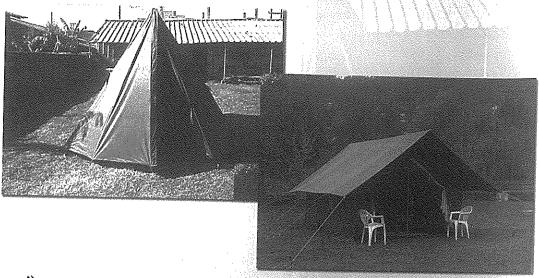

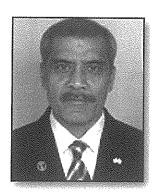

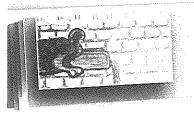

Club-owned Community Service Projects

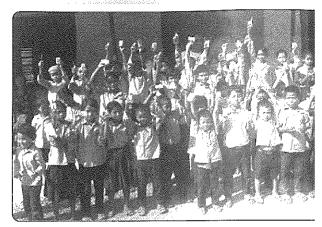
RC Patan has been able to raise substantial funds through efforts of its members for a wide range of community service projects and has disbursed close to NRs 1.2 million during this Rotary Year 2012/13. Some highlights are given below:

PEEF Scholarships: Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF) scholarships are given to 692 students in 28 schools of Lalitpur District. PEEF was established in 1991 and is supported solely through contributions raised by members of RC Patan, their family and friends. During this RY 2012/13, over NRs. 1 million are being distributed. The distribution trips to schools are done by RC Patan member, Anns and relatives. The Trust Fund of the Prajapati Education Endowment has now reached close to 9 Million Rupees.

Village Development Programme through RCC and School Mid-day Meals: RC Patan Mid-day Meal Project established in May 2009 with the aim of improving the nutritional status of under-nourished children of the Chepang community in Devi Bhanjyang Rastriya Primary School in Chandibhanjyang. Financial support to provide midday meal for 170 students 3 times a week. In 2012/13 donation of NRs 82,600 were provided. This Rotary Year RCP was able to attract a New Donor for the Mid-Day Meal Programme- Sajha Pasal Sewa, Patan Dhoka, Lalitpur contributed NRs. 60,000.

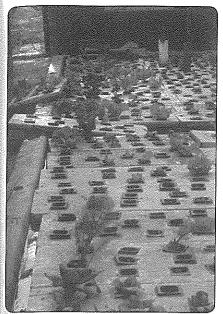

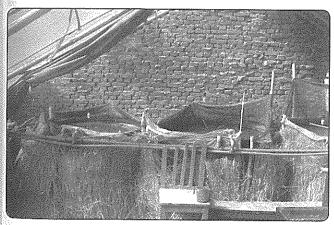
Completed Matching Grants

Four MG projects were completed in the amount of 188,419. These projects are:



MG 76730 Aguaponics: This is an innovative pilot project conducted for the first time in Nepal that combines fish and vegetable farming. Estimated funding total: US\$ 20,403. Partners: RC of Patan of District 3292; RC of Brussels Forêt de Soignes-District 2170 Belgium, with France-RC Versailles Parc.

Germany – RC Heidelberg Alte Brücke and RC Brussels South and Brussels Tercoigne and the Rotary Foundation. Local Partner: The New Life Centre, Lalitpur, in association with Nepal Youth Foundation and Friends of Needy Children. Technical Advice from Aquaponics Ltd UK. Beneficiaries: More than 100 Children and Women affected by HIV/AIDs and their families.

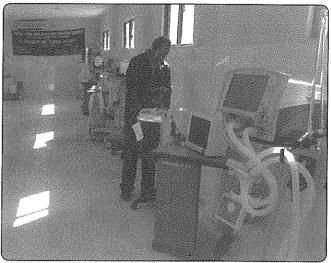

MG 76992 Medical Equipment to Nepal Orthopedic Hospital: This MG is part of the long-standing support of RC Patan to the development of the Nepal Orthopedic Hospital. Funding total: US\$ 75,450 plus US\$ 21,689 in outside funding. Partners: RC of Patan – District 3292; RC of Maldegem – District 1620 (Luc Salens Belgium); and RC of Brugge; RC Brugge't Vrije; RC Tenerife, RC Kasthamandap and RC Kathmandu West; District Funds and the Rotary Foundation. The project funded two ventilators with accessories, an anaesthesia machine and a shaver for arthroscope. Beneficiaries: Many 100rds of patients of the Nepal Orthopedic Hospital annually.



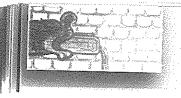


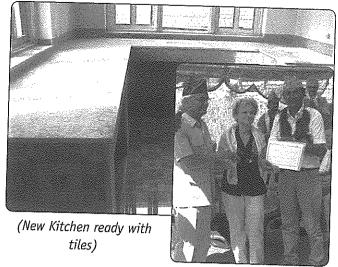

MG 76482 Equipment to CFO children village: The project provided furniture, tiles and parqueting for the new buildings at the CFO children village in Dhading. Total Funding: US\$ 46,115. Partners: RC of Patan of District 3292; RC of Bad Wörishofen – District 1840; District Funds and the Rotary Foundation. Local Partner: Children Future Organization (CFO) and Carisimo in Germany. Beneficiaries: 60 children at the CFO children village annually.



