#### **CLUB ACTIVITIES OF THE ROTARY YEAR 2023-24**

We would like to express our gratitude to all the members of the Rotary Club of Patan for their valuable contributions, guidance, and wholehearted support during the Rotary Year 2023-24. We would also like to take this opportunity to thank our partners, collaborators, the Rotaract Club of Patan and the Interact Clubs for their valuable contributions. The major activities performed in the Rotary Year 2023-24 are summarised as follows:

#### **CLUB SERVICE**

Club Leadership and Board: The RCP Board, a dynamic team of dedicated volunteers, successfully steered the club's "Service Above Self" mission during its tenure. They provided strategic oversight, collaborated effectively with committee chairs, and managed resources efficiently. The Board ensured alignment with Rotary's core values, fostering impactful community service and maintaining responsible financial stewardship throughout their term.

Preparation of Five Strategic Plan for RY 2024-25 to 2028-29: The RCP initiated its Five-Year Strategic Plan (2024-25 to 2028-29) review in early 2024, finalising on May 4, 2024. The plan aligns with the club's recent focus areas: mental health initiatives, PEEF programme support, girls' empowerment projects, environmental activities, and animal welfare. These priorities reflect local needs and Rotary International's global themes, particularly RI President McInally's 2023-24 focus on mental health. The strategic plan aims to guide the club's impactful activities for the upcoming five Rotary Years, building on the foundations laid in the previous strategic plan.

**Fundraising:** The Rotary Club of Patan demonstrated diverse fundraising strategies in RY 2023-24. Regular "Happy News" contribution pledges from members during meetings provided consistent income for the

Sunshine and Operational Funds. The club's annual souvenir, Lalitdhara, generated revenue through member advertisements. Targeted campaigns included securing a global grant for a Rheumatic Heart Disease project and supporting Rotaract fundraisers. Additionally, members made significant contributions to The Rotary Foundation, earning Paul Harris Fellow recognitions. These varied approaches ensured robust financial support for the club's numerous service projects and initiatives throughout the year. Rtn. Prakash R. Regmi achieved Major Donor status in The Rotary Foundation (TRF). His generosity enhances both his personal standing in the organisation and the Club's capacity to support crucial global initiatives.

District Governor's official visit and 4th Club Assembly and Charter Day celebration: The RCP marked its 38th Charter Day on August 29, 2023, combining three significant events: the District Governor's official visit, the 4th Club Assembly, and the Charter Day celebration. District Governor Rtn. Rajendra P. Dhoju and other district officials met with RCP leadership to discuss club activities and plans. During the Club Assembly, committee chairs presented their reports, earning praise from the District Governor. The day concluded with the club meeting and Charter Day festivities, featuring the unveiling of the "Lalitdhara Souvenir." This triple-event showcased RCP's achievements, fostered district-club communication, and commemorated the club's founding, all in one memorable day.

**Dues payment:** The Rotary Club of Patan fulfilled its financial obligations by promptly paying both District and Rotary International dues, maintaining its good standing and ensuring continued access to Rotary resources and full participation in district and international activities. This reflects the club's commitment to efficient financial



management and support of the broader Rotary network.

**Club Renewal:** The club renewal process involved the tax office, Lalitpur municipality, and the Chief District Officer's (CDO) office. The CDO's office, in particular, introduced new documentation requirements, making the process more demanding. Despite these challenges, the Rotary Club of Patan completed its club renewal for the year.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Club members: The Rotary Club of Patan boasts 45 active members and 1 honorary member, with a 3:1 male-to-female ratio. Over half are 70+ years old, with an average 16-year tenure. Four members have served since 1985, while the newest joined in July 2023. With 41 members on My Rotary, the club shows strong online engagement. Diverse professional backgrounds enrich community service initiatives. Despite losing three members, the club maintained a 93.33% retention rate and welcomed two new members, plus one rejoining.

Club Attendance: RCP, with 45 members, showed strong engagement in 2023-24. Across 47 meetings, average attendance was 55% (about 25 members), including makeups. Total attendance, with guests and family, ranged from 26 to 83. Special events saw peak participation: District Governor's visit (82), World Heart Day (83), and KEEA Programme (75). Regular involvement of spouses, guests, and youth enhanced meetings. This consistent 50%+ attendance reflects the club's vibrant community and commitment to Rotary's principles.

#### **FELLOWSHIP**

**Birthday fellowship:** The RCP organised three Birthday Fellowship events during RY 2023-24, fostering camaraderie among members. These celebrations provided valuable opportunities for members to strengthen bonds and celebrate personal milestones within the Rotary community.

**Family picnic:** The Rotary Club of Patan organised a family outing on May 6, 2024, at the Grace Hotel complex in Bhaisepati. This three-hour event, scheduled from 12:00 to 3:00 PM, was arranged on a cost-sharing basis. This gathering allowed club members and their families to socialise casually, fostering stronger bonds within the Rotary community.

**Talk program by guest Speakers:** The Rotary Club of Patan hosted an impressive lineup of guest speakers throughout RY 2023-24, addressing a wide range of critical topics in health, education, and social issues. The club's

commitment to fostering meaningful dialogue and raising awareness was evident in the diverse presentations, which included Mr. Dipendra Bikram Thapa's insights on Nepal's education system challenges, Mr. Hikmak Singh Ayer's overview of tourism prospects, and Rtn. Bishwa B. Sharma's discussion on stress management. The series also featured talks on Rotary's polio eradication efforts by Rtn. Deepak Rajbhandary, mental health awareness by Rtn. Dhruba Man Shrestha, and the health impacts of trans fats by Dr. Prem Raj Baidya. In the latter half of the year, members benefited from presentations on spinal cord injury support by Mr. Rishi Ram Dhakal, ethical challenges in US healthcare by Dr. Sanjib Shrestha, holistic health approaches by Dr. Janak Basnet, and cancer awareness and survivor support by Ms. Pramita Khanal. These engaging sessions educated members and explored potential avenues for community service, reinforcing the club's dedication to informed and impactful engagement in Nepal's social landscape.

#### **VOCATIONAL SERVICE**

#### **Vocational Training**

- MOU with the Organization of Women Scientists in Nepal (OWSN) on 21 August 2023 for collaboration in the RCP's adopted schools with PEEF support.
- An awareness program on mental health / digital addiction in collaboration with the Rotary Club of Kathmandu at Siddhi Mangal School, Sana Gaun, on 6 Oct 2023.
- Training on school governance and leadership for Quality Education to headmasters of 24 PEEF supported schools at Aviation Museum on 11 December 2023 by Mr Medin Lamichanne of Ullens School.
- RCP partnered with ChildSafeNet Nepal to conduct "Internet/Digital Addiction and Safety" awareness programs at Siddhi Mangal School. These sessions educated students on responsible internet use and online safety, preparing them for the digital aspects of their futures.
- RCP organised a career counselling session for 10thgrade students at Mahendragram School, Tikathali, on May 24, 2024. This initiative gave students insights into various career paths and necessary skills, helping them make informed decisions about their educational and professional futures.

**Vocational Award:** The RCP continued its tradition of Vocational Service Awards, established in 2010-2011, to recognise outstanding contributions in various



professions. In 2024, two individuals were honoured: Ms. Prakriti Bhattarai for her work supporting people with disabilities and Mr. Min B. Achami for his dedication to education as a teacher and headmaster. Each recipient received a certificate and NRs. 25,000 cash prize. This annual program exemplifies RCP's commitment to promoting vocational excellence and inspiring community service, embodying Rotary's motto of "Service Above Self."

#### **COMMUNITY SERVICE**

**PEEF Distribution:** The RCP's PEEF program provided scholarships to 418 public school students from lower-income families in 25 schools in the Lalitpur District. The program disbursed a total of NRs. 1,681,000 in scholarships.

**KEEA Distribution:** On 11 December 2023, the annual Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award Ceremony was held at the Aviation Museum, Sinamangal, Kathmandu. The first award of Rs: 30000 was given to Mr Yubesh Kharel of Shree Mahendra Adarsh School, Lmadol, Lalitpur. The second award of Rs. 20,000 each was provided to 3 students, and the 3rd award of Rs. 1000 each to 6 additional students of various schools.

GSSA To further compliment the RCP's PEEF programme and provide opportunities for advanced studies, the RCP has been providing 'Graduate Studies Scholarship Award' (GSSA) sponsored by Rtns. Matsyendra & Chandralekha Kayastha and Rtn. Prakash R. Regmi. This programme awards scholarship support for graduate studies (up to master's level after secondary school graduation) from among the best PEEF scholarship recipients in grade 11. From this year, Rtns. Ganesh R. and Bijaya Shrestha have joined to sponsor this programme. Under this programme, during Rotary Year 2023-2024, the RCP provided scholarship support to four students.

**KPAD Activities:** The RCP's KPAD program continued to support people with disabilities. The program's signature project, "Empowering People with Disabilities in Nepal by Teaching Organic Vegetable and Poultry Farming Skills," entered its second year. The RCP contributed NRs. 300,000 to the project, which is a collaboration with The Rose International Fund for Children (TRIFC) and the Ability Development Society of Nepal (ADSoN). The project shifted implementation responsibility to ADSoN. The 6th, 7th and 8th training batch was conducted during this period.

**Animal Welfare Initiative:** RCP demonstrated its commitment to public health and animal welfare

through its "Animal Welfare for Public Health" project. In collaboration with the National Zoonoses & Food Hygiene Research Centre (NZFHRC), RCP successfully conducted a comprehensive program in Harisiddhi, Ward No. 29, on December 30, 2023. This initiative focused on the well-being of street dogs and community health, offering services such as rabies vaccinations, neutering, and spaying. The program's success was evident in the 121 operations performed by the NZFHRC team. This effort not only addressed the immediate needs of the local canine population but also contributed to broader public health goals by mitigating the risks associated with stray animals, showcasing RCP's holistic approach to community service.

MOU with the B.P. Eye Foundation: The RCP established a MOU with the B.P. Eye Foundation, focusing on eye care, dental health, and environmental initiatives. The partnership aims to provide eye care services, including eyeglasses for needy students, supported by RCP's KPAD fund. The collaboration also encompasses "Green Initiatives" in schools, such as recycling, waste management, and tree plantation, along with a zeroplastic campaign. The program was kicked off on June 21, 2024, at Siddhi Mangal School in Sano Gaun, where students received eye and dental care services.

- On February 3, 2024, the Interact Club of Godavari held a "Mela" in collaboration with the RCP. The event included an RHD awareness program led by Dr. Urmila Shakya of Ganga Lal Hospital and Nepal Heart Foundation.

#### INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

Implementation of Global Grant GG2347069: Rheumatic Heart Disease (RHD) Prevention Project - This collaborative effort, involving RCP, the Rotary Club of Livingston USA, Gift Of Life New Jersey, USA, and the



Nepal Heart Foundation (NHF), focused on expanding RHD diagnosis and care through echocardiography screening across Nepal. With a budget of USD 43,262 from The Rotary Foundation, the project aimed to purchase a portable echocardiography machine, train auxiliary health professionals, screen 5,000 school children, and provide necessary treatment support. Key achievements as of June 30, 2024, include the procurement of a Sonosite EDGE portable echocardiography machine and completion of a six-week training for three auxiliary health professionals. Eight heart screening camps were organized across 4 provinces, 10 districts, and 62 schools, including locations from Galkot/Baglung to Hetauda, Makawanpur. The project conducted 25,463 clinical heart screenings and 4,792 echocardiogram screenings, detecting 258 new cases (122 RHD, 133 CHD, 3 others). In terms of treatment and support, 8 patients received heart surgery, 20 cases were referred for upcoming surgeries, 86 RHD cases were provided with penicillin prophylaxis, and other positive cases were advised for follow-up. These activities demonstrate RCP's commitment to combating RHD through service, training, and public awareness campaigns. The project is set to conclude in the Rotary year 2024/25, continuing its impactful work in RHD prevention across Nepal.

Closure of Global Grant Project GG 2129083: Laliquras Community Hospital, Dolakha: The Rotary year 2023-24 marked the successful completion and closure of Global Grant Project GG2129083, a significant initiative supporting the Laliguras Community Hospital in Mirge, Dolakha. The Rotary Foundation officially closed the project, culminating years of dedicated effort and service. This closure process, largely finalised by September 2023, represents a significant achievement for the RCP. Special recognition was given to Rtn. Nirmal K. Pradhanang, the Primary Contact for the project, whose leadership was instrumental in bringing this impactful Global Grant Project to its successful conclusion. The closure signifies the completion of a major community service initiative and demonstrates RCP's commitment to effective project management and sustainable community development.

Paul Haris Fellowship (PHF): Four dedicated members made significant contributions towards their PHF recognition: Rtn. Sandhya Regmi, Rtn. Krishna Hachhethu, Rtn. Mahendra Singh Rawal, and Rtn. Bishnu Prasad Sigdel. These contributions not only reflect the individual members' dedication to Rotary's mission but also strengthen RCP's overall support for The Rotary

Foundation's global humanitarian efforts.

RCP Representation at RI Convention 2024 in Singapore: The RCP proudly marked its presence at the Rotary International Convention held in Singapore from May 25-29, 2024, through the attendance of Rtn. Bishnu Prasad Sigdel. Rtn. Sigdel's attendance at this prestigious event underscores RCP's commitment to global engagement and continuous learning, bringing fresh insights and international best practices back to the club.

**Peace On Earth:** Lunar Initiative - In an initiative aligning with Rotary's commitment to global peace, the RCP participated in a unique space-bound project during the 2023-24 Rotary Year. RCP members were invited to be part of a photo destined for the moon. This photo, featuring club members alongside a banner displaying "Peace on Earth," was slated for inclusion in a capsule scheduled for lunar launch in late 2024. The initiative was designed to promote Rotary's dedication to peace, coinciding with the UN's International Day of Peace on September 21, 2024.

#### **YOUTH SERVICES**

The Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) demonstrated a strong commitment to youth development and engagement by supporting various Rotaract initiatives during the 2023-24 Rotary year. Under RCP's support, the Rotaract Club of Patan undertook several impactful activities.

- Two Rotaractors enhanced their leadership skills by participating in a Training of Trainers (TOT) for Students Quality Circle (SQC), organised by QUEST Nepal at Little Angels School, Hattiban.
- The Rotaract Club demonstrated its commitment to community service through two successful blood donation camps. The first was held on September 2, 2023, at Mangal Bazar, supported by RCP and the Inner Wheel Club of Patan. A second camp on April 13, 2024, at the same location, honoured the memory of the late Rtn. Krishna B. Basnyat and collected 27 pints of blood for the Nepal Red Cross.
- Cultural engagement was emphasised through a Good Morning Tea Party held on October 21, 2023, at Tri Padma School, Pulchowk, celebrating Vijaya Dasami, where RCP members were invited to participate.
- The Rotaractors also embraced local traditions by organising a Deusi/Vailo program during the Tihar festival to raise funds for social projects.
- The fundraising efforts culminated in a special music band program at Hard Rock Cafe, Durbarmarg, on



March 9, 2024.

 On June 22, 2024, the Rotaract Club of Patan and the Interact Club of St. Xaviers organised a youth leadership program named "Marga Darshan" at DAV College, Lalitpur.

These diverse activities highlight the synergy between RCP and its Rotaract club, showcasing their commitment to youth empowerment, community service, and cultural preservation while supporting various social causes.

Recognition of Rotary Club of Patan: Exemplifying Excellence and Service in 2023-24: Our club achieved remarkable recognition during the Rotary Year 2023-24, demonstrating its commitment to service and excellence within Rotary International District 3292. The club was honoured with two prestigious awards at the District Award and Recognition Ceremony held on June 29, 2024, in Kathmandu. Notably, the club received the "100% Contribution to The Rotary Foundation" award, showcasing its members' dedication to supporting Rotary's global initiatives. Additionally, the club's secretary, Shiv Prakash Khemka, was recognised as the "Best Club Secretary," highlighting the efficient management and leadership within the club. Furthermore, the Rotary Club of Patan was presented with the "2023-24 Rotary Citation" by Rotary International President R. Gordon R. McInally, acknowledging the club's outstanding efforts in "helping Rotary create hope in the world." These awards not only reflect the club's significant contributions to both local and international Rotary initiatives but also underscore its role in embodying the Rotary theme of "Create Hope in the World" for the year 2023-24

#### Introduction

The Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) has been implementing the Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF) programme since 1991, providing educational scholarship to needy children in public schools. It has demonstrated that the value of a small monetary contribution is exponentially larger in terms of improvements of a child's overall well-being and community development through continued education.

During the Rotary Year 2022-2023, 418 students had received scholarship support of which 62% percent were girls. The scholarship distribution for 2024 is ongoing with a similar target. Due to a delay in the examination results resulting in continuing enrolments, the actual number of students receiving this year's scholarship is expected to be available only in September 2024.

As of 15 July 2024 (Nepali fiscal year 2080/2081), the PEEF Trust Fund has reached Nepalese Rupees (NRs.) 16.72 million with a Programme Fund balance of 5.25 million bringing the total fund balance to NRs. 21.97 million. The RCP is maintaining a Programme Fund at this level to sustain the scholarship programme and cover any reductions in contributions in the programme fund and/or reductions in income from the Trust Fund due to fluctuations in the interest rates.

The PEEF 'Management and Operational Policies' (PEEF MOPs) govern the PEEF. The PEEF MOPs separate the Trust Fund from the Programme Fund and outline the policies and procedures of the funds' management, criteria for support, investments and financial management mechanisms, and administrative responsibilities.

A key to the continued success of this flagship programme of the RCP is that the entire RCP family takes ownership of it. In addition to a dedicated committee managing this programme, the RCP family volunteers its valuable time and resources during the annual student selection and funds distribution in the assisted public schools throughout the Lalitpur District. Several of these schools are only accessible

with 4-wheel drive vehicles during the rainy season, despite their proximity to Kathmandu.

This annual report captures key actions taken during the reporting period 1 July 2023 to 15 July 2024 (end of Nepali fiscal year 2080-2081), and provides a summary, together with a statement (see page numbers .. to .. showing all PEEF contributors and contributions.

#### **Key Actions**

 After the COVID-19 pandemic, schools are functioning normally, and the RCP is continuing its selection and distribution campaign to all schools for this year.

• In December 2023, The RCP managed to reward ten meritorious students receiving PEEF scholarships with the RCP's annual 'Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award' (KEEA). Complementing the need-based programme of PEEF, in 2013, the RCP had started recognising and rewarding merit students from among the PEEF recipients. Initiated by late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit, this programme has expanded with additional donations from his family and sponsorships of several RCP members. Last year's awards amounted to a total of Rs. 150,000.

To further compliment the RCP's PEEF programme and provide opportunities for advanced studies, the RCP started its 'Graduate Studies Scholarship Award' sponsored by Rtns. Matsyendra & Chandralekha Kayastha and Rtn. Prakash R. Regmi in 2018. This programme awards scholarship support for graduate studies (up to master's level after secondary school graduation) from

among the best PEEF scholarship recipients in grade 11. From this year, Rtns. Ganesh R. and Bijaya Shrestha are joining to provide additional support under this programme. Currently, the RCP is providing scholarship support to four students.

- In line with the Rotary Nepal Literacy Mission 'TEACH' initiative (Teacher Support, E-Learning, Adult Literacy, Child Development, Happy Schools), the RCP has adopted four of the PEEF supported schools to provide holistic support to enhance education of students. This year the RCP supported several activities that included:
- Girl's empowerment programme with training on menstrual hygiene; a training of trainers on Student Quality Circle (SQC) to establish a network for Total



Quality Management (TQM) in these schools; and support to a 'Quiz Contest' coordinated by the Rotaract Club of Patan

- MOU with the B.P. Eye Foundation: The RCP established
  a MOU with the B.P. Eye Foundation, focusing on eye
  care, dental health, and environmental initiatives. The
  partnership aims to provide eye care services, including
  eyeglasses for needy students, supported by RCP's KPAD
  fund for people with disabilities.
- President of Ullens school, Rtn. Som Paneru granted two full scholarship grants from the Ullens school to the RCP's PEEF supported students to study at grades 11 and 12. The estimated monetary value of each scholarship per year is at Rs. 520,000. Two best performing PEEF scholarship students from Tri Padma School and Mahendra Adarsha School were selected and admitted to Ullens school.

#### Financial Report of 2023-2024:

(i) During the fiscal year, due to a delay in the examination results resulting in continuing enrolments, the actual number of students receiving this year's scholarship has not yet been finalised. It is anticipated to be like the last year of 418 students of grades 7 to 12 in 24 public schools of Lalitpur District with an estimated amount of Rs. 1,570,500.

The scholarship amount has been Rs. 3,500 in grades 7 to 10 plus Rs. 1,000 for those meritorious students getting a GPA of 2.81 or more (70% or B+), and Rs. 5,500 to students in grades 11 and 12.

(ii) During this fiscal year, total contributions of Rs.

2,042,110 (Rs. 887,060 in the Trust Fund and Rs. 1,155,050 in the Programme Fund) was received.

# Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award (KEEA) History

#### **Background:**

The Kamalmani Educational Excellence Award (KEEA) started in 2012 with a donation of NRs. 100,000 by late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit to establish a "Fund' to honour the best-performing student among those receiving scholarships from the RCP's Prajapati Education Endowment Fund (PEEF). In December 2013, the best all-round student among three students received its first award. More than a decade on the Award has reached NRs. 200,000 distributed to 10 outstanding students.

In February 2014, the RCP increased the award amount from NRs. 5,000 to NRs. 10,000 after late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit contributed additional NRs. 25,000 to the RCP's Club Service Fund. To expand this award, Rtn. Ganesh R. Shrestha and PDG Rtn. Tirtha M. Sakya provided additional annual contributions of NRs. 5,000 and NRs. 3,000 respectively for the 2nd and 3rd best students. **The second award ceremony took place in December 2014, which awarded three students.** 

In October 2015, the RCP further expanded the awards to reward 10 students. In June 2016, late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit contributed additional NRs. 30,000 making a total contribution of NRs. 155,000 to the RCP's Club Service Fund, which covered the first prize of NRs. 12,000 annually. The additional 9 prizes were given through annual contributions from RCP members. The third award ceremony in April 2016 awarded 10 students for the first time.

