expense of obtaining computers. Despite the world today becoming a global village, people in the south are deprived of the benefits in the development of information technology.) For most in Nepal, a computer is still a luxury. For children in public schools, the computer is in many cases just a word, which exists in books or in pictures. The Government has introduced computers as a subject in the curriculum and it is an optional 2 subject in class 9 and 10, but the schools are yet to receive any computers from the Government. We have started a project to challenge this digital divide.

This project was initiated parallel to the request to Dr. Bibek Pradhan of the Rotary Club of Mansfield. Rtn. Tulsi Maharjan of Rotary Club of Branchburg, New Jersey, USA District 7510 had expressed keen interest in supporting the project and started a fund raising campaign. In June 2001, I visited the Branchburg Club and also met with the District Governor. These meetings at Branchburg have been one of the most productive ones for me todate. They have resulted in the realization of the Digital Divide Matching Grant project and an annual contribution of \$500 from Rotary Club of Branchburg for our Scholarship project. The Matching Grant was approved to help provide 35 to 40 computers for public schools in Patan. Total funding available now is as follows:

The computers are being purchased locally. Competitive bidding has enabled us to procure 43 computers, as against 35 to 40 computers originally foreseen. Under this programme, computers are being provided to 13 schools with which we have a scholarship programme and have demonstrated capacity to make full use of the computer(s). One computer each in the schools will be fitted with an internal modem and CD-ROM. In addition, one printer and one volt guard each also will also be supplied to the schools.

Fortunately for us, 27 computers have also been received from UK about the same time, as has been stated by PP Pushkar Shakya in his article. We thus have a total of 70 (43 plus 27) computers which will be distributed at a special ceremony on 28 July 2003.

The computers will be distributed as follows:

It is intended that these seventy computers will provide the missing opportunity for students (and perhaps teachers) to broaden their horizons to many areas, countries and people. The added facilities of using the email and Internet should expand the cultural exchange between these students in Nepal and other students around the globe. We plan for the project to truly enhance the learning and education of young people in the schools of Patan. By ensuring a majority of the schools are linked to our scholarship program, we will be working with schools familiar to us and will facilitate the monitoring of the computers' maximum use. The responsibility of monitoring this aspect of the project developing net working with outside world will be undertaken by the Rotract Club of Patan

This Digital Divide project has received District 7510 Best International Project Award and also the Best Overall District Award. Rotarians of Branchburg are excited about the project and now plan to visit Nepal to see the project implementation and undertake its extension and expansion.

Thanks are due to Rtn. Tulsi Maharjan of Rotary Club of Branchburg for the support that will help in narrowing the Digital Divide.



## Senior Citizens Home is open for Ageing People

Rotary Club being a global organization providing support to the humanity in different avenue of services. Its one of the objectives is also very much concern to support aging people who are in problems of deteriorating health, loneliness, poor nutrition, lacking transportation facilities, inability to do customary work, loss of family associations, reduced recreational facilities, inadequate housing services and limited information about available social agencies for emergency services. In this contest, Senior Citizen's Home in Godawari is an unique initiation of the Rotary Club of Patan and Foerderkreis Hilfe Fur Nepal a Germany based NGO

This Home for the elderly people is situated 15 km away from Patan city. The building is situated in 29 ropanees of land with a panoramic beauty of nature combining of the jungle, farms, hills, mountains, villages, and the Himalayas. Now, the Home is open for residence to foreign and national citizens who are above the age of 65. In fact, it is a home and will provide the homely atmosphere. Rotary, being a non-profit organization, has considered the cost of fooding and lodging at the cost-to-cost basis.