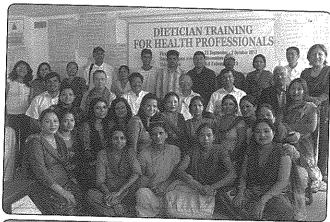

MG 76909 Second Phase Dietician training: The project trained 25 Dieticians and conducted a Nutrition Outreach Camp in Jogimara VDC of Dhading. Total Funding: US\$ 24,762. Partners: RC of Patan of District 3292; RC Ignacio; RC Central Main; RCSF China Town - District 5150; District Funds and the Rotary Foundation. Local Partner: in association with Nepal Youth Foundation. Beneficiaries: 25 Dieticians and 100rds of community members.

3-H Grant - Disability Awareness: The 3-H Grant 62861 between the RC Patan District 3292 and RC Bellevue District 5030 has been successfully completed. The US\$ 300,000 grant provided funds to launch an integrated multi-media awareness campaign to overcome disability prejudices in Nepal.

RCP handed over NRs 50,000 to the Community Based Rehabilitation Organization in Patan, on behalf of 3 H Grant Disability Awareness Project. The funds will assist in conducting a vocational computer training programme for the physically challenged for one year. The project has also handed over two computers, printers and office furniture upon closure of the 3H Grant project.



New Matching Grants

MG78847 Mammography Equipment to Bhaktapur Cancer Hospital: The project aims to purchase a Mammography Machine for Bhaktapur Cancer Hospital. Total Funding: US\$ 28,617. Partners: RC Patan, District 3292; RC Grapevine, District 5790. Local Partner: Bhaktapur Cancer Hospital. Beneficiaries: 100rds of Women annually.

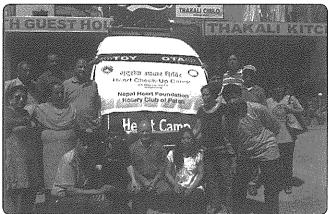

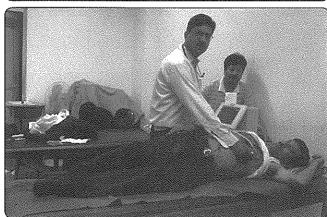

Rheumatic Heart Disease Prevention Program: A Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD) prevention training was conducted on 12 March 2013 by Rtn Dr. Prakash R. Regmi to Interacts of Rato Bangala and Rotaracts of Patan.

Health Camp in Manthali, Ramechap: Heart Health Camp at Baglung was jointly organized by the Nepal Heart Foundation and RC Patan on 24 March 2013 at the Baglung Hospital. About 400 patients were seen and 165 ECGs and 85 ECHO tests conducted. Six doctors and 4 technicians assisted and medicines worth NRs 30 000 were distributed. Six members of RCP, two Inner wheel members were present. Many new cases of hypertension, diabetes, rheumatic heart disease and heart attack were detected. In addition Public Awareness Programmes were organised in Beni of Myagdi, Kushma of Parbat and Baglung. Large number of local people participated in these events.

आदिकवि भनेको त सबभन्दा पहिले कविता लेखने विद्वान् हो, तर भानुभक्तले नेपाली भाषामा सबभन्दा पहिले किवता लेखे भनेर उनलाई आदिकिव भिनएको होइन । उनले पिहलो पटक नेपालीमा ठूलो ग्रन्थ सात काण्ड रामायण लेखे । त्यसलाई लोकले मन पराए, उनी सबैका प्रिय भए । त्यसअघि त्यति लोकप्रिय बन्ने किव अर्को कोही भएको थिएन । त्यसैले काठमाण्डूको भोसिको टोलमा जन्मेका एक जना युवा किव, विद्वान् मोतीराम भट्टले खोजखाज गरेर उनको जीवनी नै लेखे । त्यतिमात्र होइन भानुभक्तले लेखेको रामायण पिन छापी त्यसको धेरै प्रचार गराए । अनि यी हाम्रा आदिकिव हुन् भनेर सर्वप्रथम घोषणा गरे १९४८ साल, सन् १८९१ मा ।

भानुभक्तलाई आदि या प्रथम किव भनेर त्यसै भिनएको होइन । अनेक जातजातिमा बाँडिएका नेपालीहरूलाई एउटै सूत्रमा बाँध्ने काम पिन गरे उनले । भानुभक्तको रामायणले गन्यो त्यो काम । पिश्चिममा देहरादून, भाग्सू धर्मशालादेखि पूर्वमा दार्जीलिङ, आसाम र बर्मासम्मका छिरएका नेपाली जातिलाई एक ढिक्को बनाउने काम भानुभक्तको रामायणले गन्यो, त्यसभित्रको मीठो नेपाली भाषाले गन्यो । भानुभक्तको रामायण एउटा धार्मिक ग्रन्थ भएर मात्र यसरी लोकप्रिय भएको होइन । सुनी रहूँ, पिढरहूँ जस्तो लाग्ने मिठासपूर्ण काव्य भएर नै त्यो यसरी मान्छेको मनमा भित्रसम्म छिर्न सकेको हो ।

नेपालमा, नेपालीमै पनि धेरै कवि भए यसबीच तर यसरी वुई सय वर्षसम्म एकनास, अविच्छिन्न रूपमा जनमानसमा छाइरहन सक्ने अर्को कवि नेपालले जन्माउन सकेको छैन । त्यसै हुँदा नै होला सरकारले पनि भानुभक्तको यो द्वीशतवार्षिकीलाई यति महत्व दिएको मलाई त्यस्तै लाग्छ ।