In March 2017, Ms. Munu Rajkarnikar, spouse of late Rtn. Narayan G. Halwai, contributed NRs. 100,000 in the name of her husband for the KEEA to the RCP's Club Service Fund, and the RCP allocates NRs. 8,000 every year for the KEEA in the name of late Rtn. Narayan G. Halwai. In November 2017, Messrs. Kunda Dixit and Kanak Dixit contributed NRs. 10,71,117 in the name of late Rtn. Kamalmani Dixit to the RCP's Club Service Fund for the KEEA. These additional contributions allowed the club to increase the awards starting with the 6th award ceremony in September 2018 to a total amount of NRs. 100,000.

In June 2022 the Rotary Club of Patan Board approved a further increase in the award amounts. In February 2023

at the  $10^{th}$  award ceremony and December 2023 at the  $11^{th}$  award ceremony the 10 students received a total amount of NRs. 150,000.

In 2024 for the planned 12<sup>th</sup> award ceremony the 10 students will receive 1<sup>st</sup> prize of NRs. 35,000; three 2<sup>nd</sup> prizes of NRs 25,000; and six 3<sup>rd</sup> prizes of NRs. 15,000 to a total amount of NRs. 200,000.

#### **Award Modalities:**

Annually, ten PEEF scholarship students who scored highest in the final examination of grade IX from 10 different PEEF schools are pre-selected. The RCP calls all 10 students for interview and categorises - one best all-round student, three second-best students and six third-best students for cash awards and certificates.

The RCP Interview and Selection Committee comprises of the Coordinator of the PEEF (RCP President Elect), the RCP Secretary and the RCP Chairperson of Service Projects.

The award ceremony, which is also an advocacy event to enhance the public image of Rotary and the Rotary Club of Patan, is held every year, preferably in September. The RCP also invites all the Headmasters from the PEEF supported schools to the ceremony and organises educational sessions for the participating teachers.

#### Khagendra Raj and Piyush Priya Ability Development Endowment Fund (KPAD Fund) Annual Report as of 15 July 2024

The Rotary Club of Patan (RCP) has a long history of supporting people with disabilities, including the successful completion of the 3H grant project (2008-2012) to raise awareness in this regard. In September 2018, with an initial pledge of NRs. 10 Lakhs by Rtn. Rabendra Raj Pandey, the RCP established, in his parents' name, 'Khagendra Raj and Piyush Priya Ability Development Endowment Fund' (KPAD).

#### **Highlights of the KPAD Programme:**

- RCP KPAD Fund was established with a long-term vision to enable people with disabilities.
- The RCP family committed to take ownership of this flagship programme through advocacy for fundraising and voluntary contributions by a maximum number of the RCP family.
- Within three months of its establishment, the RCP raised over Rs. 25 Lakh (2.5 million) and set its aim to raise Rs. 1 crore (10 million). By 15 July 2024, the end of the Nepali fiscal year, KPAD was able to raise 9.18 million Rupees, and had a programme fund balance of 2.26 million Rupees.
- To further increase the Trust Fund, Rtn. Rabendra R. Pandey has pledged that his family will match any contribution to KPAD from RCP members and their families up to an amount of Rs. 1 million during the RY 2024/2025.
- All interest from the KPAD Trust Fund is deposited into a Programme Fund, which is used to support programmes for people with disabilities. All the professional time and resources provided by the RCP family to manage this programme are voluntary.

#### 2023-2024 Activities:

The project 'Empowering People with Disabilities in Nepal by Teaching Organic Vegetable and Poultry Farming Skills' started in April 2021. This project continues and the RCP has been sponsoring it with its third year's contribution of Rs. 300,000 during this Rotary Year.

Representatives of the RCP KPAD committee have been working on this project, which has been planned for a five-year project for which a 'Project Cooperation Agreement' was signed in April 2021 between three project partners - The Rose International Fund for Children (TRIFC), USA Non-profit (NGO); Ability Development Society of Nepal (ADSON), Nepal NGO, which is also the implementing partner; and the Rotary Club of Patan.

The project has established a disability-friendly, inclusive organic farm on a parcel of leased farmland in the Kathmandu valley to provide for the economic sustainability and improved nutritional health of people with disabilities.

Learning how to grow organic vegetables and raise organic poultry are skills which help uplift people with disabilities (PwD's) in Nepal by instilling the values of life-long learning, cooperation, cross-disability interaction, helping others and dignity, all the while learning and earning. This project trains PwD's from all different disability areas who will in turn teach other PwD's through a 3-month vocational training course designed to be disability accessible and inclusive. Programme graduates are prepared and qualified to start their own farming enterprise with the target of joining a cooperative to help market and sell their products. Some graduates choose to start their own garden area in their



own home to grow vegetables and poultry for their family to consume. Follow-up help and support are provided as needed. Whatever the programme graduates choose to do with their farming knowledge, they will have learned valuable skills that will empower, improve self-esteem, and be greatly valued by their families.

The project partners are undertaking their activities after receiving extensive advice and counsel from organic farming experts, marketing experts and organizations supporting people with disabilities. At this stage, eight batches of training have been completed and 55 persons with disabilities have successfully graduated from the course.

The RCP's provided Rs. 100,000 from its KPAD Funds to support the blind fire victims of 'Nepal Netrahin Sangh' in Pokhara in collaboration with The Rose International Fund for Children (TRIFC) and Ability Development Society of Nepal (ADSON). This support to the institution serving the blind was to replace materials lost during the fire.

## Rotary Club of Patan Vocational Service Awards

#### **Background**

One of the five Avenues of Service, 'Vocational Service' is rooted in the second object of Rotary, which calls on Rotarians to encourage and foster high ethical standards in business and professions and recognize the worthiness of all useful occupations. Vocational service is the essence of Rotary and serves as the foundation from which we serve our communities around the world. Rotarians have a dual responsibility: to represent their occupations within their club and to exemplify the ideals of Rotary in their places of work.

The Rotary Club of Patan has a long history of recognizing individuals who have demonstrated high ethical professional standards, and through their vocations, made outstanding contributions to their communities and society at large.

Since the Rotary Year 2010/11 the Rotary Club of Patan started to confer Vocational Service Awards on up to three outstanding professionals every year. The Awards are given at a ceremony organized by the Rotary Club of Patan primarily during Rotary's Vocational Service Month, which is observed during the month of January. ## **Enabling the Differently Abled of Nepal**

#### **Spinal Cord Injury**

Just imagine, for a second, when the ability to move your hands and legs freely— the most precious gift bestowed by nature on human body— gets robbed suddenly making you dependent on wheelchair or crutches, and in the worst-case bed-ridden for the rest of your life. Can you still see the survival of your life's colorful dreams? Now imagine what it takes for that wheel-chaired you to lead a dignified, fulfilling, and inspirational life.

Every year, thousands of spinal-cord-injured are compelled to face this in reality due to man-made accidents or natural disasters. A spinal-cord injury blocks communication between the brain and the rest of the body—partially or completely paralyzing the body's whole host of muscular and nerve functions. The National Federation of Disabled, Nepal has thus categorized spinal injury as Disability Class 'A'. A spinal-cord injury needs much more than a wheelchair—(i) physiotherapy treatment and medical stabilization for rehabilitation, (ii) psychological counseling for motivation, (iii) vocational training that helps find a job and to reintegrate and restructure their lives, (iv) wheelchair-friendly public facilities, and (v) our transformed mindset that treats the differently abled not with pity but embraces them in the society with love and respect.

The challenges faced by them are enormous. Gayatri Dahal, the former president of NSCISA and social worker who is bound to wheelchair since the past 40 years of her life, put it this way— "We, the spinal injured, are like small babies because our daily life cannot run without a volunteer by our side, our legs are impaired, our bladder and bowel movement are not under our control. Especially due to this we are considered burden

by our own family members, and it is not unnatural to have the suicidal thoughts as a last resort to all our problems. The spinal injured have high risk of dying from depression, inception and bed sores."

So, where do we stand in addressing their basic needs?

#### Establishment of SIRC and NSCISA

To start with, we do have a Swiss-NGOs-funded Spinal Injury Rehabilitation Centre (SIRC) in Banepa's Saanga— which was inaugurated in April 2002 by Sir Edmund Hillary. The Centre rehabilitates the patients by physical and emotional healings, conducts psychological counseling to boost their morale and resolve to rehabilitate, and provides vocational training needed to find job and to reintegrate and restructure their lives.

In a desperate attempt to prove enormous passion for life and sports, a team of 9 spinal injured wheel-chaired counselors established Nepal Spinal Cord Injury Sports Association (NSCISA) in 2009 and started running a series of sport activities in collaboration with Danish Sports Organization for the disabled. NSCISA became the first-of-its-kind organization to introduce wheelchair basketball, para swimming, and wheelchair cricket in Nepal. After consecutive successes within a short duration, NSCISA's activities went beyond the national boarder, when it participated in the international wheelchair basketball tournament in Dec 2014 in Bangladesh and hosted in Kathmandu the first ever international wheelchair cricket series between Nepal and Pakistan in Feb 2015.

#### My Personal Efforts and Contributions to the Differently Abled

If we are to know more about the spinal-injured, nothing compares to meeting and associating them



in person. This is so, at least in my case. In 2015 during the devastating earthquake of Nepal and the aftershock, when I first visited the SIRC in Sanga, I found myself in a different world that I had never known before. Despite themselves being victims of unfortunate accidents, struggles, and suffering, the spinal injured had divine gifts to offer— their heartwinning smiles and the love and lust of life in their innocent eyes. The very moment I saluted the spirit of these extraordinary people. I made several consecutive visits to that special place to be accustomed to their challenges and in no time my love and intimacy to them grew to such an extent that the spinal injured became among my best friends. I started inviting them as special quests to my solo paintings held in Nepal Art Council Babarmahal gallery, to literary ceremonies, social gatherings, and also to play 'Dheusi- Bhailo' is our house during Deepawali.

That friendship proved crucial in the aftermath of the devastating earthquake when we joined hands in the pious mission for the earthquake victims. On 13th June 2015, I coordinated, as the Founder President of Buddha Harmony Foundation, and organized the 'Earthquake-Refreshment Wheelchair Basketball Tournament' to the wheelchair-bound with the aim to provide them physical and mental refreshment and also to raise awareness of sports among the people with disability (PWD). In the basketball court of Bhanimandal, Lalitpur a total 52 wheel-chair players—both females and males— consisting of the team of Jawalakhel, Jorpati, Chabahil and Nepal army— played marvelously and won certificate of participation, awards, medals and trophies among hundreds of spectators— both Nepalese and foreigners.

The following day on 14th June 2015, we organized a refreshment program and distributed fresh fruit bags to all the 115 spinal injured patients undergoing treatment in SIRC, where the patients had almost doubled following the two devastating earthquake and the aftershocks. Most pathetic situation was that of a two-year old Muna of Dhading who had got buried under the debris of her house that resulted in her spinal injury. I was overwhelmed to see a spinal injured mother with her new-born lying next to her.