This project is divided into three phases and the first phase has been completed with 16 double bed rooms with attached bath rooms, kitchen and dining, and health service center and the second and third phase master plan is ready for block B& C, when the fund will be available the remaining construction works will be initiated. The major components of the service areas are:

- to provide suitable accommodation to Senior Citizens who are economically well off but no help at home,
- to recognize and to utilize the expertise of the senor citizens in their respective fields of study and experiences for the humanitarian works closely associating with community and Rotary, so that they can be involved with the society in the respective service areas as per their wish,
- to provide accommodation to poor and deserving girl students from outside the Kathmandu valley, who wish to pursue higher education, and side by side residence girls will also be associated to support the SCH by doing part time work, and
- to support Kitini High School for upgrading its facilities for that 10+2 program and also can be upgraded the further higher classes.

Senior Citizen Home is managed by a Charity Trust registered in the Government. The Trust is constituted by the representation of three social organizations as Rotary Club of Patan, Ferderkreis Hilfe Fur Nepal and Citizen Charity Trust.

This project is based on the 4-way test, which are the ethical norms of Rotary as:

- 1. Is it the truth?
- 2. Is it fair to all concern?
- 3. Will it build friendships?
- 4. Will it be beneficial to all concern?

We Rotarians and the Trust are looking forward to well-come to the seniors to stay in this home and they will be benefited from 'service above self " motto of Rotary.

## Prajapati Education Endowment Fund

- Co-ordinator Rtn Er. Narayan G Halwai

#### Introduction

Prajapati Education Endowment Fund is a unique Rotary program of Rotary Club of Patan specifically initiated to serve the poor children. Currently, scholarships are provided to over 200 students a year. Scholarship amounting to just Rs 800 to 1500 a year is meant to supplement for the continuation of education of children from poor family. Students are selected in Class VI for scholarship and they continue to receive it till they pass out from school at Class X unless they failed in a class. This program is proud to mobilize Rs 2,228,782 as a trust fund and Rs 66,400 as annual contribution, bulk of it has been mobilized locally from Nepalese Rotarians.

Till date 540 school children, of which 57% are girl and 28% dalit students, in 40 public schools had received scholarship, name of the children and the schools are given in Annex A and B respectively. This year it has been awarded to 163 students in 20 schools and planned to distribute to 25 students each in Dukuchhap and Sunakothi VDCs. The fund has contributed Rs 78,000 towards Matching Grant contribution for Digital Divide Project, which will be distributing 43 computers to 13 public schools in Lalitpur District. Also provision has been made to support street children and destitute students.

#### Humble Beginning and Remarkable Growth

The scholarship programme initiated in 1989 had a modest beginning in 1992 by distributing scholarships from interest earning of the Scholarship Fund. The growth of fund and number of students receiving scholarship are shown below. Currently schools in remote areas are not covered due to security reason.

#### Monitoring Scholarship Program, 1999

A review of the programme was undertaken in 1999 with the participation of the grantees from a few schools, and their guardians and teachers with the initiation of Mr. Bihari Krishna Shrestha, then Rotarian and Coordinator of Scholarship Committee. The problems identified included a) difficulty in making regular payments to the grantees, b) uncertainty as to whether the most deserving were chosen for the grants, c) the lack of compulsion for the grantees to do better in studies and d) poor children who are not in school but need support are not covered by the program. In order to fine tune the fund's focus on poverty and achievement, the scholarship committee decided to launch a community-based initiative so that the grant could be exclusively targeted on children known to be poor and diligent while continuing the previous program.

#### Community Based Approach - A Pilot Prgramme

The community based approach is a cooperative scholar-ship programme where the concerned VDC also contribute towards the education fund. This was discussed with Tikathali, Dukuchhap (through Rotary Voluntary Corps of Dukuchhap) and Chhampi VDC for possible matching contribution from VDC. With positive response from Chhampi VDC, we introduced a pilot program in 2000/01 in 2 Wards (1 and 7) and carried out surveys to identify poor students. Based on the survey, we distributed 65 scholarships to highest scoring poor students and set aside 15 for poor children who were out of school but could not be distributed.