HEALTH MANAGEMENT

Techniques for Vibrant Health:

The following techniques may be adopted to maintain excellent health:

- Attitude: The mind plays a tremendous role in maintaining good health. People with confidence and courage normally have good health. Fear, guilt and worries are ruinous to health. Have firm faith in the adaptive mechanism of your body. Don't be over concerned with your health.
- Activate the Subconscious Mind: Positive affirmations ,such as "Day by day, in every way, I am getting better and better health", would activate your subconscious mind and thereby improve your health.
- **Moderation:** The general rule for excellent health is moderation in everything. Be conscious of this at all times in your wakeful state.
- Diet: This is a matter of habit depending upon our cultural background. One man's food may be another man's poison. The type of food we eat is not important, but it is important that we eat only foods conducive to good health. Vegetarian food is to be preferred over non-vegetarian. Avoid overeating.
- Elimination: Total evacuation of the bowels everyday is a must. Take two or three tumblers of warm water early in the morning.
- Develop Resistance Power: Between four and six in the evening take three sweet limes, removing only the rind and seeds. This is far better than the juice, as it provides you fiber. The vitamin C in the sweet lime will develop resistance power in your body and prevent many diseases.
- Sleep: Sleep recoups your body and mind. Restful sleep is a must for all. But too much sleep would make you lazy and lethargic. Sleep less and live longer is the axiom. Proper sleep contributes a lot in gaining excellent health.
- Habits: Develop habits conducive to good health and avoid those that are detrimental, such as smoking, drinking and drug addiction.

Yoga: For at least half an hour daily, practice yogic asanas, pranayama and meditation. Yoga is an important ingredient for perfect health.

Daily Action:

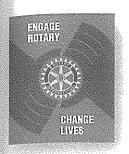
- As soon as you get up repeat (20 times) "Make me a child again just for today".
- Drink 3 glass of warm water with three pearls of garlic.
- Instead of 3 glass of warm water, you may have honey and lemon in warm water.
- Before taking bath have one bucket full of cold water. Breathe in, retain and then dip your eyes in water.
- Practice Surya Namaskar.
- Make an attempt to be always at meditative level by practicing aware and beware techniques.
- Vegetarian food is preferably better.
- Eat plenty of vegetables and fruits.
- Reduce the intake of coffee, Tea and also Soft drinks.
- Maintain inner and outer silence.
- Don't be too much concerned with health, lesser you worry better it is for your health.

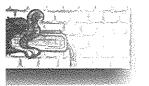

Prajapati Education Endowment Fund-Educatoion for Nepali Schhol Children

Rotary Club of Patan (RCP), Nepal has been spearheading initiatives in the field of education for the last 23 years out of a commitment towards the intellectual development of the youth from the socially disadvantaged in the country. The Nepalese government had declared its commitment to free primary and, since a few years, secondary education for all and also to provide small grant to all girl students and students from Janjati communities. However, the government's coverage does not include all school related expenses. Therefore, in order to encourage lower-income families to continue sending their children to school, RCP initiated this programme. Some important highlights are summarized below:

A. Achievement of the Program

- 1. Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) established the "Prajapati Education Endowment Fund" (PEEF) in 1991 and simultaneously launched a scholarship programme to bridge the educational expenses gap for children from economically underprivileged families RCP programme scholarship implemented the government schools, each year selecting four students enrolled in class 6 to receive financial assistance until the completion of class 10 as a supplement to family expenses on education. The need-based assistance package has been offered on a staggering scale to take into account student's educational performance. From the school year 2011/2012, the package has been maximized for all (Rs. 1,500 per child), with higher amounts (Rs. 2,000 per child) to recognize students performing with distinction of 75% and more.
 - To date, 2150 students from 50 schools have been benefitted from this program, of which 58% girls.
 So far 733 have completed Class 10 receiving the support for 5 years. Currently about 700 students in 29 schools are receiving financial support.
 - Through generous donations from fellow Rotarians, friends and relatives of Rotarians, other charitable institutions and individuals, RCP has mobilized Rs 9,193,117 towards trust fund and annual contribution

of Rs 152,000 (as of June 30, 2013). A total of 187 individuals and institutions have supported the program as listed in Table 1. A sum of Rs 1,223,739 was mobilized in Year 2012-2013. Effort of PP Rtn. Siba Rajbhandary is commendable, who had mobilized 30 % of total fund and 75% fund mobilised in Year 2012-2013. The Trust fund is deposited as fixed deposits in financial institutions and interest from these fixed deposits together with annual contribution is used to support the students. As of June 30,2013, the amount of fixed deposits has reached to Rs 7,757,265 and saving account balance to Rs 4,85,417.

- 4. A total of Rs 1,091,900 is planned for distribution in School year 2013-2014, of which distribution is completed in 24 schools out of 29. Sixteen Rotarians, Annes and Office secretary were involved in distribution.
- According to Auditor's advice, expenditures made from Trust Fund on projects (toilet and library) and scholarship distribution should be considered as loan to the Club and duly recovered. This has been accepted by the Club and will be implemented accordingly.