To assist in the emotional healing of the differently abled, in July 2015, I coordinated leading a team of artists to engage them in creative art and counseling, in which we organized a painting and music therapy program involving the earthquake-traumatized differently abled children and students of SOS Children Village in Jorpati and Disabled Rehabilitation Centre (DRC) in Gokarna, in which the children enthusiastically participated in hours long colorful painting competition, music and singing. They exhibited amazing talents in art and creativity, and some of those who could not move their fingers held the brushes in the fingers of their feet while some pressed their brushes between their lips and created their art. While being awarded with books and painting materials, we could see tears of joy rolling down their eyes— triggering tears covering our face too. We served them a fresh lunch of goat meat, homemade cheese, mushroom, vegetables, salad, yogurt, fruits and sweets. Over 140 emotionally traumatized children benefitted from the program. Furthermore, our team also counseled the spinal-injured victims in Jorpati's Orthopedic Hospital.

In December 2017, Buddha Harmony Foundation conducted a special program and presented cash awards and certificates— to honor the extraordinarily talented spinal injured in sports, literature, art, painting and social works, who had demonstrated their special talents and skills — both in national and international competitions including participating in para-Olympics and contributed to uplift the name and fame of Nepal. Additionally, 'Buddha Peace and Harmony Certificates 2017' were presented to 30 wheelchair sport players. At the same occasion, senior and renowned neurosurgeon of Nepal Dr. Basanta Pant made an educational power-point presentation related to spinal injury, neurosurgery and rehabilitation.

#### Rotary Club of Patan's Interaction with SCINN

Together with his peers, Rishi Ram Dhakal, the former general secretary of NSCISA, who served the association for over a decade, established in April 2016—Spinal Cord Injury Network Nepal (SCINN)— a non-prof organization based on providing education, hostel and employment to the spinal injured students from 7 to 25 years of age. Dhakal, who contributes as the



founder President of SCINN, also serves as an expert member of the Disability Coordination Committee of Gokarneshwor Municipality and the steering committee of the Ministry of Women, Children, and Senior Citizens in the disability sector.

On 29 April 2024, the Rotary Club (RC) of Patan invited, on its weekly meeting, the team of SCINN, in which its Founder President, Rishi Ram Dhakal, was provided an opportunity to share presentation entitled

'Living with Spinal Cord Injury'. RC Patan highlighted their joint efforts in providing vocational trainings, higher education and rehabilitation programs for the upliftment of the physical, mental and emotional health, job opportunities, happiness, and prosperity of the PWD. This platform provided an excellent opportunity to RC Patan and its members to enhance their contribution towards the educational and vocational trainings of the PWD.









## What Should be done at Individual, Community and National Level

Apart from the contribution of SIRC, NSCISA, SCINN and some welfare organization and individual efforts, very little has been done to the spinal injured for the enhancement of their livelihood, especially the contribution from the Nepal government side is almost zero. Question arises— What has the great new

constitution of the Federal Republic of Nepal brought for the physically challenged for their equal rights and freedom focusing on the advocacy, awareness, capacity development and enhancement of livelihood for which they have been waiting since decades?

To immediately address the needs of the disabled— (i) First and foremost, they should be treated with love, affection and without any discrimination providing



them equal rights— by making our societies more disabled friendly. (ii) A strong disability act with policies and laws for protecting their rights and opportunities should be introduced. (iii) A separate governing body with long-term plans for their benefits should be established. (iv) The governing body should start providing benefits to the most advanced medical treatment, counseling, rehabilitation programs for them to return to normal life and to reintegrate into society. (v) Scholarships should be granted for higher education; vocational training, and other income generating opportunities should be provided to empower them for an independent life with enhanced livelihood.

The 'Khagendra Apanga Maitri Marga' (Khagendra Accessible Road) at Jorpati—inaugurated by duo artists Madan Krishna and Hari Bansha— is an international standard road for accessibility that served an exemplar for all the further accessible road construction in Nepal. Not only the roads, but every piece of infrastructure starting from the toilets, houses, hospitals, educational institutions, office buildings, recreational entertainment centers up to our historical monuments, temples and pagodas should be made disabled-friendly. For the comfort of the daily activities of the PWD— ramps, escalators, conveyor belts etc. should be constructed in the busy public places like airports, bus stations, hospitals, hotels, government and private offices.

As every human has the right to live, love, marry, and reproduce, there is no valid reason why the

differently abled should be deprived of these rights. There should be no hindrance in their path of love, marriage, and family building. We have a long way to go in developing disabled-friendly infrastructures, and the inauguration of Khagendra Disabled-Accessible Road in Jorpati proves that we can do it. Differently abled can not only stand on their own, but are also capable of leading the entire society, if given the right opportunities. Stephan Hawking—one of the greatest scientists and physicists of the 21st century—became a legend, despite being physically-challenged and bound to wheelchair. Jhamak Ghimire of Nepal-born victim of cerebral palsy—has inspired the world through her literary writings. The success of Mr. Thomas Whittaker from USA— in climbing Mt. Everest in 1998 with the help of an artificial leg and similar achievement made by Erik Weihemmayer, a blind American in 2001— proves the greatest inspirations to the PWD and the wheelchair-bound to continue to dream of big accomplishments in life.


Efforts at individual and organizational levels have been and will remain crucial in rehabilitating and integrating the physically challenged with the society. But the state must lead the effort by systematically studying the issue, formulating related policies, promulgating acts, and developing specialized institutes and facilities for the PWD.

सुदूरपश्चिमका ती दुखेका मुटुहरू

बाजुरा, मार्तडीकी ४५ वर्षीया गीता बोहरा आश्नी २३ वर्षीया छोरी कृष्णालाई देखाउँदै बडो टिठलाग्दो भावमा रून्चे स्वरले भन्दै थिइन् -

'मेरी छोरी बिरामी परेको १० वर्ष पुग्यो । १३ वर्षकी हुँदा घाँटी दुख्ने, टिन्सल पाक्ने भइराख्थ्यो । पिछ हातखुट्टाका जोर्नी दुख्ने र सुन्निने भयो । हुँदाहुँदा हिँड्नै नसक्ने भई । औषि पसलमा बस्ने डाक्टरले दिएका चक्कीले व्यथा केही निको भएको थियो, पिछ फेरि जोर्नीहरू दुख्ने, सुन्निने र ज्वरो आउने व्यथा फर्कियो ।' म उनको क्रा ध्यान दिएर सुन्दै थिएँ । उनले अगाडि भिनन् ।

'यो १६ वर्षकी हुँदादेखि हिँड्दा स्याँ स्याँ गर्ने, मुटु काम्ने हुन्छ । गाउँका डाक्टरहरूलाई धेरैचोटि देखाएँ । फाँकी पनि लगाएँ । तर व्यथा फन् बढ्दै गयो । घरको गाईबस्तु बेचेर धनगढी र लखनउसम्म पुऱ्याएँ, उपचार हुन्छ कि भनेर । लखनउको डाक्टरले मुटुको अप्रेसन गर्नुपर्छ, दुइटा भल्भ फेर्नुपर्छ, १० लाख रूपैयाँ लिएर आऊ भनेको छ । सम्पत्ति सबै सिकइसक्यो, तर अभै उपचार भएन ।' 'हामी गरिबका लागि मर्नुभन्दा अर्को बाटो छैन रैछ डाक्टरसाब, म त्यत्रो पैसा कहाँबाट खोजूँ !' यति भन्दाभन्दै उनी डाँको छाडेर रून थालिन ।

यस्तो कथा मेरो लागि नयाँ थिएन । यसअघि कर्णालीका कालिकोट, दैलेख र जाजरकोटदेखि मधेसका सप्तरी, महोत्तरी र रौतहटसम्मन्न अनि पूर्व र पश्चिमका धेरै जिल्लामा मुटु स्वास्थ्य शिविर र स्कुले बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण गर्ने अभियानमा जाँदा यस्ता दुःख र पीडाले भरिएका धेरै कथा मैले सुनिसकेको थिएँ । मैले गीता बोहराको बायाँ कुम हातले थुमथुम्याउँदै सम्भाउने र सान्त्वना दिने प्रयास गरें।

'तपाईंकी छोरीलाई एक पैसा पिन खर्च नलाग्ने गरी अप्रेसन गराइदिने जिम्मा मेरो भयो । मेरो नाम र फोन नम्बर लेखेर राख्नोस्', मैले भनें, 'तपाईंकी छोरीलाई निःशुल्क उपचार गराई खेत जोत्न सक्ने बनाउन प्रयास गर्नेछु। चिन्ता निलनू है।' मेरो कुरा सुनेर गीता र उनकी छोरी कृष्णा एकटकले मलाई नै हेर्न थाले । उनीहरूका आँखाबाट आँसुका धारा बगिरहे । अनुहारमा खुसीको सानो भिल्का पनि देखियो ।

उनीहरूको खुसीको आँसु रोकिन नपाउँदै मैले डाक्टरी पुर्जा (प्रेस्किप्सन) लेखेर कृष्णाको हातमा थमाएँ र भनें, 'दस दिनपछि फोन गरेर काठमाडौं आउनू । मेरो नम्बर यसमा लेखेको छ । बाटो खर्च, खाने, बस्ने र उपचार सबैको व्यवस्था नेपाल हार्ट फाउन्डेसन र पाटन रोटरी क्लबले गर्छ। तपाईंको एक पैसा पनि खर्च हुँदैन । अब काठमाडौं मै भेटौंला।' यति भन्दै म अर्को मुटु बिरामी जाँचन तर्फ लागें।

रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटन, ग्लोबल ग्राण्ट प्रोजेक्ट २३४७०६९ अन्तरगत पाटन रोटरी र नेपाल हार्ट फाउण्डेशनको संयूक्त टोली सुदूरपश्चिमका बालबालिकाहरुको मुटु परीक्षण गर्ने कार्यक्रम लिएर यस क्षेत्रमा आई पुगेको थियो । अछाम, बाजुरा र बक्ताङमा गरी १२ हजार बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण गर्ने हाम्रो लक्ष्य थियो । हामी सात जना मुटुरोग विशेषज्ञ, छ जना प्राविधिक र सात जना स्वयंसेवक सहितको टोली यो अभियानमा निस्केका थियौं । हामीले सबभन्दा पहिला अछामको मंगलसेन र साँफेबगरका ११ वटा स्कुलका ३ हजार ७ सय २४ बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण गऱ्यौं । त्यसपछि मंगलसेनको जिल्ला अस्पतालमा सञ्चालित निःशुल्क मुटु रोग उपचार शिविरमा पाँच सयभन्दा बढी बिरामीको परीक्षण र उपचार गरेर हामी बाजुरा आइपुगेका थियौं । अछाममा पनि कृष्णाको जस्तै अज्ञानता, गरिबी र सामाजिक अन्यायमा परेका मुटुरोगीको कथा सुन्ने मौका मिलेको थियो । तीमध्ये १० वर्षीय मंगले सार्कीको कथा कम पीडादायी थिएन ।

