# Classification Talk by Past President Rtn. Pushkar M. Shakya

Past President Rtn. Pushkar M. Shakya gave an interesting classification talk. While his classification in Rotary is 'Carpet Export', as this falls within 'Handicraft' in Nepal, he started by giving a brief history of handicrafts in Nepal.

Though handicrafts in Nepal has a history from ancient times, its commercialization started only during early 1950s. His father opened 'Nepal Art Emporium' as the first handicraft shop in Nepal. Exports at that time had to be done through the only existing parcel service through the Indian Embassy in Kathmandu. After Nepal's participation in International Trade Fair in Berlin in 1966, this trade started to spread.

Brass 'Filigree' works were the first exported handicrafts, which were produced by his family in Nagbahal, Patan, followed by brass and copper statues. Further diversification started in Swayambhu with paper products, and cotton garments during the 1970s.

Rtn. Shakya studied science and biology, and medicine in New Delhi, but did not continue and joined family business joining the handicrafts shop in New Road. In 1973, he opened Shakya Art Emporium personally. He also joined Jaycees in 1974.

He made his first foreign trip to Japan, Hong Kong and Thailand in 1975 at the young age of 21. During the course of his work on handicraft export, he has travelled a lot including an 'around the world' trip in 1976 and participated in several exhibitions, buyers meetings, and trade fairs to widen his contacts and sales in several countries of the world. He also promoted the concept of 'buy one, get one free' through a magazine in Germany.

As for the carpets, originally, Nepal was only exporting 'Tibetan carpets' started by the Tibetan refugees in Nepal. It was very difficult to penetrate that market. In 1983, he established his own carpet factory named Tsongkapa Carpet Industry that included carding & spinning, dyeing and washing factories.

On garment exports, he was running one of the 5 factories in Nepal producing and exporting garments. He also started a clothing shop.

In summary, he has been involved with the promotion and export of several items from Nepal including Filigree, statues, silver jewelleries, carpets, garments, and other handicrafts to markets around the world.

Following a Q/A session, on behalf of the RCP, IPP Rtn. Bijaya Mallapaty thanked Rtn. Pushkar M. Shakya for his very interesting classification talk and his contributions toward the promotion of handicrafts in Nepal and its export abroad.