B. Management of the Scholarship Programme

6. Management: The Fund is managed by a RCP Committee which meets regularly to discuss policies and practices. Every 3-4 months a progress report, including detailed account is submitted to the RCP General Meeting. All activities, from record-keeping, liaising with donors, communicating with schools, selecting suitable candidates, and checking-up on student performance are conducted by the RCP team in a transparent manner and on a voluntary basis. In addition to the resources, the donation of valuable time and expertise by the highly motivated Rotarians and their family members have ensured heavy reduction on overhead costs to manage this model scholarship programme. The RCP Management Committee of the PEEF is also looking into best options for investment of the Trust Fund in the context of fluctuating interest rates with a downward trend and the need to secure adequate funds to cover annual requirements.

- 7. Selection Criteria: Students are selected on the basis of their economic need. In order for students to qualify for assistance, the RCP Selection Committees take into account the following RCP criteria:
 - low income household/inability to pay for school fees, books, stationary and other educationrelated costs
 - part of a large family with many children/schoolgoing siblings
 - no father or mother or both
 - not working as domestic helpers whose education would be the responsibility of the house owner.
- 8. How Funds are Raised: A onetime contribution of NPR 20,000 or USD 250 supports one student's scholarship for perpetuity through interest earned from investing these funds in secured, maximum interest-bearing accounts by Rotary. With the growth in the number of students supported, RCP has decided to advocate only this mechanism (stopping any new annual contributions), as this ensures continuity of the scholarship programme.
- 9. Feedback Provided to Donors: Each donor is assigned a student for a period of five years, from Class 6 to Class 10, after which the scholarship is transferred to a new student beginning again from Class 6. Donors receive a statement of annual examination scores together with the student's receipt of scholarship money. In addition a photograph of the student is also sent wherever possible.

- Rs. 10 lakh and maintain data base requires huge effort. Current management practice, which is continuing since last several years, must be improved with sharing of management responsibility by Committee members.
- 11. Club members have been requested to devote 2-3 days in a year in visiting schools and distributing scholarships. All members must feel that they will contribute their time to make the program a big success. It is an embarrassment when someone refuses to undertake responsibility.
- 12. The Committee has to manage Trust Fund which is over Rupees Nine million. Lowering of interest rate on fixed deposits and lack of confidence on financial institutions are issues to be addressed.
- 13. Annual support money of Rs. 1500 is a meager sum which needs to be increased through appropriate mechanism it have to be explored.

D. A Little Goes a Long Way

The regular feedback from students, school management and first-hand observation by RCP Rotarians demonstrate that the value of a small monetary donation is exponentially larger when calculated in non-monetary terms. To name a few: improvement in the child's well-being, expanded outlook and increased potential to develop communities. The RCP is also using this flagship programme for a multiplier effect by directing other support programmes such as computer labs, library materials, provision of potable drinking water, toilet facilities health check-ups etc. to these schools.

In continuing the splendid swing of sharing, we encourage donors, Rotarians and non-Rotarians alike, to contribute to the noble goal of educating 1000 disadvantaged students in Nepal every year.

here are many causes of cancer, but there is only one prime cause...the lack of oxygen at the cellular level. While you can't always prevent it, you can lower your chances of getting it.

Here are some steps that you can take today to possibly prevent cancer.

1. Do not smoke or quit smoking

- Smoking has been linked to various types of Cancer

 including lung, bladder, cervix and kidney. 90% of
 lung cancer cases are related to smoking. More than
 250 chemicals in smoke are known to be harmful,
 and at least 69 are known to cause cancer. The
 earlier smoking is stopped the better it is.
- Do not chew tobacco as it has been linked to cancer of oral cavity and pancreas.
- Do not expose yourself to second-hand smoke as it increases the risk of lung cancer. Second-hand smoke has higher concentrations of cancer-causing agents (carcinogens) than mainstream smoke.

2. Do not over expose in the sun

- Over exposer in the sun especially between 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. is risk to melanoma and other skin cancers.
 Skin cancer is one of the most common kind of cancer and most preventable.
- However, Vitamin D, which you get from exposure to sunshine (around 15 minutes a day) and from vitamin D-fortified milk and other foods, has anticancer properties. Vitamin D is an essential vitamin the body needs to regulate the amount of calcium and phosphorus in the body.
- Vitamin D is necessary for the best functioning of the immune system—it causes early death of cancer cells.

3. Eat a healthy diet

- Eat plenty of fruits, vegetables and other foods from plant sources - such as whole grains and beans.
- A healthy diet lowers the risks of cancers of the breast, prostrate, lung, colon, rectum, stomach and pancreas. Eat a balanced and varied diet.
- Limit consumption of red meat and fat, particularly from animal sources. Red meat contains much more fat than poultry or fish. High fat diets tend to be higher in calories and may increase the risk of overweight or obesity - which in turn can increase risks of bowel, pancreas, esophagus, kidney and breast cancers.

• Excessive alcohol consumption is linked to oral cancer, cancer of voice box (larynx) or pharynx (back of the mouth), esophagus, liver, bowel cancer (specially in men) and breast cancer (in women). Women should not drink more than 1 and men more than 2 units in a day. One standard drink is any drink that contains 0.6 fluid ounces (14 grams) of pure alcohol = a glass of wine (142 ml), one bottle of beer (341 ml), or a shot of hard liquor (43 ml).

 Though moderate alcohol can be beneficial in preventing heart disease, if your goal is to limit cancer risk, it is recommended you avoid alcohol completely.