उनकी आमा रोग लागेर बितिसकेकी थिइन्। बाबु पाँच वर्षअघि वैदेशिक रोजगारीमा मलेसिया गएका थिए, तर सम्पर्कमा थिएनन्। मामाघरमा हुर्किएका मंगलेलाई बाथ मुटु रोगले ग्रस्त पारेको थियो। मुटुको एउटा भल्भ बिग्रिएको थियो। अभ्र बिग्रिनबाट बचाउन



प्रत्येक तीन सातामा पेनिसिलिन सुई लगाउने वा पेनिसिलिन चक्की दैनिक दुईपल्ट धेरै वर्षसम्म खानुपर्ने आवश्यकता थियो। सुई लगाए एक वर्षमा ५०० रूपैयाँ खर्चले पुग्ने, तर चक्कीमा वर्षको ५ हजार रूपैयाँ खर्च हुने देखियो। अछाम र त्यस वरपर यो औषधि उपलब्ध थिएन। सरकारी अस्पताल, स्वास्थ्य केन्द्र, स्वास्थ्य बिमा कसैले पनि यति थोरै पैसामा आउने औषधि बाथ मूद रोगीलाई उपलब्ध गराउने प्रयास गरेको देखिएन।

औषि अभावमा मंगले सार्कीजस्ता धेरै कलिला बालबालिकाको मुटुको भल्भ बिग्रँदै गएर अप्रेसन गर्नुपर्ने बाध्यता थियो। उनीहरू पिंछ उही बाजुराकी कृष्णाको जस्तै अवस्थामा पुग्ने स्पष्ट



यी प्रश्नका उत्तर दिन खोज्दा मलाई अत्यन्त पीडा भएको थियो । मैले नेपाल सरकारले विपन्न वर्गका मुटुरोगीलाई दिने गरेको नीतिगत सहयोग सम्भिएँ।


नेपाल सरकारले नीतिगत रूपमै १५ वर्ष मुनिका बालबालिका, ७५ वर्ष माथिका वृद्ध नागरिक र जुनसुकै उमेरका बाथ मुटु रोगीको मुटुको अप्रेसन सेवा निःशुल्क गरेको छ । यस अन्तर्गत सिहद गंगालाल राष्ट्रिय ह्दय रोग उपचार केन्द्र लगायतका अस्पतालमा यो सुविधा उपलब्ध छ । तर यो सुविधा अप्रेसन गर्न मात्र हो। यसका लागि सरकारको वार्षिक ३० देखि ५० करोड रूपैयाँ खर्च हुन्छ ।

मंगले सार्कीजस्ता अप्रेसन गर्नुपर्ने अवस्थामा नपुगेका, तर वार्षिक ५ हजार रूपैयाँको औषधि भए पुग्ने बालकलाई यो सुविधा छैन । भल्भ निबग्नियोस् भनेर रोगको रोकथाम गर्ने पेनिसिलिन सुई र चक्की बाथ मुटु रोगीलाई सरकारले उपलब्ध गराउने नीति लिएको छैन ।

सरकार भन्छ – बाबुनानी हो, तिमीलाई बाथ मुटु रोगले छोए

बुिकन्थ्यो।

मंगले सार्कीका मामालाई मैले भनेको थिएँ, 'हेर्नुहोस् बाबुलाई मुदुरोग छ। अहिले धेरै बिग्रिएको छैन, उपचार गऱ्यो भने ठिक हुन्छ। पिछ ऊ ठूलो हुँदा केही समस्या पर्देन। तर उपचार नगर्ने हो भने उसको मुदुको भल्भ बिग्रँदै गएर हार्टफेल हुन्छ। अनि मुदुको भल्भ फेर्नुपर्ने अप्रेसन गर्नुपर्छ। यसमा मृत्युसमेत हुनसक्छ। अप्रेसन भइहाल्यो भने पिन जिन्दगीभर औषधि खाने र विभिन्न समस्या भेलिराख्नुपर्ने हुन्छ।' मंगलेका मामाले मुन्टो हल्लाउँदै सोधेका थिए, 'कुन औषधि हो त्यो, अनि कहाँ पाइन्छ, कित खर्च लाग्छ?'



पनि नआत्तिन् । भोलि मर्ने अवस्था आएछ भने ३-४ लाख रूपैयाँ खर्च लागे पनि सरकारले निःशुल्क अप्रेसन गराइदिन्छ । हाललाई रोग पालेर बस्नु ।

वार्षिक एक करोड रूपैयाँ खर्च छुट्याउने हो भने देशभरिका बाथ मुटु रोगीको रोकथामका लागि औषधि पुग्छ। तर सरकारले यो खर्च गर्न चाहेको छैन। उसले बरू उपचारमै वार्षिक ५० करोड रूपैयाँ खर्च गर्नेमा भलाइ देख्छ!

मंगलेले पेनिसिलिन चक्की वार्षिक पाँच हजार खर्च गरेर खाने हैसियत राख्दैन । उसले ५ सयसम्मको पेनिसिलिन सुईमा खर्च जुटाउन सक्छ। तर त्यो किन्न पाइँदैन। नेपालगन्ज, काठमाडौंबाट कुनै प्रकारले किनेर लग्यो भने पिन धेरै ठाउँमा स्वास्थ्यकर्मीले सुई लगाइदिन मान्दैनन् एलर्जीको डरले र सुई लगाउँदा मान्छेको ज्यान जाला कि भन्ने डरले। तर यो डर स्वास्थ्यकर्मीको अज्ञानता मात्र हो। कसैले सुई लगाइदियो भने पिन सेवा शुल्क सय रूपैयाँ लिन्छन्। ३० रूपैयाको सुई लगाएको सय रूपैयाँ!

यति मात्र होइन, मंगलसेन र आसपासको स्वास्थ्य केन्द्रमा



पेनिसिलिन सुई लगाइदिने व्यवस्था छैन, औषधि पनि छैन। देशको बिमा सेवा, विपन्न वर्गको सुविधा, पिछडिएका जाति, गरिब र अन्यायमा परेका वर्गको भलाइ र उत्थानका कुरा भाषणमा मात्र सीमित भएको मैले देखें। वास्तविक दुःखी र पीडितसम्म त यस्ता सुविधा पुगेकै छैनन्।

सरकारले स्वास्थ्य उपचारमा यित धेरै सेवासुविधा दिएको छ भन्ने कुरा यी सुदूरपश्चिमका मुटु रोगी जनतालाई थाहै छैन। अन्यथा, गंगालाल अस्पतालमा निःशुल्क हुने मुटुको भल्भ अप्रेसनतर्फ नलागेर बाजुराकी गीता र कृष्णा बोहरा उपचारको खोजीमा लखनउ पुग्ने थिएनन्। दस लाख रूपैयाँ जुटाउने चिन्ताको भारले उनीहरूलाई जीवनभर थिचिराख्ने थिएन।

नेपाल ह्दय रोग निवारण प्रतिष्ठानका अनुसार बाथ मुटु रोगका कारण नेपालमा बर्सेनि एक हजार बालबालिकाको मृत्यु हुने गरेको छ। त्यस्तै, बच्चा जन्माउँदा आमाको मृत्यु हुने प्रमुख कारणमा बाथ मुटुरोगले गर्भवती महिला पीडित हुनु पनि एक हो। यसमा कसैको ध्यान गएको छैन।

यो रोगको रोकथाम कार्यक्रम सरकारी नीतिभित्र परेकै छैन । विश्व स्वास्थ्य संगठनले सन् २०३० सम्म अल्पायुमा हुने मृत्युदर ३० प्रतिशत घटाउने लक्ष्य लिएको छ। पाँचदेखि १८ वर्ष उमेरका बालबालिकालाई प्रमुख रूपले असर पार्ने बाथ मुटुरोगको रोकथाम अघि नबढाएसम्म यो लक्ष्य प्राप्त नहुने निश्चित छ। हामीले २०८१ जेठ २० देखि २७ सम्म सुदूरपश्चिमका ३३ स्कुलका १३ हजार १ सय ७८ बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण गऱ्यौं। अछाम, बाजुरा र बभाङका ७५० मुटुरोगीको परीक्षण उपचारमा सहयोग गऱ्यौं। १२१ जना मुटुरोगी बालबालिका पत्ता लागे। तीमध्ये २० जनाको मुटुको शल्यिकया गर्नुपर्ने देखियो। यसमा हाम्रो प्रयास केन्द्रित रहुयो।

त्यसका साथै स्थानीय जनताका दुःख, पीडाबारे केही कुरा

बुभने मौका पिन पायौं। सुदूरपश्चिमको त्यो भेगमा लोकतन्त्र अभै पुगेको रहेनछ भन्ने थाहा पायौं। गरिब, विपन्न, दुःखी, पीडित, दिलत, शोषित लगायतको उत्थानको कुरा गरेर नथाक्ने नेताहरूले हाँकेको सरकारले आश्नो नीति तथा कार्यक्रममा यस्ता विषय कहिले समेट्ने होला ? हाम्रो देशको स्वास्थ्य नीति रोगको उपचारभन्दा रोकथाममुखी कहिले हुने होला ? सुदूरपश्चिमका ती चिरिएका मुटु लिएर बाँचेकाहरूको वेदना कसले सुनिदिने होला ? देशमा आएको परिवर्तनको फल ती पीडितहरूले कहिले चाख्न पाउने होलान ?

चिल्लो गाडी चढेर सिंहदरबारिभत्र पस्नेहरूका छोराछोरीको मुटु बाथरोगले छिया छिया नपार्दासम्म अप्रेसन होइन, समयमै पेनिसिलिन सुई वा चक्की पो चाहिने रहेछ भन्ने बुद्धि नीति निर्माताहरूमा सायद पलाउने छैन। हामीजस्ता विज्ञले हजारपटक तिनका कानमा फुक्दा पिन बाथ मुटुरोगको व्यवस्थापनमा पेनिसिलिन सुई र चक्कीको महत्त्व नबुभने ती नीति निर्माताहरूलाई धिक्कार छ।

यस्तै तीतामीठा अनुभव संगाल्दै सुदूरपश्चिमका ती दुखेका मुटुहरूलाई बाटाभरि सम्भिःदै हाम्रो टोली काठमाडौं फर्कियो।

नोटः (यो ग्लोबल ग्राण्ट प्रोजेक्ट अन्तरगत मुटुको भिडियो गर्ने उपकरण खरिद गर्ने, सहायक स्वास्थ्यकर्मीहरुलाई मुटुको भिडियो गर्न सिकाउने तालिम दिने र उनीहरुको सहयोग लिई धेरै भन्दा धेरै संख्यामा बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण गर्ने, शुरुकै अवस्थामा मुटुरोगीको पहिचान गर्ने, उनीहरुको निशुल्क उपचार गराउने र बाथ मुटु रोग रोकथामको पहल गर्ने उद्देश्य रहेको छ। हालसम्म २१००० बालबालिकाको मुटु परीक्षण, ४५०० जनाको मुटुको भिडियो परीक्षण, ५०० मुटुरोगी बालबालिको रोगको पहिचान, १० जनाको शल्यिकया र २५० जनाको औषि उपचार सम्पन्न भैसकेको छ। यो कार्यक्रम जारी छ।)

Furthermore, tree planting is a simple yet powerful activity that can have an immense impact on the environment. By planting a single tree, you contribute to the fight against climate change, conserve biodiversity, and improve the overall quality of life for people and animals alike.