The survey was carried out intensively in all nine wards of Chhampi VDC in late 2001. The survey revealed a total of 155 out of school children in the Chhampi VDC. It was discussed that most of out of school children are no longer present in the village and it is estimated that about 65 out of school children live in the village.

Based on the survey, funds available and discussion with VDC, we proposed to distribute 155 scholarships to highest scoring students in all 9 Wards of VDC and another 65 set aside for out of school children. The share of RCP would be Rs 190,000 and that of VDC will be limited to Rs 30,000.

The scholarship was distributed in Ward No 1 to 8 to 145 students who were selected by VDC and first installment of Rs 500 was distributed on June 30, 2002. Out of 145, girl student constitute 49% and lower caste and minorities bagged 42%. The VDC has agreed that they will manage to arrange for distribution of 10 scholarships to students



from Wards No 9 and 65 scholarships to out of school children by middle of July 2002. It was also agreed with VDC that the success of the program lies on bringing out of school children to school by providing scholarship to them and thus the VDC and the schools must play an active role in getting these children to schools. It was planned to distribute second installment of Rs 500 in next six months. Besides this program, RCP was continuing distribution of 30 scholarships under previous school based program.

However, some issues surfaced with program in Chhampi – a) change in status of local government with no elected representative holding posts made it difficult for VDC to make available its share for distribution of second installment in time, b) VDC was not serious in bringing out of school children to school, c) "Child First" program was covering all the children with scholarships and d) merit scholarship among the poor students debar poorest student who are weak in study due to economic status. The Fund committee decided to discontinue the Chhampi program to avoid same children receiving scholarship both RCP and Child First scholarships.

#### New Approach – School Based Program

The Committee decided to continue the previous school based scholarship program. In School year 2002-03, a minimum of 4 scholarships were provided to each school. The program was reviewed again and it was agreed to provide scholarship to 4 new students every year in each school in Class VI while continuing scholarship to old students and provide a merit scholarship to a student who stood first in Class, to begin with Class VI in Year 2003-04 and Class VI and VII in 2004-05 and so on. Also it was decided to continue with community based approach to bring out of school children to schools. All these activities will require additional resources and it was agreed to vigorously engage in resource mobilsation. The program and budget for school year in 2003-04 is given below.

#### Selection Procedure of New Student

New students for scholarship are selected in Class 6 and scholarships are continued till they pass out from school unless they failed. For new children to be selected in Class VI, the headmaster prepares a list of 8 students based on economic and parental status of the children. RCP Fund Committee Member personally interviews all eight students and selects 4 new students based mainly on economic condition of the family as parental status and their profession, members generating income and enrolled in school. It is really difficult to reject four children out of 8 proposed.

Other VDCs, Dukuchhap and Sunakothi, have shown positive response towards this community based approach. Household surveys have been completed and out of school children were identified. RCP has planned to provide 25 scholarship each to Dukuchhap and Sunakothi in this year.

#### Issues Identified

There is concern on the scholarship sum being too small, Rs 100/month and should be increased. It is argued that the scholarship is just a supplementary and need not be adequate to cover all the expenses required for education of a child. Our target is to provide scholarship for 1000 students, let us achieve this target, then only we should consider increasing the amount.

#### Commitments

Our present commitment is to continue providing 4 new scholarships for students in Class VI every year in each school while continuing scholarship to old students being promoted to higher classes. To keep the present commitment, we will have to provide scholarship to 4 students each in Class VI to Class X and one merit scholarship each from Class VII to Class X in about 25 schools. Financial requirement would be as follows:

To meet above commitment, providing scholarship to 600 students, we must be able to mobilize almost additional 1.5 times of present resources. With the present trend of fund swelling and support of Rotarian collegues, we hope to mobilize adequate resources otherwise the commitment will have to be curtailed. Our final target to provide scholarship to 1000 students is still hold good and is far ahead.