5. Get at least 30 minutes of activity everyday

- Being physically active lowers risks of colon cancer and may lower risk of breast and other cancers.
- Keep a physically active lifestyle. You don't need to be an athlete to get the benefit of exercise.
 Activities such as brisk walking, biking, dancing or any exercise will be beneficial.
- Exercise boosts your immunity and lowers your risk of cancer by reducing elevated insulin levels. This creates an environment in your body that discourages the growth and spread of cancer cells.
- Keep your weight in the normal range for your height. That means keeping to a body mass index (BMI) of 25 or less.

6. Protect from Sexually Transmitted Infections

- Sexually transmitted infections cause cancers of the cervix, vagina, anus and liver.
- Be in a mutually monogamous relationship with a partner who is not infected by human papilloma virus (HPV).

7. Drink clean water

- Although drinking fluids is absolutely crucial to good health water is often the healthiest - certainly the lowest calorie.
- Drinking plenty of water and other liquids stimulates the immune system, removes waste and toxins and reduces the risk of cancer, especially bladder cancer by diluting the concentration of cancer-causing agents in urine and helping to flush them through the bladder faster.



8. Reduce salt

- Limit salt intake. Too much salt in the diet is a risk for stomach cancer. Daily intake should be below 2400 mg. Processed food products; canned foods and processed meat are mostly loaded with salt and preservatives.
- Reducing sodium intake can help our heart and reduce cancer risk.

9. Minimize use of refined sugar

- Research has shown that sugar blocks the absorption
 of calcium and produces a low oxygen environment.
 Cancer cells thrive in this high sugar-low oxygen
 environment but cannot exist in the opposite
 condition of high oxygen-low sugar mode of healthy
 cells.
- Processed sugar is extremely acidic. Cancer thrives in an acidic environment, and doesn't survive in a normal, more alkaline environment. Cancer cells make your body even more acidic as they produce lactic acid. So if you have cancer, your pH levels are low and your body is too acidic. Taking action to make your body more alkaline is vital in the battle against cancer.
- Too much processed sugar suppresses your immune system's manufacture of killer cells and antibodies.
- Processed sugar depletes Vitamin B that is needed by the liver to detoxify it. The liver is the most important organ when it comes to healing the body.

Some foods that may help prevent Cancer

- Teas: Green Tea and Black tea contain certain antioxidants known as polyphenols (catechins), which appear to prevent cancer cells from dividing. Green tea is best, followed by our more common black tea. Green tea keeps the heart diseases at bay, raises body's immune system, lowers risk of cancer and lowers glucose and cholesterol levels.
- Apples: It has lots of fiber, vitamins, minerals and antioxidants like quercetin that protect from free radical damage.
- Berries: Blueberries, Acai Berries, Raspberries, Strawberries and Cranberries have phytochemicals that protect against numerous types of cancer. Most berries contain ellagic acid and other polyphenol antioxidants that inhibit tumor growth.
- Garlic: Garlic has strong anti-cancer benefits. Two active ingredients in garlic, allicin and allyl sulfur prevent and fight cancer. Garlic is particularly protective against stomach, gastric and colon cancers.
- Onions and Leeks: Consumption of onions and leeks reduces risk of many common cancers.
- Cruciferous vegetables: These vegetables namely broccoli, cabbage and cauliflower are rich in anticarcinogens.
- Tomatoes: Lycopene, the active chemical in tomatoes, lowers the risk of many different cancers, particularly prostate, breast and colon cancer.

- Carrots: It contains a lot of beta-carotene, which may help reduce a wide range of cancers including lung, mouth, throat, stomach, intestine, bladder, prostate and breast. Along with carrots, pumpkins, squash, red and yellow peppers, and sweet potatoes, are also excellent sources of beta-carotene. Eaten regularly these powerhouses may help reduce the risk of many types of cancer through their potent antioxidant capacity.
- Grapes: The hype about red wine centers on an antioxidant called resveratrol that is present in grapes and grape juice. Eating grapes can also lower cholesterol levels, reduce incidence of allergies and help promote an efficient circulatory system.
- Soya: The active ingredient in soy is genistein, which
 is a phytoestrogen that protects against hormonedependent cancers (namely Prostate, Breast).
- Turmeric: It fights cancer because of an active ingredient, curcumin, which is a powerful antioxidant. Antioxidants may slow or prevent the development of cancer.
- Spinach: Some of the glyconutrients from spinach inhibit destruction of DNA, cancer cell growth, and tumor growth. Packed with lutein and vitamin E, both powerful antioxidants, spinach helps ward off cancer of the liver, ovaries, colon, and prostate. Other dark green and leafy organic vegetables are also rich in antioxidants that can help prevent cancers.
- Walnuts: Their phytosterols (cholesterol-like molecules found in plants) have been shown to block estrogen receptors in breast cancer cells, possibly slowing the cells' growth. It helps fight breast and prostate cancers.
- Pomegranate: This is highly recommended for preventing breast cancer. It contains polyphenol, an ellagic acid, with anti-oxidant properties that prevent cancer growth.
- Beans and Lentils: Beans and lentils contain numerous phytochemicals that have been shown in the laboratory to slow or prevent damage to the DNA, the basis of cancer. The added benefit comes with the fiber, associated with lower risk of digestive cancers such as colon cancer.
- Oranges and lemons: They contain Iimonene, which stimulates cancer-killing immune cells (lymphocytes) that may also break down cancer-causing substances.