## Protecting Environment is one of 7 Rotary area of focus:

We are committed to supporting activities that strengthen the conservation and protection of natural

resources, advance ecological sustainability, and foster harmony between communities and the environment. We empower communities to access grants and other resources, embrace local solutions, and spur innovation in an effort to address the causes and reduce the effects of climate change and environmental degradation.

#### RC Patan led tree plantation programme:

During RI 2023-2024, The Tree Plantation was organized in collaboration with RC Himalaya Patan, and Ward No. 22 chair at Bungamati and supported by Rotaract Club of Patan and Himalayan Patan, Women for Women and Yoga center Bungmati. The programme was organized as a pilot project of RCP Patan.

During this event, more than 90 people from various organizations participated the program. 200 plants (various trees, fruits, and soil-stabilizing plants) were planted. The programme was held on 26 August 2023.



**Future strategy of RC Patan:** Considering the lesson learned from this small piloting project, RCP Patan appeals for contributions from the various RC clubs,



members and external partners to expand their support and make further plans for a wider, sustainable, and collaborative approach in the Rotary focus area of



environment as a flagship projects. This will also provide an opportunity for people all around to unite in their efforts to create a greener, healthier planet. By participating in tree planting initiatives or hosting own event, we believe that by talking an active role in safequarding our environment for future generations.

#### Top benefits of trees for the environment

रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटनको अनुपम परियोजना : पशुल्याणबाट जनस्वास्थ्य अथवा भनौं जनस्वास्थ्यको लागि पशुकल्याण । पशु र मानिसको प्राकृतिक अन्तर्निहित सम्बन्ध । अनुपम यस कारणबाट भयो, यस किसिमको मानिस र पशुको अन्तर्निहित 'एक' स्वास्थ्य सम्बन्धी पहिलो, बेग्लै पहिचानको विश्वका अन्य कृनै ४६ हजार रोटरी क्लब सञ्चालित भएको यो पंक्तिकारलाई जानकारी छैन । हामीले आफ्नो पाल्तु पशुलाई स्वस्थ राख्न सक्यौं भने हामी पिस्वस्थ रहन सक्छौं । हाम्रा विरपरी रहने वा सँगै संसर्गमा आउने घरेलु होस् वा पाल्तु वन्यजन्तु, उनीहरुको उचित रेखदेख, स्याहार संभार र सरुवा रोगको रोकथाम गर्न सक्यौं भने हामी सुरक्षित हुन सक्छौं । अन्यथा रोगी पशुको संसर्ग र पशु उत्पादित दूध, मासु, अण्डाबाट धेरै रोगहरु सरेका अनुभव छन्। पशुहरु रोगबाट सुरक्षित नभएको खण्डमा तिनीहरुका उब्जेका रोगबाट ग्रसित भै हाम्रो ज्यान खतरामा पर्न सक्छ।

विश्व परिवेशमा १ हजार ४ सय १३ रोगजनक सुक्ष्मजीवहरु जस्तै भाइरस, वैक्टेरिया, ढुसी र परोपिजवीबाट हुने रोगहरु पशुबाट मानिसमा सर्न सक्ने करिब १५० किसिमका जुनोटिक रोगहरु छन्। त्यसमध्ये ४० किसिमका मुख्यरोगहरु नेपालमा विद्यमान छन्। त्यसैका कारणबाट वर्षेनि कयौं मानिसको मृत्यु हुने गरेको छ। यी रोगहरु मध्ये हाम्रो परिवेशमा प्राथमिकता तोक्ने हो भने रेविज, बहलाउने डरलाग्दो रोग सबैभन्दा अगाडी आउँछ।

विश्वमा करिब ६० हजार मानिसहरु रेविजबाट वर्षेनि मृत्यको



चपेटामा पर्छन् । नेपालमा एकसय देखि दुई सय मानिसहरु कुकुर, बिरालो, बाँदर र अन्य पशुको टोकाईबाट रेविज भएर दर्दनाक मृत्युको शिकार बन्छन् । यो रोग लागेपछि लगभग सतप्रतिशत मानिस मृत्यु अँगाल्छन् । यसबाट बचाउन असम्भावी छ । अमेरिकी मुलुकहरुमा पाइने रगत चुस्ने भेम्पायर चमेरोबाट रेविज लागेको मानिसलाई विशेष उपचारबाट एकाध दुर्लभ बचाउन सिकएका अपवाद छन् । हाम्रो क्षेत्रमा भेम्पायर चमेरो पाईदैन । नेपालको सन्दर्भमा रेविजको लक्षण देखापरेपछि शतप्रतिशत मानिस मर्ने भएपिन तर मानिसलाई रोगको रोकथामबाट शत्प्रतिशत बचाउन सिकन्छ । कसरी भने, टोकेर वा अन्य किसमबाट सार्ने पशुहरुलाई रेविज रोग विरुद्ध खोप लगाउने र जन्तुबाट टोकिने वा संसर्गमा आएका मानिसले यथाशीघ्र समयमै पोष्टएक्सपोजर रेविज खोप अनिवार्य लगाउन पर्नेहन्छ ।



धेरैजसो कुकुर, बिरालो पाल्नेहरुले तिनीहरुलाई रेविज विरुद्ध खोप लगाइने व्यवस्था गर्छन् । तर ठूलो समस्या हो भुस्याहा कुकुर/बिरालोको टोकाईबाट सर्ने मुख्य रेविज रोग । खोप नपाएका भुस्याहा कुकुरहरुको संख्या जित बढी हुन्छ, तिनीहरुबाट रेविज रोग फैलिने डर त्यत्तिकै बढी हुन्छ ।

रेविज रोगबाट पशु र मानिसको ज्यान जोगा।उन रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटनले लिलतपुरका विभिन्न गाऊँ।हरुमा केही वर्षदेखि रेविज विरुद्ध खोप सञ्चालन गर्दे आएको छ । यो कार्यक्रमको लागि यस पंक्तिकार र निजको पत्नी प्रविणाको नाममा स्थापित डा. मुक्ति नारायण प्रविणा फाउण्डेशन नेपालले यस रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटनको परियोजना : रेविज विरुद्ध खोप शिविरलाई आर्थिक प्रायोजन (स्पनसरसीप) गर्दे आएको छ । यसको अभिप्राय हो



भुस्याहा कुक्रुरलााई खोप दिएर रेविजबाट सुरक्षित भएपछि भुस्याहा कुक्रुरले मानिसलाई टोक्यो भने पिन रेविज फैलिन पाउँदैन । यसबाट जनस्वास्थ्यको रक्षा हुनछ । एउटा मात्र मानिस वा पशुलाई त्यो रोगबाट हुने मृत्यु जोगाउन सिक्यो भने पिन हाम्रो प्रयास सफल भएको ठान्दछौं । त्यसैले कुक्रुर, बिराला, अन्य पशु आदिलाई यस रोगबाट जोगाउँदै तिनीहरुबाट मानिसमा सर्न सक्ने रोगको रोकथामबाट साथै जनकल्याण पिन हुन जान्छ ।

विगतमा रेविज खोपको शिविर सञ्चालन गराउँदै आउँदा के अनुभव भयो भने पोथी कुकुरले वर्षेनि २ पटक बच्चा पाउने र हरेक वेतमा एउटीले एकै देखि १४ बच्चाहरु पाएको देख्यौं । अर्थात् एउटीले औसतमा ७/६ बच्चा पाउने हिसाबले वर्षको २ पटक बच्चा भएमा एउटैबाट १४/१५ बच्चा जन्माउने र एउटा गाउँमा १०० पोथी भएको खण्डमा वर्षेनि करिब १५०० बच्चाहरु थिपदै जाने देखियो । अर्थात् रेविज विरुद्धको खोप शिविर सञ्चालन गर्न आर्थिक भारले गाउँहरुमा शिविर सञ्चालन गर्न कठिनाई बढदै जानेभयो ।

गाउँहरुमा भुस्याहा कुकुरको संख्या घटाउँदै लैजानु नितान्त आवश्यकता देखियो । विगतमा विष खुवाएर भुस्याहा कुकुरहरु मारिंदा पशु अधिकारकर्मी र पशुप्रेमी सर्वसाधारण जनताले घोर विरोध गरेपछि विष खुवाएर मार्ने र भुस्याहा संख्या घटाउने तरिका अपाच्य भयो ।



बढ्दै गएको भुस्याहाको संख्याले मानिसलाई आक्रमण गर्ने र रेविज, टिटानस आदी हुने खतरा बढ्दै गएको हामीले अनुभव गर्दै आयौं। खोपले मात्र पार नलाग्ने देखिएपछि, भुस्याहाको संख्या घटाउन रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटनले रेविज विरुद्ध खोप साथै बन्ध्याकरण शिविर यही वर्ष संचालन गऱ्यो। बन्ध्याकरणमा पोथीको पाठेघर र भाले कुकुरको अण्डकोष निकाल्ने काम गरियो। यसको लागि भेटनरी सर्जनहरु सहितको १५ जनाको टोलीलाई रोटरी क्लब अफ पाटनले नेशनल जुनोसिस सेन्टरलाई ठेक्का दिइयो। एकै शनिवारको दिनमा १२३ भुस्याहरुको बन्ध्याकरण तथा रेविज खोप लगाउने कार्यक्रमहरु हरसिद्धी उच्च माध्यमिक विद्यालयको प्राङ्गण र कोठाहरुमा यो शिविर सम्पन्न गरियो। यसको लागि हरसिद्धि

उच्च माध्यमिक विद्यालयका प्रिन्सिपल र अन्य स्टाफाहरुप्रति रोटरी क्लबको तर्फबाट यो पंक्तिकार हार्दिक आभार व्यक्त गर्दछ।



भुस्याहाको १ सय २३ संख्याको बन्ध्याकरण गरिंदा त्यसमध्ये आधा संख्या पोथीबाट औसतमा जन्मन सक्ने ४६९ भन्दा बढी भुस्याहा बच्चाहरु जन्मन नसक्ने भए र खसी पारिएका भालेले वरिपरी गाऊँ र अन्य छिमेकी गाउँका पोथीहरुलाई गर्भिणी बनाउन सक्ने सम्भावना पनि घट्यो।

सन् २०२४ को यो शिविर डा. मुक्ति नारायण प्रविणा फाउण्डेशन नेपाल र हाम्रो रोटरीका दानी सदस्यज्यूहरुको आर्थिक सहयोगबाट यो कार्य सफलताका साथ सु-सम्पन्न भयो। यसको श्रेय सहयोगी सदस्यहरुलाई जान्छ र वहाँहरु धन्यवादका पात्र पनि हुन्हुन्छ।