Appeal

Till date only 20 Rotarians out of 42 members of RCP have made contribution to this fund. It is true that annual contributors name will be dropped in the list of contributors in Souvenir issue once the contribution is discontinued. It is thus worth to contribute to a trust fund rather than annual contribution. I appeal all the Rotarian friends to support the program and generously contribute voluntarily to it and make the PP Education Endowment Fund Program a success with 100% participation of our club members so that we could extend it to other Clubs as

## Dreaming of Computer Project

It was year 2000/2001 as I was President elect for that year, my mind was not stable, always dreaming and thinking what should I do next year as I was going to be president of the club. I was thinking I must do some thing which will benefit the society, and the country. Thus I thought, I must give total concentration on the education where all the Rotarian will be happy to do so. I thought, why not strengthen the P. P Education Endowment fund where this fund could play vital role in contribution to the society, by giving scholarships to the poor genuine students. My mind started to calculate how to increase the fund in this account. With all ideas on my mind I went to meet Rotarian Chandra Shekher Gyawali at his office. I put my proposal for the brainstorming. He said, why only endowment fund, why not to think giving the computer know how to the students of public school of Patan Sub-municipality. In this present world computer illteracy is like not having arms to go to the depth of knowledge. Thus, the idea was created to hunt for the used computers around the Rotary world. I wrote to Dr. Bibek Bahadur Pradhan who resides in UK as to how he can help us to bring the used and upgraded computers, so that we can introduce the computer classes in the schools where the Government could not facilitate the computer classes till today; the efforts continued. Many offers were received which encouraged me, but there was a big slash when I came to know about the rules of not permitting to import the used computers by the Ministry of Environment. It was a big blow to me. I do not understand what idea or pressure groups makes the ministry to publish such rules, by which the opportunity to know how for the children has been taken away. If these rules were published by the pressure groups efforts I would say they are very shortsighted business communities who believe in quick money makings only. They forget more computer knowledge to the people means more business opportunities for the future. Why they forget in the long run they are the ones who sell more computers to these educated children. I think The Ministry of Environment of His Majesty's of Government must revise and make rules and implement the idea of mass education of computers to students of public school as well as all the schools. The Rotarians being member with the idea of "giving" and their belief in "Service above Self" is laudable. If Government has commitments of giving mass education to children of Nepal, we Rotarians can help bring more computers to the public schools.

However, with the continued efforts of Dr.Bibek and financial support of Rotarian Frank Lord of Rotary club of The Chesterfield U.K, we are in position to bring 27 computers into the country. Now we are planning to give 16 computers to Patan High School, the oldest school in Patan. We would like to make it a pilot project and the focal point for training of computer teachers from different schools in Patan in this fiscal year itself. The teachers then can start computer classes in their school too.

In the mean time, with efforts of our President Elect for 2002/2003 Rotarian Siba Bhakta Rajbhandary we are in position to bring more funds to buy new computers to distribute to various schools in Patan. Thanks go to him as well as Dr.Tulshi Maharjan who has been residing in New Jersey, USA and his club. Details of this project are given in Rotarian Rajbhandary's article.

Thanks to Dr. Bibek for his support making a start of the computer project.

रोटरी क्लबको सामुदायिक सेवा अन्तर्गत धेरै नै स्वास्थ्यसँग प्रोजेक्टहरु सञ्चालित छन् । नेपालमा सञ्चालित स्वास्थ्य परियोजनाहरु मध्ये रोटरी क्लब पाटन कै सिक्रयतामा स्थापित अथोंपेडिक हस्पिटल र भक्तपुर क्यान्सर हस्पिटल उल्लेखनीय छन् । यी ठूला प्रोजेक्टहरु मध्येका हुन् । यसका अतिरिक्त ससाना थुप्रै परियोजनाहरु पिन छन् जसबाट नेपाली जनता लाभान्वीत भएका छन् । यसै सन्दर्भमा आगामी वर्षका लागि एक अर्को ठूलो प्रोजेक्ट प्रस्तावित हुन गैरहेको छ जसको बारेमा छोटो जानकारी दिन चाहन्छ ।