There are many other foods such as olive oil and fatty fishes (wild salmon, trout, cat fish, etc.) that have also shown to help prevent cancer. Clean environment and less stressful life are also associated with reduced cancer risk.

Promotion of healthy dietary habits and life styles, physical exercise, maintaining healthy body weight, eating foods in their near-natural states, though demanding, are perhaps the right answer for cancer prevention.

नेपालमा कोलुङ्गे पुलको विकास

मनोरम हिमश्रृंखलाको काखमा रहेको नेपाल अधिराज्य प्राकृतिक विविधताले भरिपूर्ण छ । केवल १७० कि.मी.को दूरी भित्र दक्षिणमा समुद्री सतहदेखि ७० मी. उचाईको समधर भू-भागदेखि उत्तरमा ८८४८ मिटर अग्लो विश्वको सर्वोच्च शिखर सगरमाथा सहितको हिमशृंखला रहेको छ । यति छोटो दूरी बीच अत्यन्त भिरालो भू-बनोटको बीचबीचबाट करिब ६ हजार जित बर्षायाममा तर्ने नसिकने खालका नदी-नाला, खोला, खोल्साहरू बगेका छन् जस्ले कैयन् समुदायलाई एक अर्काबाट सम्पर्क विहिन बनाइएको छ । गर्मी मौसममा हिउँ पग्लिने र बर्षायाममा ५००० मी.मी. सम्म पनि मनसुनी वर्षा हुने ठाउँहरू भएकोले यी नदीनालाहरूमा अनियन्त्रित रूपले बाढी आउने, हिमश्रृंखला तुलनात्मक रूपमा नविनतम भएकोले बारम्बार पहिरो, भूकम्प जाने भएकोले यहाँ सडक निर्माण गर्न निक्कै चुनौतीपूर्ण र बढी खर्चिलो साबित भएको छ । जस्को कारणबाट पहाडी तथा हिमाली क्षेत्रका सदरमुकाम बाहेकका वहुसंख्यक वस्तिहरूमा सडक यातायात पुग्न सकेको छैन । भू-वनोट र भौगर्भिक चुनौतीका कारण ती क्षेत्रलाई आगामी धेरै वर्षसम्म पनि सडकबाट जोड्न नसिकने स्पष्ट नै छ । तसर्थ त्यहाँका बासिन्दाहरू गोरेटो, घोडेटो बाटोमा नै निर्भर रहन वाध्य छन् फलस्वरूप भोलुङ्गे पुलहरू अभिन्न अंग बन्न पुगेको छ । त्यसैले नेपालमा लामो तथा छोटो भोलुङ्गे पुलहरू बार्षिक रूपमा करिब ४०० गोटा बन्ने गरेका छन् । कोलुङ्गे पुल नीतिमा उल्लेख भए अनुसार १ घण्टा फेरोको दूरीमा १ वटा कोलुङ्गे पुलको सुविधा उपलब्ध गराउँदा नेपालमा भएका करिब ६ हजार नदीनालामा अभा ठूलो संख्यामा भोलुङ्गे पुलहरूको निर्माण हुन आवश्यक देखिदा यो कार्यक्रमलाई ऋमिक रूपले अभी लामै समयसम्म जारी राख्न जरूरी छ ।

कोलुङ्गे पुल निर्माणको ऋगागत विकास

नेपालमा पहिलो आधुनिक फोलुङ्गे पुलको निर्माण बीसौं शताद्विको शुरूमा (सन् १९०३ मा श्री ३ चन्द्र शमशेरको पालामा) स्कटल्याण्डबाट आयात गरी केही सदरमुकामहरू र व्यापारिक स्थानहरूलाई जोड्ने मुख्य मार्गहरूमा बनेका काला स्कटीस पुलहरू ने भएको हुन् भन्न सिकन्छ । यस्ता पुलहरू देशभरी सन् १९५० सम्म करीब ३० वटा जित निर्माण भएको थियो । मानिसहरू सामाजिक प्राणी भएकोले त्यसलाई कुनै चीजको आवश्यक भएपछि नयाँ-नयाँ प्रविधिहरूको विकास गर्दै जान्छन् । यसै सन्दर्भमा देशका सानातिना खोलानालाहरू तर्नको लागि शुक्तमा ठूला-ठूला लामा काठका मुढाहरूको प्रयोग गर्दै पिछ गएर

बाँस र काठका Cantilevers हरू बनाई तर्ने उपाय प्रयोग गर्थे । ठूला र फराकीला नदिहरू तर्न त्यसबेला ज्यादै किताई थियो । ती निहरू तर्नुपरेमा टुईनको प्रयोग गर्थे जुन अभ पिन देशका विकट र पिछिडिएको क्षेत्रहरूमा प्रयोग गर्नुपरेको छ । गाउँघरमा कामीहरूको प्रयोग गरी फलामका चेनहरू बनाई केही समयको लागि स्थाई रूपमा भएपिन Safe Crossing हरू बनाउन थाल्यो । विकासको ऋममा फलामका लञ्जाहरू पाउन थाले पिछ चेनको ठाउँमा लञ्जा प्रयोग हुन थाल्यो । बाग्लुङ तथा केही जिल्लाहरूमा स्थानीय रूपले निकै अधि देखि नै यस किसिमको प्रविधि प्रयोग गरी भोलुङ्गे पुलहरू निर्माण भएको पाइन्छ ।

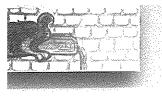

ROTARY E-CLUB A CHANGE WITH TIME

A 2010 Council on Legislation enactment recognized Rotary e-clubs as part of Rotary International, following a six-year pilot phase. As of 1 July 2010, RI had 12 e-clubs, all of them chartered during the pilot. Today the number of clubs has grown to around 120. While initially, RI Bylaws allowed only two e-clubs per district, the 2013 Council on Legislation has removed this restriction and districts can now have any number of clubs, thus opening up the space to e-clubs.