विगतका वर्षहरुमा हाम्रो रोटरी क्लबको खोप शिविर व्यवस्थापन गर्ने स्नेहा केयर, भेटेरिनरी प्राक्टिशनर्स एसोसियशन नेपाल (VPAN) को कार्य सहानीय छ । VPAN का विज्ञ डाक्टरहरुले रेविज खोप लगाउनु अतिरिक्त रेविज रोगबारे सचेत गराउन हाम्रो रोटरी क्लबले छात्रवृत्ति प्रदान गर्ने गरेका हरसिद्धि, फुलचौकी, थैब, किटनी स्कुलहरुमा यो रोगको रोकथामबारे कक्षा संचालन गरेका थिए । यो रोगबारे प्रश्नोत्तर सेसनमा उत्तम जवाफ दिने विद्याधीहरुलाई चकलेटबाट पुरस्कृत गरी शिविरलाई बढी रोचक बनाइएको थियो । यही अवसरमा विद्यार्थीहरु र सर्वसधारण जनतालाई यो रोगबारे लिफलेट र ब्रोसिएर बाँडिएका थिए ।

हाम्रो क्लबको रेविज नियन्त्रण गर्ने र प्रयास-यात्रामा पाटनका अन्य १२ वटा रोटरी क्लबहरु र लिलतपुर महानगरपालिकाका प्रत्येक वडालाई संयुक्त रुपमा समावेश गरी रेविज विरुद्ध खोप र बन्ध्याकरण शिविर वृहत रुपमा वर्षको दुईपटक लिलतपुरका गाउँहरुमा सञ्चालन गर्न सिकयो भने रेविज रोगबाट मृत्यु हुने मानिस र पशुहरुलाई न्यूनीकरण गर्न सिकन्थ्यो । यो पंक्तिकारलाई सधैं मनपर्ने, सान्दर्भिक ब्राजिली लोकगीतका केही पंक्तिहरु यहाँ उद्धृत गर्न चाहान्छु, त्यो हो,

## रक्तदान दिउँ, स्वस्थ रहुँ

धेरै दानहरुमध्ये रक्तदान सबैभन्दा महत्वपूर्ण दान मानिन्छ । नेपालमा १५० भन्दा बढी रोटरी क्लबहरु छन् । यी क्लबहरुले वर्षेनी रक्तदानलाई निरन्तरता दिदैं आएका छन् । रोटरी क्लब पाटनले पनि रक्तदान कार्यक्रम सञ्चालन गर्दे आएको छ । हरेक वर्ष हाराहारी ४० देखि ५० पिन्ट सम्म रगत जम्मा गरी रेडक्रसलाई सहयोग प्-याएको छ ।

रगत दानले रगत प्राप्त गर्नेलाई मात्र होइन दातालाई पिन स्वस्थ र तन्दुरुस्त रहन मद्दत गर्छ । एक अध्ययन अनुसार रक्तदान गर्नेहरुलाई हुने केही फाइदाहरु मध्ये केही यसप्रकार छन् -



#### १. ह्दय स्वस्थ रहन्छ

नियमित रक्तदानले हाम्रो ह्दयको स्वास्थ्यमा सुधार ल्याउन सक्छ । रक्तदान गर्नाले आफनो रगतको मोटाइ कम हुन्छ । अनि हाम्रो ह्दयको रक्तसञ्चार सजिलो र छिटो हुन्छ । अमेरिकन जर्नल अफ एपिडेमियोलोजीमा प्रकाशित अर्को अध्ययनले पत्ता लगायो कि रक्तदान गर्ने व्यक्तिहरुमा ह्दयघातको जोखिम ८८ % कम थियो ।



#### २. जिम छोड्न सकिन्छ

रेडक्स र मेयो क्लिनिकको सुचना अनुसार एक पिन्ट रक्तदान गर्दा ६०० देखि ६५० सम्मको क्यालोरी जलाउँछ । शरीरले निकालेको रातो रक्तकोशिकालाई प्रतिस्थापन गर्न ऊर्जा खर्च गर्दा क्यालोरी जलेको हुन्छ । यद्यपि रक्तदान वजन घटाउने योजनाको हिस्सा हुनुहुँदैन ।



#### ३. आत्मसन्तुष्टि

भनिन्छ कि आत्मसन्तुष्टि भन्दा ठुलो खुशी अरु हुँदैन । रक्तदानले त्यस्तो विशेष खुशी प्रदान गर्दछ । दान गर्ने मानिसहरुले प्रायः दाताहरुसँग मित्रता विकास गर्छन् जो सबै जीवन बचाउनमा मद्दत गर्न प्रतिबद्ध भएका हन्छन् ।

#### ४. क्यान्सर जोखिम कम गर्न सक्छ

बेला बेलामा रक्तदान गर्दा हामीलाई क्यान्सर हुने जोखिम कम हुन्छ। नेशनल क्यान्सर इन्स्टिच्यूटको जर्नलमा प्रकाशित एक अध्ययनले रक्तदानले मानिसहरुको शरीरमा आइरनको मात्रा कम गर्न सक्ने देखाएको छ। हामीलाई बाँच्नको लागि आइरनको आवश्यकता हुन्छ। तर अत्याधिक मात्रामा भयो भने क्यान्सर हुने सम्भावना बढ्न सक्छ। अध्ययनले पत्ता लगाए अनुसार बारम्बार रक्तदान गर्ने दाताहरुमा कलेजो, फोक्सो, कोलोन, पेट र घाँटीको क्यान्सरको जोखिम कम थियो। तर यो पिन ध्यान दिनु महत्वपूर्ण छ कि यी निस्कर्षहरु सबैमा लागु हुँदैन। बिरामीहरुले आफनो आइरनको स्तर रक्तदानको बारेमा डाक्टरसँग जाँच गर्नपर्छ।

रोटरी क्लब पाटनको सहयोगमा रोटराक्ट क्लब पाटनले गत वर्ष सञ्चालन गरेको रक्तदान कार्यक्रमका केही भालकहरु तल प्रस्तुत गरिएको छ ।


#### महिला सशक्तिकरण

## Strategic Plan of the Rotary Club of Patan 2024-25 to 2029-30

#### **PURPOSE:**

Strategic planning is a tool to help us provide long term direction for our club and create a framework to establish a vision, mission, strategic goals, and strategies. The annual goals of the RCP strategic plan are established and revised in the Rotary International website's 'Rotary Club Central'.

#### VISION:

Together we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting changes across the globe, in our communities and in ourselves.

#### MISSION:

With the motto 'Service above Self', the mission of the Rotary Club of Patan is to service diverse communities, to promote integrity, to embrace diversity, to demonstrate leadership and advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through fellowship and service of business, professional and community leaders.

#### **AREAS OF FOCUS:**

To enhance our local and global impact, efforts will be focused within the following seven focus areas:

- Promoting peace
- Fighting disease
- Providing clean water
- Saving mothers and children
- Supporting education
- Growing local economies
- Supporting environment

#### **PRIORITY AREAS:**

Within the five Avenues of Services (Community Service, Vocational Service, International Service, Club Service and Youth Service), the strategic plan of the Rotary Club of Patan is prepared in line with the following four priority areas:

#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY 1: INCREASE OUR IMPACT

- Undertake humanitarian projects and activities to improve the lives in a diverse set of communities, considering all "Areas of Focus" of Rotary International.
- Improve educational standards of the communities through RCP's flagship Prajapati Educational Endowment Fund (PEEF) scholarship programme and other expanded educational activities including, the District's educational programmes (RNLM/TEACH).
- Serve the underserved communities, particularly people with mental and physical disabilities through our second flagship project Khagendra Piyush Ability Development (KPAD) Fund and other programmes.
- Improve Animal Welfare for the benefit of Public Health.
- Expand community service projects in various areas like education, health and drinking water and sanitation.
- Conduct activities in all five Avenues of Service with particular focus on Youth Services.



 Encourage all members to contribute to the Rotary Foundation and the Club's priority programmes and activities.

#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY II: EXPAND OUR REACH

- Increase our membership by attracting quality members (with priority to females, legal, media, young professionals, and spouses of members), and, more importantly, by retaining them.
- Interact with Non Rotarians, various partners of our joint collaborations and 'speakers' to weekly club meetings.
- Maintain regular and effective communication channels, such as the weekly newsletter (Lalitdhara Bulletin), RCP's website, and social media presence. Send stories/articles to District and Rotary International publications and website (GML, Rotary Showcase and Rotary News) along with periodic press releases to foster transparency, engagement, and community involvement. Such a comprehensive approach ensures stakeholders are informed, connected, and supportive of the RCP's initiatives, enhancing visibility, credibility, and ultimately, Impact.

#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY III: ENHANCE PARTICIPANT ENGAGEMENT

- Encourage members to-participate in all club service projects and programmes.
- Use a member-centered approach for motivation, development and retention of members.
- Maintain a vibrant club through engaging fun social activities and fellowship programmes.
- Offer learning activities at club meetings for members using learning facilitators and encourage all members to make use of the resources available through Rotary International's online Learning Center.
- Motivate and collaborate with Partners-in-Service, including Rotaract, Interact, Inner Wheel and RCC, and other Rotary clubs especially, 'New clubs' to maximize quality in the delivery of service projects.

#### STRATEGIC PRIORITY IV: INCREASE OUR ABILITY TO ADAPT

- Ensure sound financial management and oversight mechanism for good financial health of the club, including timely club registration.
- Maintain good historical records of the club's activities, conduct periodic reviews of the relevance and effectiveness of the club's operations, and ensure smooth handover mechanism during annual leadership transition.
- Conduct meetings according to the changing environment (in person or virtually).

## Bylaws of the Rotary Club of Patan

(Amended: August 2024)

#### Article 1 Definitions

- 1. Board: The club's board of directors.
- 2. Director: A member of the club's board of directors.
- 3. Member: A member of the club, other than an honorary member.
- 4. Quorum: For Club Meeting: One-third of the club's members
  For Board Meeting: a majority of the members of the board.
- 5. RI: Rotary International.
- 6. Year: The 12-month period that begins on 1 July, with the Financial Year following the Nepali Fiscal Year.
- 7. In Writing: A communication capable of documentation, regardless of the method of transmission.

#### Article 2 Board

- Section 1: The governing body of this club is the board of directors.
- Section 2: The number of board members shall be maintained at 13-15.
- Section 3: The board of directors shall consist of the president, immediate past president, president-elect, vice president, treasurer, secretary, joint-secretary, sergeant-at-arms, director/chair club administration, director/chair membership, director/chair public image, director/chair The Rotary Foundation, director/chair service projects, and director/chair youth services.

#### Article 3 Elections and Terms of Office

- Section 1: One month before elections, a three-member nominating committee comprising of the president elect (Chair), current president and the sergeant-at-arms is announced at the club meeting.
- Section 2: Members may propose candidates for secretary, joint secretary, treasurer, and any director positions to the nominating committee.
- Section 3: Following a succession plan, the secretary, the vice-president, and the president-elect are normally proposed to become the vice-president, the president-elect, and the president respectively, for the following Rotary Year.
- Section 4: During the Annual Meeting prior to 31 December, the candidates are proposed to the house and elected by consensus. Should there be more than one candidate for a post, the candidate who receives a majority of the votes for the office is declared elected to that office.
- Section 5: If any officer or board member vacates his or her position, the remaining members of the board will appoint a replacement.
- Section 6: Terms of office for each role are for one year and all candidates can be reelected for the following year.
- Section 7: The term of office for the club president is specified as one year only.
- Section 8: When a successor is not elected for any reason, the incumbent president's term can be extended for up to one year.