यो मुटु रोगको उपचारका लागि अस्पतालको स्थापना गर्ने प्रस्ताव हो । प्रश्न उठ्छ मुटु रोग नै किन ? किनकी यसको समस्या अत्याधिक मात्रामा बढ्दो छ र विश्व स्वास्थ्य संघको भविष्य वाणी अनुसार आगामी १० वर्षमा नेपाल तथा वरपरका क्षेत्रहरुमा यसको महामारी फैलनेछ जसबाट प्रत्येक घर परिवारमा १ जना व्यक्ति हार्ट अट्याक भएर अल्पायू मै मर्ने छन् । शहरीकरण र विकासको साथ साथै मुटुको रोग पनि परालमा आगो सल्किएर फैलिए जस्तै अति छिटो फैलिदै गैरहेको छ । आज नेपालका शहरी क्षेत्रहरुमा १० प्रतिशत जनता मुटुको रोगबाट पीडित छन् । मुटुको रोगले बाल्यकाल देखि नै आक्रमण गर्दछ । स्कूल जाने उमेरका धेरै नै बालबालिकाहरु बाथ मुटुको रोगबाट पीडित छन् । उपचारको अभावमा यिनीहरुले बाल्यावस्थामै ज्यान गुमाउनु परिरहेको छ । साधारण घाँटी दुख्ने फ्यारिञ्जाइटिसको समस्याबाट शुरु भएर जोर्नी दुख्ने बाथमा विकसित हुने अनी मुटुमा रोग पुगेर मुटुका भल्भहरुलाई बिगार्ने यो रोगलाई शुरुको अवस्थामै उपचार गरेको खण्डमा थोरै पैसाले रोग पूर्ण रुपले निको पार्न सिकन्छ । यस सम्बन्धमा जनचेतना जगाउने काम मात्रे गर्न सके पनि धेरै नै बाल बालिकाहरुलाई मृत्युबाट जोगाउन सिकन्थ्यो होला । अब रोटरी क्लबहरुले यस तर्फ पनि केहि कार्य गर्नु पर्दछ भन्ने मलाई लाग्दछ ।

हार्ट अट्याक अर्को ठूलो समस्या हो । छाती दुख्न शूरु भएको १ घण्टा भित्र आइ.सि.यू. मा राखेर उपचार गर्न सके मुटुलाई क्षति पुग्नबाट पूर्ण रुपले जोगाउन सिकन्छ । ढिला भए ज्यानै जान सक्छ । हाम्रो देशमा मुटु रोगको उपचारका लागि उपलब्ध सुविधाहरु ज्यादै नै सिमित छन् । पाटनमा त यस सम्बन्धि सुविधा छदै छैन भने पिन हुन्छ । कुनै पाटनबासीलाई हार्ट अट्याक भयो भने उपचारका लागि बाग्मती तरेर काठमाडौँ पुग्नु पर्छ । त्यहाँ पिन आइ.सि.यू बेड खाली रहेनछ भने उपचारमा ढिलाई हुन्छ र ज्यान खतरामा पर्छ । सरकारी स्तरबाट सञ्चालित बीर अस्पताल, टिचिङ्ग अस्पताल र शहिद गंगालाल राष्ट्रिय मुदुरोग केन्द्रमा बिरामीहरुको चाप यित धेरै छ कि इमर्जेन्सी परेको बेलामा बेड नै पाइदैन । मुटुको अप्रेशन गराउनलाई १ वर्षको लाइनमा कुर्नु पर्छ । कुर्दा कुर्दै धेरैको ज्यान गैसकेको हुन्छ ।