The E-Club in Nepal: with initiatives undertaken by a few ex Rotaractors, led by the past DRR Anil Shrestha, the Council of Governors agreed to the formation of an e-club in RID 3292 in 2012. With the decision by Rotary Club of Patan to sponsor an e-club and nomination of a Governor's Special Representative (GSR) by DG (2012-13) Rtn Yogendra Man Pradhan gave momentum to the e-club formation process. Thanks to Rtn William Ma for completing the Survey, a basic requirement for formation of a club. Although initially, many youths, including those staying abroad and Rotary family members had shown an interest in joining e-club, charter membership was limited to 20 (4 female), following vigorous selection process. The club was registered in Rotary International on 31 May 2013 and DG Dilendra Raj Shrestha and IPDG jointly presented the Charter to Charter President Anil Shrestha, on 13 July 2013, amidst a function organised by RC Patan, the sponsoring club.

What is e-Club: Rotary e-club is essentially the same as any other rotary club. It follows the same policies as all Rotary clubs. It meets weekly, performs service projects in communities, participates in the Rotary Foundation programmes and enjoys fellowship among its members. The only difference is that an e-club conducts its weekly meeting on line, in the club's website. The official meeting time is considered to be when the webmaster or club secretary posts material for weekly discussion. Members may attend meetings at any time and any day of the week (24/7) by accessing the site at their convenience. E-club members can also discuss the item and any other club business through a chat room feature or other means. Although all Rotary e-clubs meet weekly and conduct business online, some e-clubs do, in addition, meet in person at various times throughout the year; Rotary e-club of District 3292 also will have physical meetings once a month, in the initial stage, which should contribute in increasing fellowships as well.

Because the meeting venue is on a website, e-club must have: Online meeting software to host a meeting and a dedicated website. The membership in an e-club requires a basic Internet skill, including the ability to navigate websites with ease. In addition, it is critical that at least one of the founding members of the club be highly proficient in the design and maintenance of the club's website. While locality is considered worldwide, most of the initial members of the club will most likely come from the district in which the club is founded; currently, our club has 18 members from Nepal and two based in USA. While members can come from any country where Rotary currently exists, the RI Board has stated that members cannot be based in any country where Rotary does not have a current presence.

Opportunities the e-club adds: Rotary e-club extends Rotary to business, professional and community leaders in any Rotary District who are unable to meet traditional attendance requirements. Inability to attend a traditional Rotary club could be the result of demanding business or professional commitments, extensive travel, confinement due to ill health or disability, or residence beyond reasonable distance from an existing Rotary club. Rotarians who miss their regular club meetings may make-up by attending an e-club meeting online. The website to visit in our e-club for make-up is: www.rotaryeclub.org.

In conclusion: Given the fierce competition for time in todays rushed world, it is likely that the coming generations are going to be more interested in e-clubs; in view of the global average age of Rotarians, importance of the NEW GENERATION joining Rotary cannot be over emphasized. Similarly, others who are interested in social service, but do not want to commit a definite time once a week, would find e-club an avenue to render such service and join Rotary. E-club could therefore serve as an important instrument to increase membership also, which has been staggering at 1.2 million for decades. Paul Harris must have seen the need for flexibility in Rotary and thus said "This is a changing world and we must be prepared to change with time".

RCP is privileged to be i)the first club in our District and ii)among around 115 clubs (out of 34000 clubs globally) to sponsor an e-club; this e-club has also placed RID 3292 among 115 RI Districts (out of 534 Districts) to have an e-club. Performance of our first e-club will be a determining factor in the future development of e-club movement in the District. Onus now is on the sponsoring Club and RI District to nourish this e-club and ensure its success.



REVIVAL OF SAJHA YATAYAT

A fter the revival of Sajha Yatayat as a Cooperative, it has started its services from Baishakh 1, 2070.

Sajha Yatayat is a cooperative public transportation organization established in 1961/1962 to provide efficient and affordable public transportation to commuters in Kathmandu Valley, as well to inter-district travelers. In the last decade, the organization suffered some institutional turbulence, but now it has been revived as a cooperative with the participation of the Government of Nepal. Our goal is to provide public transport that is efficient, reliable and affordable.

Our mission statement is as follows: "To be the leading transport agency providing affordable, efficient and safe mode of urban and inter-district public transportation

services in Nepal, as well as flag-carrier cross border service to regional cities."

Our initial task in reviving services is to relieve the traffic congestion in Kathmandu Valley, in a

manner that will help commuters while at the same time helping the economy and the environment. We seek to provide exemplary service, seeking to extend it to other players in the transport sector by developing a network that has the interest in the public sector. In addition, we seek to expand services to districts, as well as flag-carrier services to cities in neighboring countries. We hope to work within the goals set by the Government of Nepal in cooperation and coordination with the private sector transport companies, to provide quality transport services to the citizens of Nepal.