#### Article 4 Duties of the Officer

Section 1: President. The president presides at club and board meetings and performs other duties as recommended in the online courses for Club President in the RI Learning Center.



- Section 2: Immediate Past President. The immediate past president serves as a director of the board.
- Section 3: President-Elect. The president-elect prepares for his or her year in office and serves as a director of the board.
- Section 4: Vice-President. The vice-president presides at club and board meetings and performs the duties that might arise when the president is absent.
- Section 5: Treasurer. The treasurer oversees all funds and provides an annual accounting of them and performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Club Treasurer in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 6: Secretary. The secretary keeps membership and attendance records and performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Club Secretary in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 7: Joint-Secretary. The joint-secretary performs the duties of the secretary when the secretary is absent.
- Section 8: Sergeant-at-Arms. The sergeant-at-arms maintains order in club meetings and performs the duties as ordinarily pertain to the sergeant-at-arms.
- Section 9: Director/Chair Club Administration. The director club administration performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Club Administration Committee in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 10: Director/Chair Membership. The director membership performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Club Membership Committee in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 11: Director/Chair-Public Image. The director public image performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Club Public Image Committee in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 12: Director/Chair The Rotary Foundation. The director Rotary Foundation performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for The Rotary Foundation Committee in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 13: Director/Chair Service Projects. The director service projects performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Service Projects Committee in the RI Learning Center.
- Section 14: Director/Chair Youth Services. The director youth services performs the duties as recommended in the online courses for Youth Services in the RI Learning Center.

#### Article 5 Meetings

- Section 1: Annual Meeting. An annual meeting of this club shall be held no later than 31 December to elect the officers and directors who will serve for the next Rotary Year.
- Section 2: Regular weekly meetings of this club are held on Monday at 5:30pm to 6:00pm for fellowship and for meeting from 6:00pm to 7:00pm. Reasonable notice of any change or cancellation of the regular meeting shall be given to all club members.
- Section 3: Board meetings are held each month. Special meetings of the Board are called with reasonable notice by the president or upon the request of two members of the board.
- Section 4: Meetings may be held physically or virtually.
- Section 5: Board decisions may also be taken by e-mail, provided the majority of directors of the board affirm the decisions.
- Section 6: An Annual General Meeting is held by the end of September.

#### Article 6 Dues

Section 1: Annual membership dues shall consist of RI per capita dues, subscription fees to the Rotary regional magazine, district per capita dues, club annual dues, and any other Rotary or district per capita assessment.



- Section 2: Annual membership dues shall be determined by the board prior to 1 July every year. Members are requested to pay their membership dues in full no later than 30 June of every year. Exceptionally members can pay in two semi-annual installments by 30 June and by 30 December.
- Section 3: Late fee charge shall apply as determined by the board.

#### Article 7 Method of Voting

The business of this club is conducted by voice vote or show of hands except for the election of officers/directors, which is conducted by ballot if there is more than one candidate for any position. The board may also provide a ballot for a vote on a specific resolution.

#### Article 8 Committees

- Section 1: The club committees coordinate their efforts to achieve the club's annual and strategic goals. This club has the following committees:
  - Club Administration
  - Membership
  - Public Image
  - The Rotary Foundation
  - Service Projects
  - Youth Service
  - Events and Fellowship Coordinator
- Section 2: Additional committees may be appointed as needed.
- Section 3: The president is an ex officio member of all committees.
- Section 4: The president or the board shall refer additional business to a specific committee as needed.
- Section 5: Each committee's chair is responsible for the regular meetings and activities of the committee, supervises and coordinates its work, and reports to the board on all committee activities.

#### Article 9 Finances

- Section 1: Prior to each fiscal year, the board shall prepare an annual budget of estimated income and expenditures.
- Section 2: The treasurer shall deposit club funds in financial institution(s) and accounts designated by the board, for club operations and service projects.
- Section 3: Bills are paid by the treasurer or another authorized officer when approved by two officers or directors.
- Section 4: A qualified person conducts a thorough annual review of all financial transactions.
- Section 5: Club members will receive an annual financial statement of the club.
- Section 6: The audited financial report of the previous Year and the selection of the auditor for the current year will be presented to the house for approval annually before 31 December.
- Section 7: The fiscal year is from 1 Shrawan to 30 Asadh. (Nepali fiscal year)
- Section 8: The tenure of the treasurer will follow the Nepali fiscal year (mid-July to mid-July).

#### Article 10 Method of Electing Members

Section 1: A member proposes a candidate for membership to the board, or another club proposes one of its



transferring or former members.

- Section 2: The board ensures that the candidate meets all of Rotary's membership requirements.
- Section 3: The board approves or rejects the candidate's membership within 30 days and notifies the proposer of its decision.
- Section 4: If the decision of the board is favorable, the prospective member is invited to join the club, educated about Rotary and membership requirements, and asked to sign the membership proposal form and to allow his or her name and proposed classification to be conveyed to the club.
- Section 5: If no member of the club submits a written objection including reasons for the objection, to the board within seven days after the club is notified of the prospective member, that person, upon payment of membership dues, is considered elected to membership.
- Section 6: If an objection has been filed with the board, the club shall vote on this matter at its next meeting. If approved despite the objection, the proposed member is elected to membership upon payment of membership dues.
- Section 7: The club may elect honorary members proposed by the board.

#### Article 11 Amendments

These bylaws may be amended at any regular club meeting. Changing the club bylaws requires sending written notice to each member 21 days before the meeting, having a quorum present for the vote, and having two-thirds of the votes support the change. Changes to these bylaws must be consistent with the Standard Rotary Club Constitution, the RI Constitution and Bylaws, and the Rotary Code of Policies.

## Rotary Club of Patan Financial Management Plan

The objective of this plan is to provide proper guidelines and information to perform the respective duties with respect to the grant funds received in the club or the funds utilized by the club.

#### **Financial Controls**

- The Club Treasurer, or others as assigned by the Rotary Club President, will perform the following:
- · Maintain a standard set of accounts
- Banking activities are in accordance with applicable laws of Nepal.
- Separate bank account for each Global Grant.
- District Grant can be deposited in the Club General account but will be accounted for separately.

#### **Bank Account Requirements of the Foundation**

- The club will adhere to all Rotary Foundation bank account requirements as follows:
- Grant Bank Account will be lowornon-interest bearing.
- Grant funds will not be deposited in investment account sofany kind.
- The name on the account will be "Rotary Club of Patan GG 2....." (Grant number"

#### Signatory to Bank Account

- The Club President, the club Treasurer, and the primary contact of the Global Grant, with a minimum of 2 signatures for all payments.
- All disbursements will be approved by the primary contact or in his/her absence by one of the secondary contacts for the grant project.
- Funds will be released either by Cheque or by Bank Transfer. Cash will only be released in exceptional cases and for payments when another traceable method is not possible.
- All cheques and withdrawals will have two Rotarian signatures. The person authorizing the disbursement will not be a signatory on the transaction.
- Inventory system will be established for the control of equipment and other assets purchased with grant funds and distributed through grant activities.

- Ensure that competitive bid system is followed at the time of procurement.
- Maintain Invoices, receipts and cheque requests for all grant expenditures for a period of six years.
- Perform monthly bank reconciliations and retain them electronically as well as in hard copy.
- As requested, but at least annually within 30 days after the end of each Rotary year, the Club Treasurer will make available to the Club President and the Club Rotary Foundation Chair, the General Ledger, Income Statements, Balance Sheet and Bank Statements.
- When a signatory position has changed, the signatories moving out must ensure that new signature cards for the new signatories are completed with the bank, within 30 days of the change.

#### **Discrepancies**

## My experience as a member of the Interact Club of St. Xavier's Godawari

High school is undoubtedly the most important part of someone's teenage years. It is not only the time where a teenager is working to build a foundation for their career, but also the time where a teenager is slowly preparing to go out in the real world. The students of St.Xavier's School, Godawari were the same. Amidst juggling our schoolwork and searching for opportunities to build our portfolio, we heard about Interact club from our fellow students of Jawalakhel. Inquisitive, we asked and learned about all the opportunities being a member would bring us and with full determination we revived the interact club at our own school which had closed down five years prior. Hence, Interact Club of St. Xavier's Godawari aka ICSXG was reestablished



Anxious yet determined, the members worked on our first project. On the occasion of new year, we volunteered at the old age home located in Mitrapark. The joyful faces of elders' residing there were enough to make the members realize that Interact not only helps us build our portfolio, but also gives us the satisfaction that only serving other people could bring. The members were enthusiastic to serve more but the feeling of unsureness surrounded the club. There was a lack of support system that would guide us and help the club conduct better projects. But this feeling completely vanished when we held our installation program in the middle of Rota Year 2023-2024. We met our parent clubs Rotaract Club of Patan and Rotary Club of Patan. This gave birth to a second realization of how

Interact is not only a club but a family.



The club with the help of our parent club worked to build our treasury by participating in our school mela where we had two stalls selling food items and accessories. This event was a lesson on how to manage funds which was an essential part for running the club. Moving further on our journey, the club's most highlighted project was our awareness program on Rheumatic Heart Disease. This project was entrusted to us by the Rotary Club of Patan. This project exposed the club to young students of the school. The club was joyous to have youngsters curious about the club and even wishful of joining the club. This project helped the club to understand better about the kind of projects we would work on.



The club after that worked on two cleanliness campaigns. A cleaning campaign at a location near the school was conducted by the junior members of the club when the seniors were busy preparing for their board exams. This project was an initiation that inspired the juniors to take the roles of leaders and to continue the club's legacy. The other campaign was an international project called 'Language of cleanliness' in which we collaborated with Interact Club of



Catalao and Interact Club of North Africa. An international exposure like this was never expected by the club. We came to terms with the fact that Interact would let us accomplish the unexpected at the mere age of 17-18.



The club ended our Rota Year with two programs one of which being an awareness program on the growing issue of mobile addiction. Inner Wheel Day and Charter Day Celebration: Our Club participated in the Inner Wheel Day program organized by District 350 in Pokhara. Flag exchange was done with different IWCs on that day. The district felicitated our club's past president IW Shanta Shrestha as a senior member of IWC District 350. Our Club also organized the celebration marking the Inner Wheel Day at the residence of past NR Bijaya Laxmi Shrestha's residence at Sinchahiti.

We celebrated our Club's 30<sup>th</sup> Charter Day at Alice Restaurant Pulchowk on 6 April 2024. On this day the club honored its members who had contributed to club activities for 20 years. In addition, Past President IW Sulochana Pradhan shared her 'Journey in IW' in a simple, easy to understand way that motivated our new members.

**Events and programs:** Action goal for the club was: support in Health and Wellbeing, Education & School Projects, Environment Conservation, Community Support, Empower Women creating supportive environment to them.