पाटनमा सञ्चालित पाटन अस्पतालमा मुटुरोग उपचारको सुविधा छैन । ५ लाख जनसंख्या भएको लिलतपुरवासीहरु मुटुरोग जस्तो खतरनाक समस्याको उपचारबाट बञ्चित हुनु परिरहेको अवस्था छ । यसै सन्दर्भमा लिलतपुरमा रोटरी क्लबको सिक्रयतामा एउटा मुटु रोग उपचार केन्द्रको स्थापना गर्न किन प्रयास नगर्ने भन्ने कुरा उठेको हो । पाटनमा एउटा नेपाल हार्ट फाउण्डेशन नामक संस्था छ जसले मुटु रोगीहरुको उपचारका लागि लिलतपुर हार्ट क्लिनिक मार्फत केहि कार्यहरु गरिराखेको छ । यस संस्थासँग करिब १ करोड मूल्य बराबरका उपकरणहरु पनि छन् । यसले मुटुको अस्पताल स्थापना गर्ने लक्ष्य पनि लिएको छ । यस कारण पाटन रोटरी क्लबहरु मिलेर एउटा रोटरी मुटु रोग अस्पतालको प्रोजेक्ट ल्याउन सके लिलतपुरवासीहरुको ठूलो कल्याण हुने थियो साथै समय मै उपचार नपाएर अकाल मै मरिन्छ कि भन्ने त्राश कम हुने थियो ।

यो ठूलो प्रोजेक्ट हो त्यस कारण लागानी पनि ठूलै गर्नु पर्ने हुन्छ । राम्रो सबै सुविधाहरु भएको मुदुरोग अस्पताल स्थापना गर्न १५-२० करोड रुपैया लगानी गर्नु पर्ने हुन्छ । सबै क्लबहरु मिलेर यस प्रोजेक्टलाई अगाडी बढाउने हो भने यो अवश्य सफल हुन्छ । यो प्रोजेक्टलाई विभिन्न चरणमा सम्पन्न गर्न सिकेन्छ । विश्व मैं नं १ हत्याराको उपाधी पाइसकेको मुदुरोगको उपचार केन्द्र स्थापना गर्न अन्तराष्ट्रिय स्तरबाट पनि प्रशस्त सहयोग प्राप्त हुन सक्ने कुरामा म विश्वस्त छु । हामी सबै एकजूट भएर यसमा लाग्यौ भने चाडै नै ललितपुरमा "रोटरी मुदुरोग उपचार केन्द्र" स्थापना हुने छ ।

वीसवर्ष नाघिसक्यो यस कराको, नेपालमा हामीले आफनो डिस्टिक्ट बनाउन अभै सकेका छैनौं अर्को एउटा कुराको याद आउंछ मलाई रोटरीका करा सम्झदा । म त्यसवेला पनि काठमाण्डु रोटरी क्लब मै थिएँ । यो दिल्ली गएको वेलाको कुरा हो सन् १९८० तिरको । सन् १९८० तिर भारतको नयाँ दिल्लीमा आर.आई. प्रेसिडेण्टको एउटा साउथ एसियन कन्भेन्सन अफ गुडविल भन्ने रोटरी आयोजना भएको थियो । नेपालमा काठमाण्डुमा एउटा र विराटनगनरमा एउटा गरी जम्मा दुईवटा मात्र रोटरी क्लब थिए त्यसबेलासम्म । विराटनगर करिब-करिब निस्क्रिय जस्तो थियो क्यारे. त्यस कन्भेन्सनमा नेपालको प्रतिनिधित्व गर्ने रोटरी क्लब अफ काठमाडौं मात्र भयो । त्यहाँ अरु कार्यक्रमका अतिरिक्त कन्ट्री- रिपेजेन्टेटिभ भएर नेपाली रोटेरियनले पनि केही बोल्नुपर्ने थियो । त्यहाँ गएका साथीहरुले त्यो बोल्नेमा मलाई पठाइदिए र मैले त्यति ठूलो सभामा बोल्नुपऱ्यो । म निकै डराएको थिएँ । नेपालमा रोटरीको स्थितिबारे प्रतिवेदन दिनुपर्थ्यो । तर नेपालमा केही भएका थिएन विशेष, त्यसैले भन्नु पर्ने कुरा सान्है कम थिए । कसैसंग के बोलूँ भनेर सोध्ने कुरा भएन, नेपालवारे लेखेर केही लगेको पनि थिएन, त्यसै हँदा मैले आफुनो बुद्धिले अलि "बढ्ता" क्रा बोलें । मैले भने (मोटामोटी रुपमा)- नेपालमा रोटरी क्लब भित्रिएको दई दसक नाधिसक्यो तर त्यहाँ रोटरी फस्टाएन, दुईभन्दा बढी कलब स्थापना हुन पनि सकेका छैन । यो किन भयो, रोटरीका नियमहरु नै दोषी छन् कि नेपालीहरुमा केही कमी छ- रोटरी इन्टरनेशनलले अध्ययन गरिहेर्नुपऱ्यो । नेपाल, रोटरीका लागि केस- स्टडी गर्नुपर्ने विषय हो जस्तो मलाई लाग्छ । इत्यादि । मैले भनेको कुरा रोटरीका ठूलाठालुहरुले त्यो मननपराएको भेउ मैले पाएको थिएँ त्यहाँ ।