Traffic congestion in Kathmandu Valley has become serious with frequent standstill of traffic for extended periods. This has significant costs in terms of lost time, missed appointments, needless wastage of fuel, obstructed commerce, air pollution and journeys that do not take place and also the revenue loss to operators despite of high operational cost due to low speed bus operation. Kathmandu Valley is in the phase of massive urbanization,

with the population expected to go up from the current 3 million to 4 million very soon. Efforts must be made by all the concerned authorities in ensuring easily accessible bus services that are safe, affordable, reliable, efficient, and comfortable for the passengers including the handicapped, women, senior citizens and school children.

It is in this context that efforts have been made to revive Sajha Yatayat and serve the high ideals of public transportation. As a cooperative that was established in the year 1961/1962 Sajha Yatayat provided the yardstick of public transportation for about three decades. In the 1990s, the company slowly weakened and ultimately confronted major operational problems and liquidated in Jan. 2002 which were revived with court order but only operated

with few old buses. The turning point of Sajha Yatayat came from the beginning of 2011, when Mr Kanak Mani Dixit took over as elected Chairman of the Board of Directors of Sajha Yatayat Co-operative Ltd.



The broad objectives of Sajha Yatayat are:

- The short-term strategy of Sajha Yatayat is to revive its operations in Kathmandu Valley's urban space, with the aim of generating public goodwill as well as visibility, while maximizing the sustain ability factor before the organization enters into a more profitably restructured entity.
- The medium-term strategy of Sajha Yatayat includes expansion of urban services in Kathmandu Valley and other cities of Nepal; initiate inter-district transport services in Nepal; initiate flag-carrier services to neighboring countries; optimize the use of Company's infrastructure in Pulchowk and set up operations from cost-effective locations in Kathmandu Valley and in other cities.
- The long-term strategy of Sajha Yatayat is to provide multi modal (efficient diesel buses, electric trains and rails, tramways, rope ways, etc) transportation services and operate from various regions/provinces of Nepal.



Realizing the need for a clear policy for managing urban transport in a context of rapid population growth and urban development, in mid-2011 a strategy to revive Sajha Yatayat was developed and implemented by the Board of Sajha Yatayat. In February 2012, Mr Padam Lal Maharjan was appointed as an Executive Officer with challenging tasks to provide the public bus services in Kathmandu with a limited funds available with Sajha Yatayat. With the support from consultants and advisors, tender specifications were prepared and International Competitive Bidding (ICB) was floated and procured 16 buses. The seat capacity of the bus is 55 with 3 X 2 seating arrangements and 15 strap hangers for standing passengers. These buses are equipped with two CCTV cameras for the safety of the passengers and also one LCD Monitor in which Sajha Yatayat information, music, advertisements and awareness messages of public transport are displayed. Route permits were sought from the Department of Transport (DoTM) and 8 buses are operating currently in two trunk routes of Kathmandu valley. It is noteworthy that Public Bus Service Transportation was made available to the Tribhuvan International Airport after 12 years. The bus services are used by Air Travelers as well as airport and airline staffs. The bus fare is fixed as per the DoTM regulation and are NRs 10 for students / senior citizens with valid ID & current minimum normal bus fare is NRs 15 and one bus ride could be upto NRs 17 to NRs 20 at the maximum.

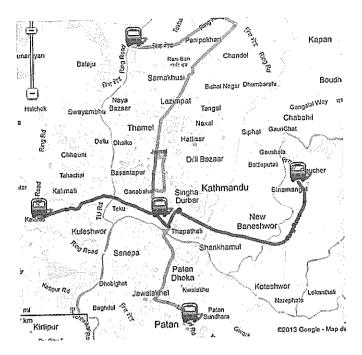
Sajha Yatayat's two main trunk routes in Kathmandu valley are:

Route No. 2:

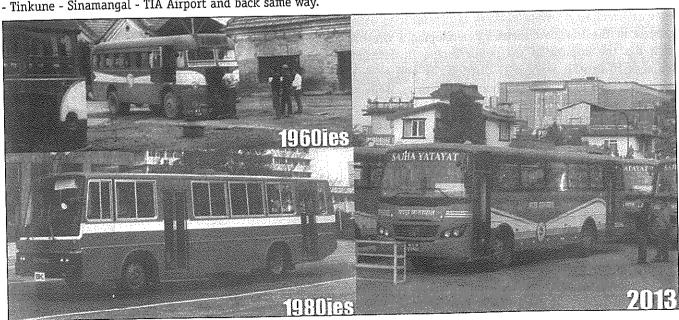
Kalanki - Kalimati - Tripureswar - Maitighar - New Baneswar - Tinkune - Sinamangal - TIA Airport and back same way.



Sajha Yatayat Bus stops signs are put at most places. Regular bus stops are also used. Normal frequency of operation is 15 minutes to 25 minutes but may take long due traffic congestions.

Passengers are requested to be on line in the designated Sajha Yatayat bus stops and enter from the rear entry gate and exit from the front gate. For Sajha Yatayat to be able to give sustainable quality service, all passengers are requested to take bus ticket after paying bus fare. If there is any issue related to the bus services or any other related issues, passengers are requested to inform the conductors or call Sajha Yatayat TOLL FREE No# 1660 01 77777. Passengers are not allowed to talk to the driver while he is driving for the safety reason. Safety comes first!