### FRIENDSHIP AS A BASIS FOR SERVICE

It was through a common friend Ms. Olga that I came into contact with Rtn. Robert Rose a few years back. It must be the meeting of two like-minded people that we got involved in various Rotarian projects over the years. One of them involved the Welfare Society for the Hearing Impaired at Bal Mandir, Naxal.

The Welfare Society for the Hearing Impaired (WSHI) Nepal is a national corporate body in the social sector geared to improve the quality of life of the hearing impaired people in Nepal since 1984. Its objectives are:

- Offering education, training and employment opportunities to the children with hearing impairment with a view to make them productive citizens of Nepal.
- To rehabilitate those deaf who are without parents/ guardians and are unable to find means of livelihood for themselves.
- c. To contribute to the proper diagnostic treatment, control and prevention of deafness.

In order to meet these objectives WSHI is involved in various activities. Besides its Central School located at the Bal Mandir, Naxal, it manages similar schools at Dharan, Rajbiraj, Bhairawa, Surkhet and Pokhara.

Since January 1995, WSHI has been running a four-year project "Support to the Nepalese Deaf and Hard of Hearing People". This project covers training of the teachers, refresher training for the teachers, sign language training of the parents/relatives of deaf, technical support service to the Basic and Primary Education Project/Special Education Unit, development of curriculum and teachers guides, development of teaching and educational materials and guidance and counseling services to parents at central and district level

Future activities of the WSHI include:

- a. Training on Education of Deaf
- b. Nepali Sign Language training
- c. Counseling services to parents
- d. Interpreters training
- e. Training on use of teachers guide.

The financial resources of WSHI comprises of:

- a. Budgetary allocation from HMG
- b. Student fees
- c. Grants and assistance from International Agencies.

In the Rotary Year 2001/2002, Rotary Club of Patan and Rotary Club of Bellevue, Seattle (where Rob is a Past President), got together to implement an International Humanitarian matching grant project (No. 17790) to assist WSHI. The project involved the following elements:

- a. Adding one floor in the existing building of WSHI.
- Furnish a recreational Hall for the use of the deaf students.
- Furnish a library for the deaf students including books.
- d. Provide computers for the use of the deaf students
- e. Provide a bus for the use of the deaf students.

As the matching grant fund could not be used for construction, Robert Rose and his Mother Arlene Rose paid towards the cost of the floor addition in memory of their father/husband Mr. Kenneth J. Rose. The matching grant fund was used to provide all the other items listed above. The total cost of the project was NPR 19,73452.00. The project was completed within the stipulated time frame.

It is because of the Rotary movement that Rob and I were able to become very good friends over the years. This friendship was the basis of this project which I believe will help the hearing impaired youths of Nepal to develop their talent.

Thank you Rotary for giving us this opportunity to serve.
